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Parking Limitation

LIKE the grass and the flowers, traffic problems come up in the springtime. Highway travel increases, bringing more tourists into the city. Industry and business pick up, adding to the volume of both vehicle and pedestrian traffic downtown. Soon appear the motorcycle policemen with their red over-time parking cards, and the little chalk sticks they use to mark the tires of parked cars.

Bothersome as it may be, limiting parking time on busy streets seems to be the only solution to the problem of providing parking space for shoppers, and the only way to get at the double parking annoyance.

Double parking is a persistent evil here. It is particularly bad on the side streets downtown between Main and Klamath and Main and Pine. At times those streets become so congested with double parkers that it is almost impossible to get through them.

With the established parking space opened up by a strict observance of the time limits, there will be far less excuse for double parking and the police can clamp down hard on these offenders. That is one of the reasons it is necessary to enforce the time limits in the busy seasons.

At the same time, care should be taken lest the restricted area be made too comprehensive. Tendencies to push the parking time limits too far out should be checked. Somewhere within a reasonable distance of downtown business houses there should be streets on which no parking limits are established, for the use of persons who must park for several hours.

With the restricted area pretty well confined to the business streets, the public should cooperate with the authorities in strict enforcement of parking regulations.

High Purposes

THOSE club raids of the last week-end had an amusing sidelight. It is to be found in the articles of incorporation of some of the clubs that were visited by the liquor commission agents in their effort to return hard liquor sales exclusively to the state liquor store.

There is, for instance, the listing of the high purpose of a Fort Klamath club, whose operator pleaded guilty to violation of the Knox law and paid a fine of \$150. Here are three of the general purposes of that club, as given in the articles on file in the county clerk's office:

1. To help, aid and assist the children of needy and destitute parents to obtain a grade school education.
2. To establish and maintain charities and benevolences of all kinds and natures.
3. To promote the advancement and perfection of the physical and mental, literary and social capacities of the members of said corporation.

Another club, in west Klamath, indicated in its articles that it was incorporating in the general class of religious, benevolent, literary, educational, scientific, fine arts, musical, sculptural, engraving, architectural and charitable societies and clubs.

If the liquor commission operatives had read some of these documents they might have been ashamed to make these worthy institutions so much trouble. But possibly they had in mind the Portland literary club that, upon investigation, boasted the ownership of only three books, and one of those, it is suspected, was devoted to instructions on the mixing of palatable drinks.

The Salvation Army carries on in behalf of the poor and the needy. In Klamath Falls it does far more work than many of us realize. It takes money to accomplish these things, and the local group needs more of it. On Thursday night, a program will be given at the armory, with leading talent of the city participating. The charge is small, the entertainment will be excellent, and the cause is certainly a worthy one. It deserves a capacity audience.

The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The value of trying to preserve peace by economic force may now be measured in dollars and cents.

The figures are not being announced here, possibly because they raise an embarrassing question. But if you will go into the records of the league of nations, you will find just what has happened under the sanctions trade embargoes adopted against Italy last fall.

After all President Roosevelt said in his appeals to American business to hold down on trade with Italy, after all State Secretary Hull threatened to do to exporters caught shipping to Italy, after all the hullabaloo here about American cooperation—against Mussolini—the figures show that Uncle Sam was the biggest profiteer from the sanctions.

The result of the whole transaction was detrimental to the peace advocates, only a minor annoyance to the belligerent, and profitable to outsiders.

It shows what usually happens when anyone or any group tries to play big brother to the world.

FIGURES
 A trustworthy unofficial estimate is that, from the time sanctions were invoked, United States trade with Italy has increased about \$4,000,000,000. The league official figures afford only a comparison for the first three months of sanctions, November, December and January.

For that period, United States trade with Italy increased \$2,347,000 over the similar period of the previous year.

In the same official period, England's trade dropped from \$2,742,000 to \$226,000, France's from \$1,389,000 to \$159,000, indicating that, as far as they were concerned, they really put the embargoes into effect.

Other gainers besides the United States were Austria (increase \$1,500,000) and Germany (increase \$940,000).

PROOF

DIRT
 The head of the Democratic Congressional campaign is Pat Drewry of Virginia and that of the Republican is Chester Bolton of Ohio.

They were chatting in the lobby when a member came up and asked them about Postmaster General Farley's statement that this is going to be a dirty presidential campaign.

"No sir, not as far as we are concerned," replied the democrat. "I have the highest respect for Mr. Bolton. 'No indeed,' claimed Bolton. 'Mr. Drewry is the highest type you could place in such a position.'"

They looked at each other without laughing, and then went to their respective offices—probably to okay bitter publicity attacks against each other.

MUCH ADO
 The unusual tiff between the senate and the house about paying Senator Black's law partner a \$10,000 fee, is spreading on the inside. It may cause some great personal trouble involving other legislation.

The house leaders have indirectly sent word to Black that, unless he changes his tactics on the Lobby bill, there is not going to be a bill.

What made them angry was the fact that Black ditched the House Lobby bill by sending it to a senate committee. The usual practice required him merely to disagree with it and request a conference with the house so that differences between the house bill and his might be straightened out.

Now the senators say they will tack the \$10,000 fee on a general appropriation bill so the house will not dare to kill it. The house crowd says if the senate does that, it will give Black another punch in the nose by a vote of the house.

Thus it may be a big fight.

News of Oregon

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—Little Jean Hibbard felt much better without her whistle today, thank you.

She became separated from the whistle yesterday for the first time since last Halloween—physicians removed it from her lung. The 7-year-old Longview, Wash., girl complained of chest pains for several months. Last week a Longview doctor located a foreign substance by X-ray. It was then the girl remembered a whistle on the end of a Halloween horn "disappeared" while she was blowing it.

A bronchoscope and forceps brought the whistle into the open, minus the reed. Frances Jean would have made quite a noise breathing had the reed been swallowed too, physicians opined.

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—Five women and four men remained on the list of tentatively accepted jurors to act in the Jack Justice trial today.

Frequent verbal clashes between attorneys marked the first day of the hearing. Justice was charged with hiring Leo Hall to kill W. Frank Akin, special investigator for the Port of Portland, in 1932. Hall is under sentence of death for the Erland Point, Wash., mass murders.

ASTORIA, April 22, (AP)—The Port of Astoria's hydroplane ramp took form today as a crew of eight men continued to drive piling. Ninety-six piling and two tons of hardware will be required for the project.

EUGENE, April 22, (AP)—The University of Oregon summer school, under the direction of Dr. Dan E. Clark, will open June 28. Courses offered will include those in business administration, music, languages, science, journalism, architecture and allied arts, economics, education, physics, anthropology, literature, chemistry, law, mathematics, political science, physical education and coaching.

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—County Commissioner Erwin A. Tate filed a complaint with the secretary of state, charging milk and cream for county institutions had not been purchased in accordance with laws providing for open bidding.

Commissioner C. A. Bigelow, denied the allegation and said purchases on open account were ordered.

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—Buenos Aires offers a new market for Oregon lumber, Hartley Clis-

dered only after bids presented were found to be identical.

EUGENE, April 22, (AP)—The executive committee of the Lane county Pomona grange, which has been studying the possibility of creating a power district outside of Eugene, will report its findings at a county-wide meeting at Franklin, May 23. The survey was authorized by the grange.

ALBANY, April 22, (AP)—Frank Laux, 44, died in a truck-train collision near here. W. L. Mitchell, an eye witness, said Laux' sawdust truck apparently stalled on the Southern Pacific tracks. The truck was demolished when struck by a passenger train late yesterday.

THE DALLES, April 22, (AP)—The Dalles port terminal became more than a mere strip of dry land when the Columbia continued its rise this week. Site of the dock is now under water. Final piling was being driven today. Backwater from Bonneville when floodgates are closed is expected to provide a depth for ocean-going vessels here.

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—A new record for customs receipts was set today, with returns for the first 21 days reaching \$195,000, or \$17,000 under the all-time mark of March.

EUGENE, April 22, (AP)—Mayor Elisha Large added Eugene today to the Oregon cities which have returned to a cash basis. He said the general warrant indebtedness of \$89,953 in December, 1929, has been retired.

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—Settlement of the San Francisco longshoremen strike revived hope for the Portland trade, which showed a sharp slump in the past week.

Activity at the docks struck a new low yesterday, with only five gangs of longshoremen working. A number of ships en route to Portland have been tied up in San Francisco.

PORTLAND, April 22, (AP)—Footpads snatched the purse of Mrs. Maybelle Rich, took a coin purse containing \$8.00 and fled, discarding the purse. They over-looked \$15.00 she had secreted in a trick pocket.

BANDON, April 22, (AP)—R. T. Moore, president of the Moore Mill and Lumber company, termed threatening letters received by officials of the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union, the work of "cranks."

Sheriff William Howell ordered homes of the men guarded, but said he expected no trouble. The Moore mill has been picketing during a jurisdictional controversy between a company union and the A. F. of L. affiliate.

NORTH BEND, April 22, (AP)—Engineers said today the \$2,250,000 Coos Bay highway bridge probably would be opened for traffic between May 5 and May 10. Workmen continued pouring concrete for the south approach.

OREGON CITY, April 22, (AP)—Oliver Skoog, 53, Oak Grove, died from injuries received when struck by a car driven by August Gunther, Jr., Canemah. Skoog was injured while walking along the super-highway near Milwaukee Monday night. Gunther was released on his own recognizance.

GARNER'S FIX (Head Bulletin)

John H. Kirby is a prominent southern Democrat and a leader in one of the committees working to support the constitution of the United States.

John N. Garner is a prominent southern Democrat and vice-president of the United States under the presidency of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

On July 5, 1935, Kirby wrote Garner:

"Personal.
 'My dear John:
 "How long are you going to tolerate the apostasy of the Roosevelt administration to the cardinal principles of the Democratic party and the notorious contempt for the plain terms of the constitution?"

"Your friend,
 "John Kirby."

Garner, under date of July 9, replied:

"Dear John Henry:
 "Your favor is just called to my attention.

"You can't do everything you want to and I can't do half what I would like to do. You don't control everybody you would like to and I am in a similar fix. I think that answers your question.

"With regards and wishing you health and happiness.

"Sincerely,
 "John N. Garner."

The letters were turned up by the other day by the Black lobby committee after it had subpoenaed the Kirby correspondence in its effort to find something with which to smear Kirby and his league to support the constitution.

What we gather from this correspondence is that Mr. Garner puts his democratic party allegiance above his allegiance to the United States.

Mr. Garner is Democrat first and an American second.
