CHILOQUIN INDIAN VICTIM OF MISHAP

Funeral services for Jesse Scott, young Chilochin Indian, who died from injuries sustained in an automobile accident last week, were held Wednesday afternoon from the Methodist church at Beatty, Ore.

The accident occurred in the Shasta river canyon near Yreka, Calif., on Friday night, April 17. Scott was driving north when the car plunged over the bank. The wreck occurred about 10:30 p. m., but was not discovered until 6:40 o'clock Saturday morning when Scott's companion, Millard Lang, regained consciousness and crawled up the road and summoned help. He sustained cuts, bruises and shock, and Scott died later Friday from his injuries.

Ashland Planning Fourth Celebration

ASHLAND, April 22. (Special)—Ashland will again celebrate the 4th of July, it was announced today after a committee representing six civic organizations met at the chamber of commerce

headquarters. H. L. Claycomb, who was chairman of last year's successful celebration, was re-elected to head the group who will direct the event. Claycomb stated that from indications already received this event will be even more successful than that of a year ago when 15,000 visitors celebrated in Ashland. Parades, band concerts, boxing, racing, swimming and water sports' carnival, street dancing, carnivals, and other attractions will insure entertainment for all.

Candidate Will Speak Thursday

C. D. Nickelsen of Hood River, candidate on the republican ticket in the May primaries for the nomination as congressman from the second congressional district, will speak at the public library hall on Thursday evening. Nickelsen will take as his subject the Townsend Plan, the New Deal, and the Republican Party. Nickelsen's platform, as announced in the Voters' Pamphlet, stresses among other things the need of federal aid for the development of irrigation and drainage projects, and a safe and sound program for agriculture and the livestock industry that will insure a profit to the farmer and stockman for their labor and products. Nickelsen is the owner of an irri-

gated farm in the Hood River valley, and thoroughly understands the reclamation problem.

KLAMATH MAN DIES AT HUNGRY CREEK

Dr. F. A. Stockwell, Klamath Falls chiropodist, died Saturday, April 18, at his mining claim on Hungry creek, west of Hill, Calif., according to word received here.

Stockwell left Klamath Falls early last week for his mining claim and was taken suddenly ill. He was 59 years old and a native of Kansas. He is survived by his widow, Martha Stockwell.

The remains are in a Yreka funeral home and funeral announcements will be made later.

FIRE BRINGS FINE
PORTLAND, April 22 (P)—Forest service officials said the first fire of the season in the Mt. Hood forest cost J. S. Hoover, of Cascade Locks, a \$20 fine. A report said he started a clearing fire on his land but failed to take proper precautions to control it, the flames spreading over two acres of other lands.

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
