

RESCUE CREW BRINGS MEN TO SURFACE

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mingling crowd, gathered at the mine head, as he was borne triumphantly to an emergency hospital.

The 44-year-old Scadding, more weakened by the ordeal of the long entombment, was carried all the way to the surface on a specially constructed stretcher, the rescue being completed at 1:00 a. m.

Behind the rescued men lay the body of Magill, 30 years old, who perished in the dank underground cavern early Monday, unable to withstand any longer the torments of exposure, cold, hunger, darkness and uncertainty.

At first, the handful of miners who effected the rescue said, "We didn't like to bring up" the body.

Whole Community Rejoices

Covered with a sheet and carried on a stretcher, the body of Magill was taken to the surface after Dr. Robertson and Scadding were released safely and provided with long needed care.

Humble in the face of death but thankful that two had been saved, the miners who succeeded in the rescue, the officials who directed their work and the spectators who were drawn to this isolated settlement by the international anxiety attending the entombment, joined in singing:

"Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow."

Mrs. Robertson and Mrs. Scadding, who had slept in the little mine office building and made their headquarters there while waiting and praying for the rescue, went to their husbands' sides as they were removed to the emergency hospital.

MOOSE RIVER, N. S., April 23. (AP)—Nova Scotia rescuers today are proud of its famous mine rescue organization, the Draegermans—who get their name from the fact that their equipment for underground labor was invented by Professor Draeger of Germany.

Jack Simpson, captain of the Draegermans, George Morrell and Joseph Nearing were among the Draegermans who reached the underground prison of Dr. D. E. Robertson and Charles Alfred Scadding in the Moose River gold mine.

Morrell took off his shirt and wrapped it about Scadding. After the survivors had been carried to the surface, Morrell triumphantly cut the telephone wire that was Robertson and Scadding's lifeline since Sunday.

REPUBLICAN BOOKS WILL BE AUDITED

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23.

(AP)—The Multnomah county republican central committee executive board ordered an audit of all its books today after Mrs. Florence Sturdevant, treasurer, refused to sign checks for expenses incurred under the administration of Chairman Ed R. Campbell.

She contended the executive board had no right to elect a chairman when Chester E. McCarty resigned, but that the entire committee of 438 committeemen should have been permitted to vote.

The executive board authorized a committee to audit bills and claims and said the treasurer "shall issue such checks." However, one member left early and a quorum was not present when voting occurred.

In the face of sharp criticism from the ranks, the board stood by its attempt to force all republican candidates to accept or reject a 19-plank platform.

Only William Bowes, member of the board, denounced what he said was an attempt to dictate to the party's candidates. "The candidates have received copies, and a lot of them have told the republican central committee to go to hell," Bowes said.

The platform provided no means of indicating which of the 19 points the candidate favored, requiring him to accept or reject them all.

BEER LICENSE HOLDERS MEET ON WEDNESDAY

More than 50 local beer dispensers were present in the city council chambers Wednesday evening when Ernest H. Aebi, president of the Oregon Food and Beverage Dispensers, Inc., visited the city.

Aebi informed local dealers that the purpose in calling the meeting was to present the latest rulings and regulations of the Knox law to all license holders. Similar meetings are being scheduled over the state.

R. M. Fawc, representative of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission, was the principal speaker, and told his audience that the liquor commission wishes to cooperate with dispensers of the state, and declared that this could be done only when dispensers understand the rulings of the Knox law.

The local dealers passed the following resolution during the evening: Resolved: That dispensers and distributors and others gathered at this meeting go on record endorsing and favoring the retention of the Knox law and that this meeting is opposed to, and condemns any attempt to wreck the present law.

The meeting was thrown open to general discussion after President Aebi gave a short outline of purposes and aims of the state organization of food and beverage dispensers, and told of its growth from a small start to a present membership of over 1100 scattered over the state. Towns having a membership of 100 per cent are Salem, The Dalles, Roseburg, North Bend, La Grande, and others. He urged all dispensers to join the organization, and introduced M. Lavienki, of Klamath Falls, who represents this territory on the state board of trustees.

P. H. Suss, state secretary of the organization, and F. H. Thayer, field representative for the organization, were also present Wednesday evening.

TAX COLLECTION REPORT ON FILE

A total of \$935,725 has been collected and turned over to the county treasurer since January 1, and there are on hand checks totaling approximately \$50,000 that have not yet been written into tax receipts, it was stated Thursday by Allen Sloan, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections.

"The office is also smothered with requests for statements on back taxes which would indicate a desire of the delinquent tax payers to take advantage of the easy quarter payment plan in paying their back taxes," said Sloan. "If current taxes are paid any time during the year, one quarter of the earliest year may also be paid without interest. The tax office has not changed the date stamp, but is writing the April 15 date, and will continue to do so until all mail is written up. The volume of work in his office had in the last three years increased fifty per cent, due to late laws allowing easy payments," Sloan stated.

The easy small payment plan had increased the number of tax receipts written one hundred per cent. As an example, the number of tax receipts written in 1931 were approximately eight thousand, while the number of tax receipts written in the last year has increased to approximately seventeen thousand.

"Of the \$935,725.00 collected

there was \$125,345.00 delinquent taxes collected under the new laws without interest. A goodly portion of which would not have been paid by the owner if it carried a large rate of penalty and interest. The tax office wished to express its appreciation to the many tax payers who called the second time and waited their turn during the rush, as the office help has not been materially increased for the last six years.

The county court and budget committee in considering the necessary amount to be raised by taxation for this year took into consideration that the probable payment of back taxes in excess of last year would allow them to take the position that the full amount of the current roll would be paid in with an additional 5 per cent from back taxes, which allowed them to reduce the levy for certain general funds. From the present indications the expectations will be met."

Open competitive examinations have been announced by the U. S. civil service for positions as specialists in public finance, at \$5,400 a year, in the bureau of census; junior cotton technologist, at \$2,000 a year, and junior scientific aid, \$1,400 a year, in the bureau of agricultural economics.

All states except Maryland, Nebraska, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington and the District of Columbia have received less than their quota of appointments in the apportioned departmental service at Washington, D. C.
