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500,000 Students Go On Strike in Country-Wide Anti-War Demonstration

NEW YORK, April 23, (AP)—More than 500,000 students in 400 colleges and high schools throughout the United States went on strike Wednesday in a demonstration against war. They left classrooms for an hour to act on a five-point platform.

At least five disorders were reported.

Two students were injured in a clash with police at Lawrence college, Appleton, Wis., and an unknown number were affected by tear gas when a bomb exploded unexpectedly at a rally at University of Kansas students at Lawrence, Kan.

In Philadelphia a peace demonstration at Temple university ended in near violence when speakers were pelted with vegetables and an attempt was made by unsympathetic students to tear down the platform.

Police broke up a communist demonstration when communists erected a platform five feet away from one used by Thomas Jefferson high school students in New York. A James Monroe high school strike was dispersed, but upon protest by school officials the police allowed students to reform.

Although many meetings refused to adopt one or more of the five planks of the campaign staged by the American Student union to end war, the third annual peace strike was called for the following purposes:

1. To protest against war and fascism.
2. To protest against the reserve officers training corps.
3. To demand passage of the Nye-Kvale act outlawing compulsory military training in some colleges.
4. To demand support of the Oxford pledge not to fight for the United States in either offensive or defensive wars.
5. To demand more academic freedom.

Joseph P. Laah, executive secretary of the American Student union, said reports from 80 of

400 schools participating listed 140,000 students who walked out of classrooms. He said the total figure would exceed 500,000.

More than 100 naming placards, carrying messages of peace from Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt were released at New York City hall to open the campaign.

Einstein speaks

Dr. Albert Einstein, famous physicist and pacifist, said that it was "the duty of enlightened youth to combat the politics of national egotism" in a message read before 500 Princeton students in Princeton, N. J.

About 50,000 students struck in Philadelphia, 13,000 in Chicago, 10,000 in Boston, 7500 in Los Angeles and 90,000 in New York.
