

PRICES HOLD UP FOR OLD SPUDS

PORTLAND, April 23, (AP)—Except for minor changes, butter was unchanged. Butterfat and eggs unchanged. Good demand for live poultry. A few dressed turkeys arrived. California strawberries were lower, Florin 12a selling around \$1.25 to \$1.35; Fresno 20a, \$2.25. Asparagus was steady, mid-Columbia selling at \$1.75 to \$1.85, with selected lots higher. Well held prices continued for old potatoes, with limited offering at the market. New Shafter Whites were weak and lower, at \$1.70 to \$1.80 for 50a. Peas weaker and generally lower. Old onions moving steady, with new Bermuda type lower. Good movement of rhubarb around 30c to 35c for 15a. Roseburg cauliflower has practically disappeared and California is firmer up to \$1.35. Hothouse cucumbers in good call, with fancy selling at \$2.85 to \$3.00 for 2a. Hothouse tomatoes lower.

MAN ARRESTED ON ASSAULT CHARGES

TULELAKE, Calif., April 23.—A 36-year-old man named Walker was held at the Shasta county jail in Yreka Thursday, charged with the criminal assault of the 6-year-old daughter of a well known Tulelake family. The alleged attack occurred Saturday evening at the home of the little girl's grandmother, where the child was staying while her mother was ill at a Klamath Falls hospital, and where Walker was employed. Walker was arrested earlier this week and taken to Yreka by Deputy Sheriff Roy Dyser. Dyser is remaining in Yreka to press the charges against the accused man. The victim of the alleged assault is confined to the Yreka General hospital.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, April 23, (AP)—

In one of the worst breaks in about a year, stocks crashed through an air hole in today's market for losses of one to five points generally and eight points or so in a few instances. The ticker tape fell six minutes behind floor transactions at the peak of the slump. A little aid arrived for scattered issues in the final half hour, and the selling rush slowed, but the close was weak. Transfers were over the 2,000,000 share total.

Losses of around one to \$5.00 a share, with some drops up to \$8.00 hit the stock market in the heaviest selling wave in nearly a year.

Brokers attributed the sudden collapse to the approach of the French elections, which some expect to result in devaluation of the franc and to the airing in congressional debate of the new tax bill.

Selling hit every sector of the market. Case Threshing and Union Pacific were both down \$8.00 a share, in the final few minutes while International Harvester lost \$6.00. The stock ticker lagged six minutes behind at one time.

Declines of about \$1.00 to \$5.00 were suffered by North American, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, Chrysler, New York Central, Southern Pacific, Western Union, American Telephone, Anaconda and Westinghouse.

There was mild support just at the close in some issues. Liquidation in stocks unhinged bond prices, and heaviest losses fell to carriers, which were down \$1.00 or more per \$100. Industrial obligations with stock conversion privileges were thumbed down hard.

Foreign currencies were steady against the dollar. The French franc improved a little in response to the smaller gold loss shown in the bank of France statement for the week.

WEAKNESS NOTED ON GRAIN MART

CHICAGO, April 23, (AP)—Weakness developed anew in wheat values today as a result of enlarged selling pressure, with slackening of demand for at least the time being.

July and September wheat especially were dominated by suggestions of likelihood of drought relief for domestic crops southwest and west. Export business in Canadian wheat was much smaller compared with yesterday's bit purchased for overseas.
