Ex-Game Worker Curious About Siren Lacertina

Is Mrs. John Simmon's "toad-frog" a necturus maculosus, or is it a siren lacertina? Or is it something else?

That is what Kermit Sheets, formerly a member of the Ohio state department of fisheries and now a resident of Klamath Falls, would like to know.

Sheets read the story in Friday's paper regarding the Beauty woman's freak reptile, with its fin-like appendages and short legs, and now his professional curiosity is aroused.

The maculosus and the lacertina are much alike, Sheets said, except that the former walks on four stubby legs while the latter navigates with only two, dragging its heavy tail along as best it can.

Both are members of the extensive salamander family and not related to the genus lizard. Sheets says that salamanders are indigenous to the eastern half of the Mississippi basin, and are seldom found in the west. That is one reason why he was particularly excited at word of Mrs. Simmon's find, and is eager to get in touch with her to view the animal.

Ski Events at Crater Lake Park Cancelled

While the Crater Lake ski tournament, originally scheduled for April 24, will not be held, Klamath Snow Clubmen expressed the hope Friday that there will be heavy travel to Crater Lake park this week end.

Various factors entered into the cancellation of the tournament plans, the chief one being the lateness of the date necessitated by the heavy snowfall in the park and the impossibility of preparing parking space sooner.

It was estimated that it would cost several hundred dollars to prepare a hill that would give expert skiers a chance to perform satisfactorily, and that such a hill would have to be built on snow.

The investment would therefore be immediately lost when the snow melts.

The Snow Club has held one tournament this year, in conjunction with the Crater Lake Ski Club, at Fort Klamath. The Crater Lake tournament was to have been held with the joint sponsorship of the two Klamath clubs and the Rogue Snowmen.

Every Sunday a number of skiers from Klamath Falls, Fort Klamath and Medford, as well as the members of the park staff and crews, have been cavorting in the snow at Crater Lake, and it is expected there will be opportunity Sunday for those interested to see these skiers in action.

Philadelphia Upsets Sox After Three Losses in Row.

A trio of major league managers and one of the hired hands were holding up their hands with an unmistakable air of pride today after a day of redemption which wiped out the memory of a few unpleasant afternoons.

Mickey Cochrane's Detroit Tigers, champions of the world, took a wide decision from the St. Louis Browns, twice their conquerors, yesterday; the merry men of Casey Stengel, becoming serious after dropping their first three games to their hated rivals from across the river, belted over three Giants, and the venerable Connie Mack's Athletics, beaten three times by the Red Sox, turned and notched a victory against the golden boys.

Reds Beat Cards

Billy Myers, Reds' shortstop, hammered out a home run to beat the St. Louis Cards, in atonement for his error that enabled them to tie the score.

Randy Moore, right fielder, broke his leg while attempting to steal second in the second inning of a bitter duel which went ten frames. A pinch single by Sidney Gautreaux sent home the winning tally in the 4-3 triumph.

Cochrane took off the black glasses he had been wearing on the sidelines because of eye trouble, and led his champions to a 10-0 win over the Browns. He got two singles. Gehring and Greenberg got three hits each, and Goslin got two.

The Reds won by 5-4 as Paul Dean went to the showers after allowing nine hits in seven innings. Paul Derringer, ace tosser of the Reds, was picked for 15 bingles himself.

Harry Kelley, a rookie from Atlanta, gave the Philadelphia customers a ray of hope concerning the rebuilding plans of Connie Mack. He outlasted Wes Ferrell, who went only four innings, and then went on to win his ball game, 9-1, allowing but three hits.

It was Kelley's first major league victory, and but for Jimmie Fox's third homer of the year, he would have had a shut-out.

Johnny Allen held the White Sox to seven hits for a 6-0 shut-out in his debut at the Cleveland Indians' home park.
