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Brief Comment

CONGRATULATIONS to the Klamath county chamber of commerce on the promotion of Percy Murray to its presidency. His experience in civic affairs, his interest in the welfare of the community, his knowledge of both urban and rural problems, and his enthusiasm for getting things done, fit Mr. Murray admirably for the hard job the directors of the chamber placed on his shoulders. For one of his comparative youth, Mr. Murray has accomplished much, and it was only a few months ago that the junior chamber of commerce awarded for the community's outstanding young man was tendered to him. We predict a year of growth and accomplishment for the chamber of commerce under his leadership.

This is Mayor Willis Mahoney's fourth campaign for office since he came to Klamath Falls not so long ago. First he ran for mayor, then for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, then for mayor again, and now for the democratic senatorial nomination. If he gets that, his campaigns for office will total up to five before the year is over. Then there was the water bond issue campaign, the fight against the Knox law, the short-lived fight for a city sales tax. Willis, quite obviously, lives for politics.

The Lake County Tribune takes cognizance of editorial comment here a week ago about the Lakeview highway, and remarks: "Klamath county influence will undoubtedly force oiling of the Klamath-Lakeview highway. Traffic between the two cities is heavy and everyone here will breathe a sigh of relief when the 98-mile trip can be made without danger of breaking a spring or the necessity of constantly dodging the shower of rocks picked up from the unrolled surface of the road." Right!

An AP dispatch from Washington says that after a colleague had paid his fines to get him out of jail, Congressman Zioncheck "threatened to bring action for false arrest on the ground that rights guaranteed him under the constitution were violated." Funny, when you remember that Congressman Zioncheck is one of the wildest and wooliest of the faction that has been sneering at the constitution and the supreme court.

Ben R. Liflin, the amiable publisher of The Dalles Chronicle, is a candidate for delegate to the republican national convention. Ben is well qualified for the job. He is willing to dig into his own pocket to finance his jaunt to the convention, and we believe republican voters would do well to give him their help.

Another fatal accident occurs in Klamath county. It brings the total of automobile deaths to three here in the space of a few days. With the heavy and fast travel season still ahead, it looks as if the accident record for Klamath county in 1936 will be a black one.

If you haven't already, maybe you should turn out to one of those meetings where all the candidates speak. But we wouldn't advise you to do it more than once, unless the campaign livens up more than it has so far.

It certainly looks as if it is all over for Ethiopia. The thing to worry about now is whether Mussolini, having tasted victory in an imperialistic enterprise, will have his hunger satisfied by gobbling Ethiopia.

Telling the Editor

URGES "NO" VOTE
 (To the Editor)—I see in your papers the Herald and News an election notice of sale of power site at the eastern end of canal C of the KID to the Enterprise and Pine Grove district.

Therefore I am going to make an appeal to the good judgment of the water users of the Klamath district to vote no at that election for several reasons.

The main reason is that if this power site is disposed of to the two above-named districts, it will mean an added bonded cost of about \$15 per acre on 300 small home owners who own less than four acres who are not allowed to vote.

You are being misled when they tell you that the secretary of interior wants to dispose of this site, as I have a letter just to the contrary.

It is an asset to the Klamath water users to retain this site. The main squelcher for this whole thing pays no taxes, nor does he live in the Enterprise or Pine Grove district, but is trying to use the Klamath water users as a tool to spite our local power company.

The Cal-Oregon Power company carried the Enterprise district bill for over \$15,000 for several years without any great force to try and collect same, and now in appreciation they want to go into the power game. They even harp about the 40 per cent grant, but if it is like lots of other projects it will have to have 80 per cent grant, for that is about the per cent—20 per cent work, 80 per cent loan.

The O. and M. for the Enterprise for 1934 was \$3.97 per acre, and 1935 was \$5.12 per acre. 1936 almost 70 per cent above 1934, and the top is not yet.

I say that it is not right for the large land owners to vote

a \$15 per acre on all the small land holders.
 The great majority of you KID water users know all I have said here from your past experiences, so I am only trying to remind you of our plight.

I am asking you to vote no next Tuesday, April 28, and it will be appreciated by over 300 small home owners who have no vote. I thank you.

The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The private consensus among republican inner circles at Cleveland was that Governor Landon is now a 3 to 1 bet for the nomination, Vandenberg 1 to 2. Other dark horses were thought to be too dark.

This is a sincere expression of highly authoritative opinion, but the Kansas Coolidge is by no means out of the woods yet. Most of his delegates are not irrevocably nailed to his cause. An unforeseen development might cause an exodus from the bandwagon.

In fact, an unforeseen development is now being talked about by certain powers with money enough to carry out their ideas. You may hear about it shortly, but it is starting a little late to do anything effective.

COORDINATION
 The Cleveland meeting was less of a clash and less of a victory for any faction than has been generally advertised.

There was some shadow-boxing over the selection of a keynoter and convention chairman, but both the Landon and anti-Landon people backed away. If the fight had been carried through, the committee on arrangements would have divided 5 to 5. Chairman Fletcher probably would have cast the deciding vote against Senator Steiwer. However, the jobs were not worth fighting about. Landon Manager Hamilton wisely declined to become involved.

The two men chosen are highly regarded among most republican authorities here. Steiwer is a comer in party affairs. Snell is as good a parliamentarian as could be obtained.

LULL
 President Roosevelt will probably not have much to say in his next few speeches. They will be handled as "routine."

The reaction to his Baltimore bombshell is fresh in the White House mind. Also Gentleman Jim Farley is supposed to have been pulling a few White House wires lately to late to promote quietude there. Some of his pals have been grumbling since the Baltimore experience that they are able to keep everyone else in the new deal quiet but cannot handle Mr. Roosevelt. The double chairman generalissimo wisely believes no occasion now exists for saying anything important.

MISGIVINGS
 The reason the house tax bill has rubbed certain democratic congressmen the wrong way is

that its fundamental theory is contrary to their traditional American teachings. It seems to discourage every man's ambition to get out of debt, and to provide his own security for old age. It encourages over-capitalization and get-rich-quick-day methods.

One loyal democrat recalls that he started out in business by borrowing \$2,000 from his father. He set up his business, but had to borrow continuously from the bank for five years to establish his business. During all that time, he took a small wage. He was willing to get himself into debt and to slave for the future. Later he used his earnings wisely to better his plant and pay his debts, always ambitiously expanding and bettering himself, employing more men.

The fundamental theory of the tax scheme is that it is a bad thing to pay off debt to lay aside for a rainy day. Such payments are penalized. The distribution of all earnings to stockholders is encouraged under a system which will force business men to raise money by issuing more stock. That is the road to bankruptcy.

The big fellows will not mind. They already have their surplus, but many a congressman who will vote for the bill on political grounds has personal doubts as to what it will do to young business ambition.

LOSS
 Despite all you may have read about the political blow to Mr. Roosevelt involved in Louis Howe's death, it made no change currently on the inside.

The blow really felt more than a year ago. At that time the president lost the services of his irreplaceable friend. Howe had been incapacitated since. He had a telephone in his hospital room lately, but was not able to take any part in White House affairs.

Howe was just as much to Mr. Roosevelt, during the last campaign and the first White House year, as you have heard. He was the campaign friend-maker for Mr. Roosevelt, a smart philosopher, a balance wheel. He could tell the president who was lying and who was telling the truth. Such unselfish friendships happen once in a thousand life-times. The president can never get another Howe.
