

Indians Defeat Browns in Sixteen Innings

FORMER YANKEE CAPTURES DUEL

Johnny Allen Turns in Best Performance of Season.

Steve O'Neill, pilot of the Cleveland Indians, seems to have diverted Johnny Allen's battling spirit into useful channels.

Allen was traded by the Yanks allegedly for his recalcitrant attitude. They were satisfied with his pitching but his bent for becoming embroiled with umpires, managers or anybody else who happened to be in a combative mood was at least partly responsible for the New York team putting him on the market.

Indians' first St. Louis O'Neill, under the guidance of Allen, seems to be concentrating his energies on winning ball games this year, however. Sunday he turned in a fine all-around performance as the Indians defeated the St. Louis Browns 8-7 in a 16-inning marathon, the longest game thus far in the season.

The game was the highlight of a day's play which saw Dizzy Dean, hold the Pirates to six hits as the Cards won 3-2 and Lou Gehrig and Jimmie Foxx, the cannon men of the American league, both boom out homers as the Yankees beat the Red Sox 12-9 in a slugfest.

Allen allowed the Browns only two hits in the last 8-2-3 innings but the stunt that labelled him a fighter was his driving slide into catcher Eddie Hemsley to score the winning run in the last of the 16th.

The force of that slide knocked the ball from the catcher's hand and made Allen the hero and Hemsley the chump.

Hemsley was no "Lucky Rollie" in this inning. He could have caught Allen's bunted pop but he let it drop, tried for a double play and threw wild to second as both runners scampered safely to bases. Then he dropped the throw that lost the game when holding it would have completed a triple killing.

Plenty of Opposition
The daisy one was given plenty of competition in a 10 inning hurling duel by Bill Swift of the Pirates. Dizzy retired the Bucs in order in their half of the tenth and then Frankie Frisch's double and Pepper Martin's single brought home the bacon.

A total of 35 hits were made as the Yanks downed the Red Sox before 12,000 at Fenway park, the Yanks getting 18 off the deliveries of four Red Sox pitchers. Boston took a six run lead in the first inning but the Yanks came back to score seven in the next frame. Frankie Crosetti of the Yanks got five bingles.

The Boston game was much like the fracas at Philadelphia where Brooklyn defeated the Phillies 10-7 in a battle of 26 hits which were interspersed with 11 errors. Earl Grace and Johnny Moore of the Phillies belted the ball for round trips as did Lonnie Frey of the Dodgers.

Detroit Downed Sox
Vic Sorrell of the Detroit Tigers, turned in a sparkling pitching performance as his team downed the White Sox 6-4 with 15,000 in the park. He held the Sox to five hits as the Tigers, really gaining momentum as the season moves along, notched their fourth straight triumph.

Ted Carleton of the Cubs topped Sorrell's performance by holding the bustling Cincinnati Reds to four blows and shutting them out 5-0. A crowd of 21,555 saw Carleton dazzle the youngsters.

Buck Newsum of the Senators held the Athletics to seven hits while his mates banged out 13 to beat the men of Mack 11-3. It was Newsum's third victory of the year.

West grounds caused postponement of the Giants-Bees game.

Hard Hitting Heavies Set for Second Meeting

The victory over Bend last Saturday put the Pelicans on the road to a successful defense of their track titles. Following the important competition in the valley, the team will enter the big 20-30 event on Modoc field a week from Saturday.

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Western Athletes in Lead for Olympic Team

NEW YORK, April 27. (AP)—America's track and field experts were a bit conservative earlier this year in forecasting a thin majority for the west in the makeup of the 1936 Olympic team. On the basis of the first spring tests, topped off Saturday by the Drake and Penn relay carnivals, it now looks like a landslide for the athletic products of the mid-west, southwest and far west.

Conspicuous among the surprises furnished by outdoor competition so far are these three performances:
(1) Brilliant decathlon triumph by Glenn Morris, Fort Collins (Colo.) auto salesman who bettered the existing Olympic standard at the Kansas relays;
(2) New national record of 9:10.6 for two miles by Don Lash of Indiana, bettering the outdoor mark of 9:13.2 set by Norma Bright at New York last summer;
(3) A new "citizens' record" of 22:25.5 feet in the javelin by Alton Terry of Hardin-Simmons College, Texas, at the Drake relays.

Penn Monopoly Threatened
All three achievements overcast a strengthening of Uncle Sam's chances of scoring, at least, in Olympic events which have heretofore held forth scant prospects for the U. S. A. Lash now looms as a great running mate for the coast star, Bright, in the 5,000 meters, which the Finns have monopolized.

Alaskans Wait Annual Break on Tanana River

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 26. (AP)—Thousands of Alaskans, peering at thermometers which showed thawing temperatures, waited nervously today for the biggest sporting event in the territory—the Tanana river ice breakup.

At Nenana on the Tanana river, 50 miles southwest of here, guards took up their vigil about a clock and a stake used to time the breakup and fix the exact day, hour, minute and second the ice starts moving.

Fifty clerks at Fairbanks tolled day and night tabulating 72,000 guesses entered by contests throughout the territory. Entries closed Easter Sunday.

Most of the guessers were worried by the prospect of an early breakup for they had recorded times later than this week.

Over the week-end the Chena river ice moved out at Fairbanks under the influence of the highest temperature for the period in nearly 10 years. A maximum of 54 degrees gave late guessers the fitters and soundings predicted an unusually early breakup.

It already had moved out of tributary streams, flooding the main channels which empty into the Yukon.
