

HEALTH PLAN OPPOSED BY CITY COUNCIL

After hearing a recommendation to that effect from the citizens' board of health, the city council decided Monday night to refrain, for the time being, from entering the new health set-up for Klamath county.

It was pointed out in the council's resolution that the city already has its health set-up, including sanitary, meat and food inspection, and that for the present it is believed best to proceed with this going program.

County Court Commented
At the same time, the council voted to send a letter to the county court commending it for its action in setting up a new county program under a board of health.

E. B. Hall, chairman of the city board of health, made the report to the council. Hall also headed the committee that proposed the county board of health plan.

Hall reported that at a meeting of the city board Monday, Dr. E. Dietzsch, the city health officer, had discussed the matter of more strict regulations among food handlers here.

Vapor Nozzle Approved
"I understand there are some things that need attention there," said Hall.

The council authorized Chairman Van Camp and the health committee to meet with Dietzsch to discuss the food handlers' inspection program.

The council approved purchase of a \$75 vapor nozzle by the city fire department.

Cooperation Urged to Save Forests From Fire

(Editor's Note—The following letter was written in connection with the American Legion fire prevention campaign, May 4 to 9. It was addressed to Hal Ogilvie, chairman of the committee in charge.)

"The romance of the timber industry does not stop with the beauty of the trees of the forest, the beautiful mountain slopes covered with fir, pine, hemlock and spruce, or the grandeur of the stately redwood standing in gigantic magnificence 300 feet high. This, in the mind of the writer, is only the beginning of the romance of the timber industry.

"The usefulness of the trees begin after they are cut. Logging camps are continually sending logs from these forests to the lumber mills, which daily turn out thousands upon thousands of feet of lumber to meet the demands of various other industries.

"Our huge network of railroads must be supplied with ties upon which to fasten securely its miles of track. From the factories come freight cars, ships and boats which transport this lumber all over the world. Box factories turn out fruit, vegetables and other types of packing boxes. Paper and pulp mills are busy. From other factories come musical instruments that must have the finest of wood in their construction for perfect tone and beauty. Furniture factories are continually endeavoring to meet the demands of the public for new and better furniture, and all about us we see the building industry flourishing. Each and every one of these industries are entirely dependent upon the preservation of the forests as a means of livelihood for their employees.

"I have been told that in the early days of America the Indians used to set fire to the timber to drive out the game that they might kill it for food and clothing. In that way the undergrowth was kept down and the fire would run along the ground, not burning the trees. This was probably a benefit to the forests. Today the conditions are different. A fire started most anywhere in the forest is disastrous. The loss is enormous. We are unable to estimate the amount of damage, but one fire may destroy as much as 10,000,000 feet of timber before it is brought under control. The immediate harm resulting from a fire of this kind is seen as soon as the smoke clears away, leaving blackened, barren hills, the scenery gone, conditions for holding streams ruined, disastrous havoc wrought through someone's carelessness.

"We owe it to ourselves and to the coming generation to do all we can to co-operate with the officials who have undertaken this splendid work of preserving our forests through educating the public in the prevention of forest fires.

POWER COMPANY HAS HIGHER PROFIT

SALEM, April 28. (UP)—California-Oregon Power company, with an operating profit of \$1,969,292.30, followed the trend of Oregon utilities to higher profits in 1935, its annual

report, filed with Public Utilities Commission, McCulloch today, showed.

No major operating utility filed a 1935 report so far has reported a drop in gross profit from the previous year. Copeco's increase was \$251,770.05.

On its merchandising and jobbing operations, however, Copeco reported a \$53,885.78 loss. Utilities generally have reported losses for this phase of their business in 1935.

The company paid \$1,022,540.14 interest on its bonded debt and reported a net profit

of \$496,877.35. Preferred stockholders were paid half dividends amounting to \$308,909.56, but common stockholders received no dividends.

The company listed expenditures of \$2717.98 for legislative expenses; \$2679.08, technical organizations; \$2150.55, chambers of commerce and \$925.44 to civic and community groups for 1935. The utilities commission has ruled that such expenditures may not be charged to operating expenses.

Copeco operates in several southern Oregon cities and Cal-

ifornia. About 60 per cent of the company's revenue was derived from its Oregon customers.

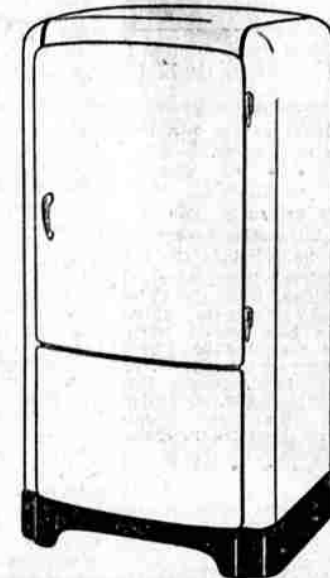
