Klamath Falls Selected For Home Economics Study

Klamath Falls has been chosen by the U. S. department of agriculture, bureau of home economics, as one of the many cities in the United States to be included in the nationwide study of family living conditions of native-born American families. A similar study is to be conducted in large, middle-size and small cities by the bureau of labor statistics of the U. S. department of labor. This is known as a study of consumer purchases.

The bureau of home economics regional headquarters for the Pacific area are located in Salem, Ore., with local headquarters in the city hall, Klamath Falls. T. Lester Johnson is local supervisor of this office. This study is made possible through funds assigned to the bureau by the WPA. In order to carry on the survey, a number of men and women are now being instructed for the purpose of collecting and tabulating the required information accurately and efficiently.

When the study starts on May 1, approximately ten workers will call on one-half of the families in Klamath Falls to request them to participate by giving information in regard to their expenditures of the past year, the ownership of certain durable goods, housing facilities, and other aspects of family living. Each field worker will be equipped with a government credential, and will work under instructions to keep strictly confidential all facts that he gathers. No family or individual names will appear in any publication or report. The reports will be identified by a number and not a name, since it is the information obtained and not the identity of the person who provides it which is of importance in this study. The data will not be used for any purpose other than statistical analyses and the bureau of home economics, and the staff in charge of the work believe that the study will be given hearty support when the purpose of it is understood by the family.

The maladjustment during the past five years between the nation's producing power and its actual consumption has stressed the importance of basic data on living conditions and needs of the population. The survey, which is being undertaken now will make such data available for the first time in American statistical history. There are increasing uses for such statistics in planning for commodity production and distribution, in household purchasing and consumption, in adjusting basic wage rates. The data given by the families, when collected and tabulated, are needed as a basis for wage and salary negotiations, as a means of estimating potential consumption requirements.

CONSPIRACY CHARGE FILED BY BLANAS

Suit has been filed in circuit court by Christ Blanas, alleging that as the result of a conspiracy he was ousted from direct control of the Arcade hotel, a corporation.

Blanas names the corporation, Nick Blanas, George Blanas, G. Q. D'Albini and Mary Lompropoulos as defendants.

In his complaint he charges that on April 14 the defendants conspired to bring about the transfer of 13 shares of stock to George Blanas, in order to remove Christ Blanas from active control.

He asks the court to set aside this stock transfer and to declare James Blair and Arthur Schupp as elected directors, instead of Mary Lompropoulos and Arthur Schupp, elected at the April 14 meeting.

Schupp is attorney for the plaintiff.
