to his government that a motorized column moving on Addis Ababa already has covered nearly two-thirds of the distance from Dessye to the Ethiopian capital.

An official communique on his report said:

"On the northern front, our motorized column which left Dessye advanced 140 kilometers (87 miles) along the motor road to Addis Ababa without encountering resistance.

"Another column, which left Dorra Ila advanced about 50 kilometers (31 miles) reaching the Uacht river.

"On the Somaliland front our victorious offensive is continuing.

"On the left of our line, the Libyan detachments which left Baggamedo defeated and dispersed strong enemy groups in the Pafan river valley.

"In the center, the Frusci column completed a reconnaissance of the terrain in the vicinity of Hamalid.

"The air corps cooperated with the greatest efficiency in actions along the entire front."

trip through eastern Oregon and apparently did some effective work. A campaigner who followed him closely arrived in Klamath Falls a day or two after Latourette's visit. He said that he heard Latourette talk throughout the eastern Oregon country. Latourette is the man who defeated Henry Semon for the speakership by one vote.

That, combined with the McCulloch candidacy, probably means he won't get a lot of votes in Klamath county. Not all that was done in opposition to Semon in the speakership contest was of the highest order of politics, although it may have been his supporters, rather than Latourette, who pulled the O. S. West hook on Semon.

Word from Portland has it that Ed Moore, former political writer for the Oregonian, is doing some time work in behalf of Dr. Wood, particularly in the Multnomah sector.

McCulloch has been getting favorable mention in the staunchly democratic Portland Journal, as well as in the Oregon Voter. Harry Bolvin has been doing some work for him around the state. Incidentally, Bolvin's lack of opposition in his own race freed him for the McCulloch campaign. It is understood McCulloch will be in the field himself this week.

On the republican side, its Ben P. Dorris of Eugene against Ralph Williams, for 28 years republican committeeman for Oregon.

Dorris has some strong upstate support. Here in the Klamath country the talk appears to be favorable for him. The same is reported from eastern Oregon. He ought to be strong around Eugene, his home bailiwick.

Williams is expected to show much strength around Portland. The selection of Senator Stewer as republican convention keynote is regarded as a feather in Williams' cap, and is said to have given him a campaign boost.

Nevertheless, the feeling toward Williams isn't any too promising in many sectors. It is understood he told Dorris that he would not run this year, and then went into the contest after Dorris, thus encouraged, had filed his candidacy. Dorris, a war veteran and an able citizen, decided to stay in and give Williams a fight for it.

Klamath continues to be visited by outside candidates.

There seems to be no end of aspirants for the republican nomination for congress from this district. Two more, Phil Yates, state senator from Wasco, and Rennie Tull of La Grande, were here Tuesday.

Yates is reported to have much strength in the mid-Columbia section. He has served in both the house and the senate. He is quiet, hard-working and well-informed. Yates lives at Wasco, and is a wheat farmer in Sherman county.

Clint Haight, the Blue Mountain Eagle publisher of Canyon City, was an interesting visitor here late Monday. Haight is running against Walter Pierce for the democratic nomination.

A strong Townsend, an able and colorful writer, Haight promises to give Walter a run for it. He makes none of the familiar claims about his campaign, admitting that he has tough opposition. But he says he's having a lot of fun, and it looks as if he will get a lot of votes.

The local candidates are running themselves ragged getting ready for meetings. Incidentally, after getting there they often find more candidates than audience present.

Sometimes meetings are scheduled for the same evening in widely separated parts of the county. The poor candidates, afraid they might lose an advantage by missing either meeting, burn up the roads to keep both dates. Recently two meetings were held on the same night and it is estimated not more than 20 persons, besides candidates, attended the two affairs.

Fleet Starts 'War Games' Under Blanket of Secrecy

SAN DIEGO, Calif., April 28, (UP)—One hundred thirty vessels of the United States fleet swung into precise columns at a pre-arranged rendezvous near San Clemente Island Monday as they headed south for the Panama canal zone and secret execution of their 1936 "war games."

Except for unofficial reports from bases touched in the Panama area, there will be no news of the maneuvers this year. When the battleships, aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers, submarines and training ships faded into the mists off San Diego and San Pedro early today, they also faded into obscurity for two months as far as exact knowledge of their movements is concerned.

While not imposing a definite ban, grey-bearded Admiral Joseph Mason Reeves, commander-in-chief of the fleet, imposed restrictions on news so drastic press associations and newspapers did not send reporters. The resulting secrecy is a goal of years for Reeves, whose attitude always has been that the "play war" should be just as heavily censored as a real one.

Admiral Reeves, directing battleship-cruiser divisions departing from San Pedro from the bridge of his flagship, the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, was starting the last great maneuver of his career. He will retire in June, to be succeeded by Vice Admiral Arthur J. Heppner, present commander of the scouting force.

450 Navy Planes

This year's maneuver, believed to be a continuation of last spring's "problem 16" in the Hawaii area, is known as "problem 17." The battle vessels and airplanes will operate in tropical waters with Panama as their focal point. Approximately 52,000 enlisted men and officers will be involved.

Four vessels carried a total of 450 fighting airplanes, whose part in the forthcoming six-week maneuvers is said to be the most vital yet assumed by aircraft in naval strategy.

Seventy speedy destroyers left their bases in San Diego harbor to follow the aircraft carriers to sea, trailed by six light cruisers. Submarines departed Friday.

The ships are scheduled to reach Panama May 12.

8. "Business should make intensive research study of the relationships that should be maintained with respects to production, wages, and hours of labor and the necessary methods and mechanics to be utilized in maintaining this balanced relationship."

9. "Business must recognize and apply its best endeavors to a fundamental educational program involving methods and efforts to get the states and subdivisions to re-assure their social responsibilities as soon as possible, to study economy in government and the prompting of self respect and mutual responsibility in the individuals, and in the groups and organizations of our citizens."

10. "Business should utilize every possible channel of approach that will result in most effective cooperation between business and government."

PWA BLOC DEMANDS EARMARKED FUNDS

WASHINGTON, April 28, (AP)—Members of the house PWA bloc laid their demands for earmarking \$700,000,000 of the \$1,500,000,000 relief fund before democratic leaders today and prepared to carry their request directly to President Roosevelt.

Representative Belter (D-N.Y.), head of the movement to provide money for continuing Secretary Ickes' public works administration said he felt "progress" was made at today's conference, no definite results were immediately evident, however.

Chairman Buchanan (D-Tex) of the appropriations committee remained firm in his stand of dividing up the billion and a half Mr. Roosevelt requested for Harry L. Hopkins' work progress administration.
