

WHEAT HAS UPWARD TREND AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, April 28. (AP)—Helped by purchases for milling account both here and at Kansas City, wheat tended upward today, sharply in contrast with yesterday's drive to lower levels.

General disinclination to take the selling side of wheat after yesterday's sudden setbacks of prices was manifest. Some reports today said crops in parts of the southwestern dry area were past redemption.

Wheat closed firm, at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 cent higher. May 88 1/2-90, July 87 1/4-89. Corn unchanged to 3/4 off, May 62 1/2-64, oats unchanged to 3/4 off, and provisions 7 to 35 cents down.

NEW YORK, April 28. (AP)—There were selective recoveries of fractions to two or more points in today's stock market, but many of the recent leaders again were in retreat.

Scattered rails and specialties gave the best performance, while the steels, motors and coppers were slow to rally. The close was irregular. Transfers were around 2,250,000 shares.

A sharp morning sell-off put the ticker tape several minutes behind floor transactions for a while.

There were intermittent declines and upturns, with the latter occurring on relatively small volumes.

The news picture was, on the whole, little changed. Sears Roebuck announced the company's sales from March 27 to April 23, were the best for this period in its history.

Among the better acting stocks were Douglas Aircraft, Johns Manville, Loew's, Northern Pacific, New York Central, Southern Pacific and Bell & Howland.

U. S. Steel and General Motors dropped about two points each at one time, but came back near the finish. Lazard shares included Bethlehem, National Steel, American Telephone, Case, Kennecott, International Nickel and Anaconda.

Bonds and Commodities were mixed. The dollar held to a narrow range in foreign currency dealings.

Moose Lodge Making Plans For State Convention

The Oregon convention of the Loyal Order of Moose which will take place in Klamath Falls Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 24, 25 and 26, promising to be one of the outstanding events held in Klamath Falls for some time, according to E. E. Benner, one of the committeemen in charge of arrangements.

"It will differ from many of the celebrations that have been held in this city in the past," Benner said. "The local Moose boys are going to see that the people of Klamath Falls and vicinity have a hand in the fun that is in store, and the merchants will not be asked for contributions to sponsor this activity."

"As part of their program, the Moose will hold drill contests, quartet contests, ball games and other interesting events, to which the Klamath Falls public will be invited, with no admission charges attached to them."

"It is stated that the local Moose boys have offered cash prizes of \$1,000 and five trophies in order to secure this year's state convention in this city. It is further stated that the finance committee of this convention will put up the entire outlay of cash without asking any contributions whatsoever from local business houses, excepting for small ads in their official program. The funds for the state convention will be raised through the channels of dances, card parties, etc."

"The anticipation of attendance to the Oregon convention has jumped considerably since word was received that a group of the national officers of the Moose lodge, including their Supreme Dictator and Director General, will be in this city for the three day meeting. It has also been learned that since the California state convention of the Moose will be held in San Diego this year, that an effort is being made to have the attendance of all the northern California lodges attend the Oregon meeting. This is being circulated not only through the local publicity committee, but by means of the national Moose magazine and with the aid of the national officers of the Moose."

"Plans for housing an exceptionally large number of visitors are being made at the present time, as the information received this early, indicates that many drill teams, ritualistic teams, quartets and musical bodies have sent in their registrations to compete for the prizes offered by Klamath Falls. This, along with the Californians and other members attending should boost the attendance way into the hundreds."

"Badges for visiting Moose will be made of pine wood for the local affair, instead of a silk ribbon that is usually found at state meetings. Every gesture possible will be made to let the visitors know Klamath Falls is the outstanding pine wood center."

Allen Here On Campaign Trip

"On my record as a public officer and on my record as a citizen and businessman I ask the support and vote of the democratic electorate of the state."

"I am a native Oregonian, born at La Grande, Oregon, in 1883, and have resided in the state practically all my life," said Allen.

"I believe in the principles of democracy and am 100 per cent for Roosevelt and his administration. If nominated and elected I pledge to the people of the state of Oregon an efficient and economical administration of the affairs of the treasurer's office with every courtesy and consideration for all and special favors to none."

"I have served the people of Pendleton as mayor; also the people of the 19th district as state senator and the people of Oregon as state liquor administrator, always endeavoring to fill these offices in a conscientious and efficient manner and on my record I ask your vote and support."
