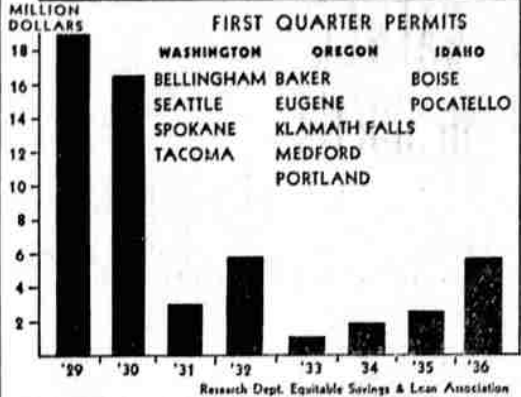

QUARTERLY SURVEY OF BUILDING CONSTRUCTION



Not only is building construction recovering rapidly in the northwest, but it is also reviving with increased momentum, it is revealed by the quarterly survey of construction in 11 key cities made by the research department of the Equitable Savings & Loan association for the forthcoming spring issue of Pacific Northwest Building Data.

Helped by a local increase of 67 per cent, construction in the three northwest states rose in the first quarter of this year to a level 130 per cent above the corresponding period of 1935 and 475 per cent above the first three months of 1933, the low year of the building depression.

Building permits in Klamath Falls increased from \$12,152 in the first quarter of 1935 to \$32,081 in the corresponding period of this year.

Evidence of an increase in the momentum of the revival is given by the fact that the 12-month gain of 29 per cent made in the first three months of 1935 increased to this year's 12-month gain of 130 per cent. First quarter building permits in the 11 key cities of Washington, Oregon and Idaho were \$975,768 in 1935, \$1,889,091 in 1934, \$2,437,448 in 1933 and \$5,608,425 in 1936. City building departments co-operated with the research department of the Equitable Savings & Loan association in making the survey.

The survey covers the following cities: Bellingham, Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma, Wash.; Baker, Eugene, Klamath Falls, Medford and Portland, Ore.; and Boise and Pocatello, Idaho.

GUILT ADMITTED IN INDIAN CASES

BIEBER, Calif.—Ned Bognuda was in town Monday adjusting Indian affairs in his principality of Little Valley, 16 miles south of Bieber.

After three Indians pleaded guilty to Bognuda's complaints that Roy McLeilan and Arthur Mullen stole a barrel of wine from his ranch and that Arthur Barnes concealed the stolen wine, Bognuda asked Justice W. B. Phillips to be lenient with them.

"They've all got wives and families," he said, "and I believe that another man put them up to the theft and is more guilty than they are. I also ask the court to dismiss charges against Arthur Mullen for taking a shot at two Western Pacific men and against Roy McLeilan for taking a shot at his wife Saturday morning."

Then Bognuda spoke to the Indians: "I hear that you, McLeilan and Mullen, have made threats of what you will do to me. I tell you now that if you try to harm me, you will get the worst of it."

The three Indians were sentenced to 60 days in jail.

Bognuda said that two railroad workers were shot at when they drove into the vicinity of an Indian camp on a recent night, and that McLeilan's wife fled to the Bognuda ranch house to ask protection from her husband. Bieber police officers were called to Little Valley and took charge of a rifle and some highpowered cartridges said to belong to Mullen. No shooting complaint was presented at the court session.

PORTLAND, April 29. (UP)—Police here revealed Tuesday they too are looking for Cecil W. McCollum, Spokane amateur flier unreported since early Monday after his takeoff from Spokane assumedly for Portland in a new plane.

Police hold a warrant for McCollum's arrest on a charge of issuing worthless checks, and bail has been set for \$500.
