

CANDIDATE ISSUES PLATFORM APPEAL

Datt Dunlea, who is running for the republican nomination for county clerk, issued his platform statement this week. His slogan is "Efficiency-Co-operation."

The statement, in part, follows: "I aim to conduct, subject to your will, your county clerk's office with discretion and good judgment in a business like manner."

"I am qualified to direct the activities of my deputies because I am familiar with business routine work, and business experience in bookkeeping."

"The fact alone of my services with the McDonald firm of Klamath Falls for such a long period should prove beyond a doubt that I must have stood the acid test of capability in this locality, to say nothing of my previous experience. People who know Joe McDonald personally, know he is an excellent employer who demands efficiency. I am prepared to give you the same efficiency I gave Joe McDonald and the public for 26 years."

"As an employer you should demand that your county clerk be not only efficient, but co-operative. I pledge myself to give: (1) Co-operation with the public. (2) Co-operation with my deputies. (3) Co-operation with officials with whom I come in contact."

"It shall be my policy to conduct the office in such a manner that the wealthiest or poorest man or woman may receive the same courteous treatment whether he be recording a \$50,000 deed or seeking a simple bit of information."

"Let us make this one point clear. I am not a politician. I am a business man who wants to run your county clerk's office in an efficient, co-operative and courteous way."

"I am not being backed by any particular group or organization—all that I want, and all that I solicit is a vote of confidence of the people of Klamath county, and I promise if elected to perform the duties of county clerk as set down in the Statute of Oregon Laws without favoritism to any person, organization or group in an efficient, harmonious, co-operative administration."

Transport Airplane Speed Record Falls

NEW ORLEANS, April 29. (UP)—Major James Doolittle landed a transport plane at Shushan airport at 7:19 p. m. Tuesday, five hours and 55 minutes out of Chicago, to break all speed

records between the two cities. The old transport record was 7 hours, 15 minutes.

He left Chicago at 1:24 p. m., flying a Lockheed Electra, 10-place plane. The trip was sponsored by the Chicago & Southern Air Lines. In addition to two pilots there were eight passengers aboard. Doolittle said weather was "putrid" with rain and strong headwinds most of the way.

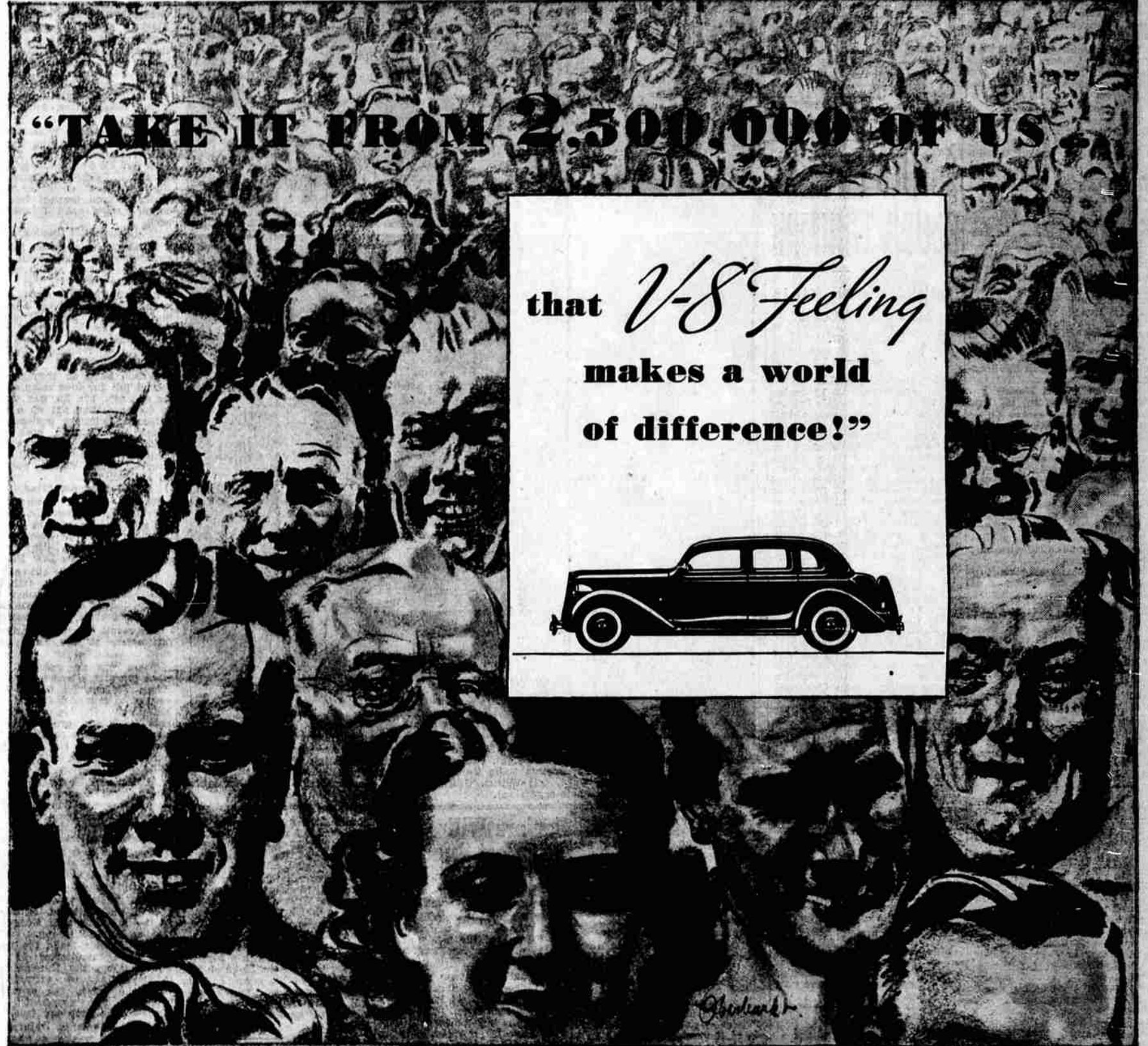

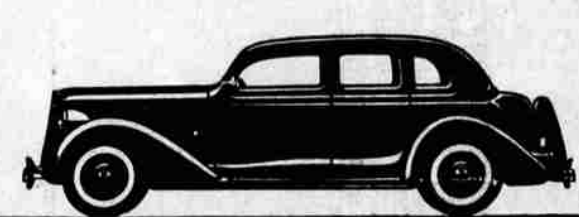
