

Eastern Clubs Score Victories in Majors

WEST UPHELD BY DETROIT

Tigers Take Lone Win From Washington, 8 to 1.

(By The Associated Press) The eastern teams are off to a good start in the campaign against their rivals from the west, where both major league pennants were won.

The first inter-sectional brush of the season over, the eastern clubs find themselves with five victories, against one for the clubs from the inland cities.

Detroit Downs Solons
The Detroit Tigers downed the Washington Senators 8-1 Tuesday—lone victory for the west.

In the National league the Pirates went down before the Philadelphia 9-7 and the Juvenile Reds were defeated 5-2 by the Boston Bees. In American league encounters, the Yankees shut out the Indians 2-0, the Red Sox beat the White Sox 11-8 and the Athletics defeated the Browns 4-2.

Three fine pitching performances were turned in with Charley Ruffing, the big Yankee flinger, topping the others with a four hit shutout over the Indians.

Harry Kelley, the 30-year-old rookie of the Athletics, let the Browns down with six singles and two runs. Lefty Joe Sullivan, making his first start of the season for the Tigers, held the Senators to eight hits.

Greenberg Hits Homer
Frank Greenberg got his first homer of the year as the Tigers lambasted two Washington twirlers. Goose Goslin also hit for the circuit.

Cy Blanton, sensational rookie of last season, was knocked from the box for the fourth time this season as the Phils downed the Bucs. He lasted only three and two-thirds innings. Old Tom Zachary started on the mound for the Phillies but was shelled from the mound after five and one-third innings.

The Red Sox murderer's row took kindly to the offerings of four Chicago pitchers getting 16 hits with Jimmie Fox hitting his fifth homer of the year. Billy Werber made one of the most sensational catches of the season when he ran down the stairs of the dugout and with one hand on the roof, speared a fly with the other.

Ray Benge, pitching for the Bees, held the Reds hitless for five innings. The Bees made 14 hits off the slants of Paul Derringer in eight innings.

Rain and wet grounds caused postponement of the Giants-Cards and Dodgers-Cubs games.

Freddie Steele Gains Victory Against Fisher

SEATTLE, April 29. (AP)—Freddie Steele, 157, Tacoma, introduced as ringside as "world's uncorrupted middleweight champion," lived up to the title last night with a convincing 10-round victory over Tony Fisher, 160, rugged Newark, N. J. fighter. And today Steele and his round manager, Dave Miller, awaited some indication from the Babe Risko camp as to when a title bout may be arranged. Steele whipped Risko in 19 rounds here recently. Risko is still on the coast.

Steele won every round last night, knocking down Fisher three times, the first trips to the canvas the Newark boy ever took. A sharp left to the jaw floored Fisher in the first, the easterner tumbling hurtling to a lashing attack. Steele kept up a lashing attack to the ribs in the second, and when Fisher lowered his guard in the third, Steele dropped him alongside the ropes with a thundering right to the chin. Tony was up after nine counts.

Fisher's main offensive flared in the fourth when he backed up Freddie with a left hook. But he soon retreated under a battery of rights to the ribs and heart.

The errors dropped the San Francisco Missions into fourth place behind Portland and robbed Walter Beck, hard luck Red hurler, of what should have been a well earned win. Seattle won the game which lasted almost until midnight 5-4 when Bill Lawrence tripled in the seventh, scoring Dick Gyselman who reached first on Clyde Beck's error.

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WILSON LOSES TO BELCASTRO

Pete Wins Grudge Match at Armory; Karasick Stops Kennaston.

Pete Belcastro, punching and kneeing his injured opponent, won an unpopular victory over George Wilson last night at the Klamath armory.

The result marked the second straight win scored by the junior heavyweight champion of the coast. Two weeks ago Belcastro gained a similar decision over the former University of Washington all-American football player.

Scowling George Wilson's football attack to win the opening fall in 11 minutes and 14 seconds was his own undoing. While smashing Belcastro around the ring with a series of flying blocks, Wilson crashed into the corner ropes and injured his neck.

Extra Rest Denied
Although he won the fall, he was forced to ask for an extra five minute rest period to recover from the hurt.

Belcastro, himself pretty groggy after the battering absorbed in the first 11 minutes, refused to grant the request and took full advantage of Wilson's condition the remainder of the match.

Wilson hung on through that second fall for four minutes and six seconds, but he was unable to do more than put up a weak defense. Belcastro centered his attack on Wilson's neck with headlocks. The headlocks were combined with kneeling and punching until Wilson was out on his feet.

Al Karasick Wins
Though Belcastro's manner of wrestling throughout the second fall appeared flagrant in the violation of whatever liberal rules govern wrestling, little protest came from Referee Ray Frisbie.

Wilson staggered out of his corner for the third fall and lasted but 40 seconds when the referee halted the match and gave the decision to Belcastro.

The result was particularly unsatisfactory to the large audience.

There was no question but what the match was a "grudge" affair. Wilson set out in dead earnest to square the count with Belcastro. He, too, used his fists freely and probably would have made things rough for Belcastro had not his neck been hurt near the end of the opening fall.

Al Karasick, veteran Russian Lion, scored a semi-windup victory over young Bob Kennaston, by winning the first fall with a Boston crab and the third with a reverse headlock.

Kennaston took his fall in the fourth with a droppick. The Lion's two falls came in the third and fifth rounds.

Some queer wrestling developed in the course of the match. In the fourth round, Kennaston tied up Al in the ropes. While Referee Frisbie made the situation more complicated by further tangling the Russian Lion in attempting to extract him from the ropes, the ex-marine peppered his opponent with blows to the body and face.

Prince Mihalkis, injured in Medford last week-end when he was knocked off a bicycle, lost to Dan Smith, Utah, in the opening match. While the prince put up a good fight despite his injury, Savich concentrated on the sprained left shoulder and elbow. After losing the first fall on a hammerlock, the prince was unable to continue.
