

TRAFFIC LAW WARNING GIVEN BY POLICE

Chief of Police Hamm issued official notice Tuesday that any further violations of traffic laws or ordinances will necessitate citation into police court. For the past week officers have been presenting courtesy tickets as a warning to traffic violators, but this practice is to be ended and official citations will be given and fines imposed from now on, according to the chief.

The following warnings and traffic rules have been reviewed by the chief as reminders for the motoring public:

Do not fail to give arm signal.

Do not park where the curbs are painted yellow.

No double parking at any time on the following streets without an operator in the car: Klamath avenue and Pine street between Fourth and Eleventh, inclusive, also all side streets from Fourth to Eleventh, inclusive.

No double parking at any time (day or night) on Main street between Second and Esplanade.

One (1) hour parking on Main street between Second and Esplanade, and all side streets between Klamath avenue and Pine street from Fourth to Eleventh, inclusive.

Two (2) hours parking on Klamath avenue and Pine street between Fourth and Eleventh, inclusive.

Do not park your car on the streets all night in lieu of a garage.

Do not park in alleys and do not block the entrance to alleys, driveways, park in front of the stores, hotels or within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.

Do not park against traffic at any time.

"It is not my wish to solve the traffic problems of Klamath Falls by having my officers make arrests," said the chief Tuesday. "but the situation is serious and demands action from my department to keep the streets clear for the safety of motorists, and I wish to ask the cooperation of all automobile drivers in obeying laws and ordinances."

PIONEER SOLDIER RETURNS TO POST

ALTURAS, Calif.—James B. Hickey, a sergeant in Troop C, 2nd Cavalry, U. S. army stationed at Fort Bidwell in 1884 to protect this new country from the savage Indian depredations returned to Fort Bidwell last week to receive the honors that North East Lodge No. 266, A. F. & A. M., wished to confer on him. On Saturday evening the lodge presented him with the Golden Button and Apron after being a Mason for 50 years. Hickey left Fort Bidwell in 1890 and for 35 years was letter carrier in the area around the Chronicle building in San Francisco. During all this time he retained his Fort Bidwell lodge membership, paying his dues as regularly as taxes. He had returned but once, last year, on a visit to his old home when his son brought him on a surprise visit. One son is employed in the custom house in San Francisco. Hickey is now retired on pension. He is 77 years old.

Malin Boy Official For FFA Sessions

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 29.—Neal Craig of Malin, senior in agricultural education at Oregon State college, has been appointed chairman of registration for the Oregon Future Farmers' of America convention to be held on the Oregon State campus April 30, May 1 and 2.

Craig will graduate in June and expects to be a Smith-Hughes agricultural instructor.

Approximately 400 Future Farmer delegates representing 43 Smith-Hughes departments of agriculture will register here Thursday for their eighth annual P. F. A. convention on this campus.

Highlights of the three-day convention will include state meetings, a banquet, public speaking and parliamentary contests, and demonstrations, radio broadcasts, officers' leadership school, athletic events, picture shows and various other affairs of particular interest to Future Farmers.

One of the main features of the convention will be the banquet program at which time Governor Charles H. Martin will present the State Farmer keys to the boys initiated by the Alumni State F. P. A. officers to the degree of State Farmer.

PLANS FOR SCHOOL ADDITION ORDERED

TULELAKE, April 29.—The Shastya county school board meeting Saturday afternoon voted to order plans drawn for the proposed three-room frame addition to the present high school building, so necessary for accommodation of the rapidly increasing enrollment.

Plans are to be drawn for approval by Starkes-Flanders, Sacramento architects, and tentatively call for a floor space 45 feet by 60 feet.

A Smith-Hughes instructor in agricultural subjects, who will also organize and teach band members will be added at the fall term of school, according to Superintendent Reiben, who attended Saturday's session here.

The new addition is to be financed by the county school board and arrangements on the addition will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

HATFIELD HIGHWAY HEAD TRANSFERRED

MERRILL, April 29.—Ed Probst, Klamath Falls, superintendent of construction on the Merrill-Hatfield stretch of state highway now under construction, has been called to Jordan Valley to supervise road work in that locality during the illness of Mr. Baker of Dunn and Baker, Klamath Falls, who has been confined to a Klamath Falls hospital.

Probst is succeeded here by Mr. Miller.

Grading on the roadbed on the 3.6 miles stretch that will eventually link The Dalles-California highway with the Alturas-Tulelake feeder road, completed last year, is being completed and hand sloping will follow in preparation for the crushed rock base.

The new road makes a wide arc, leaving The Dalles-California highway at the J. Frank Adams ranch east of Merrill and joining the California link at the Hatfield siding.

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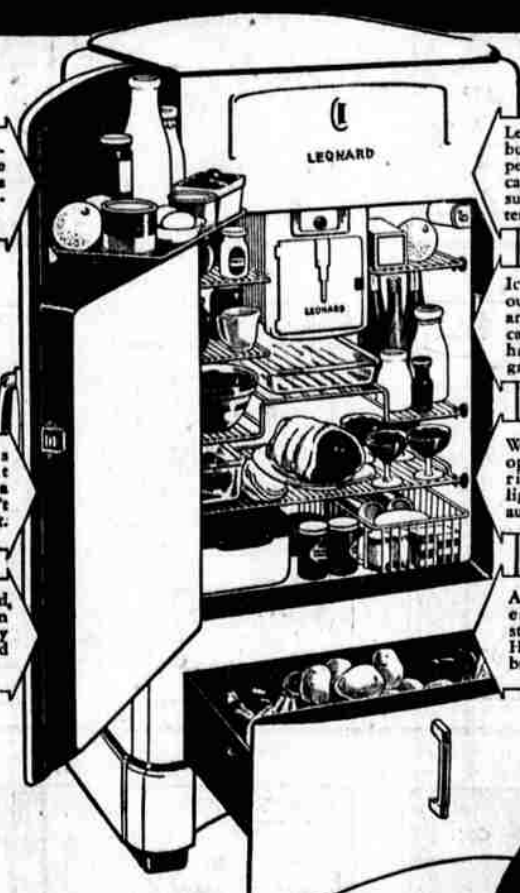
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
