Brevity Favored for Derby

Bond Venture, Ned Reigh, Grand Slam, Coldstream and Fighter Chief Threats.

LOUISVILLE, April 30.—Brevity appears a certainty to top-rove the field in the Kentucky Derby, May 2.

Joseph E. Widener stars' main opposition will come from Bold Venture, Ned Reigh—if he is right—Grand Slam, and possibly from the Milky Way Farm entry of The Fighter and Sangreal.

Coldstream is another which may make a fight of it. Some say that if some horse races Brevity eye to eye, the current pride of Elmdorff will be beaten, especially if some distance horse is behind. But name the sprinter that will do this trick, or the stayer which will come on!

Brevity has speed, even enough to match that of Tintagel. He can carry weight and apparently will go the distance without shortening up.

Tintagel is almost certainly a sprinter which will stop short of the distance.

Hollywood looks to me to be little better. His early class has been lacking.

The Fighter and Sangreal may go a mile and a quarter, but their races haven't been smashing enough to warrant the assumption they can beat Brevity, even as a team.

The Fighter has speed. So has Sangreal. But if they get out with Tintagel and Brevity, will they have anything left for the finish Brevity, Bold Venture, and Ned Reigh can make? If they lay off the pace Brevity may be in better front to catch. The teamwork of the Milky Way pair won the Texas Derby, but not by enough to hope for a repeat in the Kentucky affair.

Tintagel's dam was Heloise, dam of the sprinter Sergeant Blythe.

Hollywood has more speed blood in him than stayering. Bull Dog got in St. Bernard a colt that could go a distance, but not against the tops.

Derby shape than was St. Bernard a year ago, but both he and the Fighter will have to prove their distance ability before they can be rated as formidable over a route. The same is true of Sangreal, the dam of which, Haval, was pure speed blood.

Coldstream proved that he could slaughter St. Bernard, and his connections believe him a winner.

Grand Slam, always something of an enigma, should go well in mud, but his first outing on a fast track was none too impressive. Yet he is a shifty sort that surprises with a tremendous performance just when you least expect it.

Indian Broom is as speedy, or faster, than either Brevity or Tintagel. The son of Brooms-Kawita might be the thoroughbred to run those two and Coldstream into the dirt. Yet weight will stop a train, and the Canadian-owned horse will pick up 32 pounds more than he had in the saddle in his world record race at Tanforan. The 2000-mile journey won't do him any good, but if he is in top shape, the burden of 126 pounds still figures to cut him down to a conquering side.

Stretch one length farther now and assume that M. L. Schwartz's Bold Venture, apparently one of true high class,

has no better luck than he had in 1935, and you have Brevity in a class by himself. Bold Venture suffered all manner of ill fortune last year when he seemed to be the best juvenile of last year.

STAR INJURED; OUT FOR MONTH

Jack Burns Acquired From Browns to Fill Place for Tigers.

WASHINGTON, April 30. (AP)—Jack Burns, first baseman hastily acquired from the St. Louis Browns, will arrive today to fill the gap left in the lineup of the world champion Detroit Tigers by the injury of Hank Greenberg.

Mickey Cochrane, the Detroit manager, announced he expected Burns to arrive from Philadelphia, where the Browns are playing, in time to step into his star first-sacker's shoes in today's game.

Out For Month Faced by one of his toughest managerial problems—how to win ball games without the player or who was voted the most valuable in the American league last year—Cochrane disclosed that he traded Elton Hogssett, left-handed relief pitcher, and an unrevealed amount of cash for Burns last night.

Greenberg will be out of the lineup for at least a month with the wrist fracture he suffered in yesterday's game with the Washington Senators.

Admitting his team sustained a setback worse than a string of losses when Jake Powell, fleet Washington centerfielder, collided with Greenberg's outstretched arm, Cochrane added optimistically that the club's pitching and hitting would keep it near the top of the league.

Wrist in Cast Mickey said he was undecided whether to continue the combination of Marvin Owen at first base and English at third, or to recall Rudy York, who hit well with the Bengals in spring training, from the minor league to which he was farmed.

Owen, third sacker for the Tigers, was shifted to first after yesterday's accident, while English took his place at third.

Today Greenberg, the Tigers' clean-up hitter, was carrying his wrist in a plaster cast. It's the same wrist he hurt in the 1935 world series.

Yesterday's injury came at a time when Detroit had won five straight games and was fast moving toward top position. The team lost yesterday, 7 to 3.
