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rects. He described the physical plant, including 18 campuses in all parts of the state. He said that the institution has built up and maintained an able teaching staff.

Experiments Boost Income
Calling attention to experimental work under the system, he said that 335 experiments increased the income of the state \$10,000,000 annually at a cost of \$87,000.

"Is that good business?" he asked.

Accomplishments of the state college in the realm of science, the university of fine arts, and the medical college, were lauded by the chancellor.

Andrew M. Collier presided at the meeting. He first introduced Henry Remon, the retiring president, who made a short address. Remon emphasized the importance of making the chamber effective in solving the problem of all the interests of the county, and urged full support of the civic organization.

Murray Outlines Plans
President-elect Percy Murray made a short, vigorous talk on chamber objectives. He pointed out that agriculture has properly received more recognition in the chamber of commerce in recent years, but urged that next year a lumberman be made a member of the board of directors.

Murray called attention to government spending programs and the fact that the chamber of commerce is the agency upon which many have called, asking

TOWNSENDITES HEAR SPEAKER SUPPORT PLAN

The city library was packed with enthusiastic Townsendites Wednesday night to hear F. Ware speak on "The Townsend Plan—the Hope of the Nation." Ware was repeatedly cheered as he developed his theme.

After the address the club voted Albert Hill, vice president of the club, to be the outstanding member, and to represent this club at a convention, which in turn will choose the members of the national board of trustees.

The crowd welcomed the appearance of Clint Haight of Canyon city, who is a candidate for the nomination on the democratic party for the office of representative to congress from the Second Congressional district. Haight was one of the candidates endorsed by the district and state area boards, and is one of the outstanding candidates of the Townsend plan in eastern Oregon. He gave a short address, and the audience applauded vigorously every telling statement that he made. Among his remarks he declared that big business squanders millions of the people's money and nothing was done about it, but now, "when we donate 25 cents or a nickel or dime to do something for ourselves, congress appropriates \$50,000, and is now asking for another \$25,000, to investigate our nickels and dimes."

Dr. C. B. Cassell, member of the area board, said it was one of the best, and most enthusiastic meetings that Townsendites have ever held in Klamath Falls, and shows that Townsendism has only been going through a cleansing fire, from which it will emerge stronger than ever in its fight for righteousness in economics.

After the meeting the joint committee met to lay plans for the big Townsend rally to be held in Moore park Sunday afternoon, May 10. Tonight Club No. 2 meets at Mills school, and promises a very special program. Next Thursday, May 7, Club No. 1 will hold its regular meeting, at which time Judge Jeffries and Theodore G. Nelson, candidates for the office of United States senator on the democratic and republican parties respectively, will speak. These men, like Haight, were the ones who received the endorsement of the district and state area boards. The public is invited to all of these meetings.

Few Demands Made for Irrigation

Although the official opening of the irrigation season is scheduled for May first, very few demands for water are expected from farmers of the Klamath project, according to reclamation officials.

Small amounts of water were turned into the government canal systems last week, in order to prepare them for opening of the irrigation season should a large head of water be needed.

Some deliveries are being made to lessees in the Tulelake districts, and a few homesteaders are in need of irrigation water, but on the whole lands are sufficiently wet from the recent general showers which have fallen in the Klamath basin.

The British legation, to which Americans in the capital turned for protection, is situated in the hills on the eastern outskirts of the city, and has elaborate underground protection for foreigners.

The American legation, situated on a hillside on the opposite side of the city from the other legations, is dangerously close to the postoffice and one of the three Ethiopian radio stations.

About 30 Americans remained in Addis Ababa, most of them missionaries. Many Americans decided some time ago to seek refuge in the British legation if it became necessary.

The American legation residence was closed from last August until early last month, when the wife and two small children of Cornelius Van H. Engert, minister-resident and consul-general, arrived from Cairo.

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fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$100, or a jail sentence of not more than 60 days, or both fine and imprisonment.

This portion of the ordinance was drawn up for the benefit of gardeners, and to allow young plants to grow without danger of bone-burying activities around their tender young roots.
