

LAVA BEDS ROAD STATUS STUDIED

MERRILL, April 30.—Condition of the 2 1/2-mile stretch of road in the Lava Beds national monument between the gravel pit and Mammoth Crater on the southern edge of the area was considered by the Service club at Tuesday's session, and Wilson Leo, secretary, was authorized to make application to park officials for a repair program. With the exception of this stretch, roads in the monument are in excellent shape. The 2 1/2-mile length is part of the main road to Medicine lake.

Warren Fruta announced that in the near future a meeting is scheduled to be held in Merrill in observance of Game and Forest Conservation week. The session is sponsored jointly by the American Legion post and the Service club. Fruta also resigned as a member of the central committee for the third annual potato festival to be held next fall. Tom Laird was appointed to succeed him.

Resolutions were authorized by the members to be presented to the city council in an effort to check reckless driving within the city limits. Attention was called to the fact that a number of near accidents have occurred recently in Merrill and it was held desirable that the speed on the highway be reduced.

Possibility of highway signs being placed near the new school building was mentioned as one possible way of controlling the situation since the state laws suggest that motorists drive no faster than 15 miles an hour in a school zone.

All members of the Klamath county court will be guests of the club next Tuesday, and a large attendance is hoped for. Tom Chaburn will preside. Good roads will be the topic of discussion.
