

RELIEF EMPLOYEES OFFER PETITION

Sixty women, employees of the WPA sewing project here, visited the county courtroom in a body Friday, pleading that something be done to revive the project so that they can earn enough money to take care of themselves and their dependents.

The sewing project closed down again Thursday night. It was closed a fortnight ago, but was re-opened at that time.

Phyllis Hartzog, county relief director, and members of the court discussed the situation with the women, and declared they would do all in their power to get the WPA authorities to start the project again.

"This is the most serious unemployment problem we have here at this time," said Miss Hartzog, after the conference. "These women are all in need of the help, but it is doubtful if many of them can find anything to do elsewhere. They are hard workers, their attitude is good, and they are doing practical, useful labor, and their earnings are wisely spent. It looks as if most of them will be on relief if the sewing project cannot be reopened."

Messages will be sent immediately to WPA authorities at Medford and Portland, urging action on the women's plea. The local officials are unable to do anything else to re-open the project, as the control is held elsewhere.

The flag will fly beneath the Stars and Stripes on the courthouse pole.

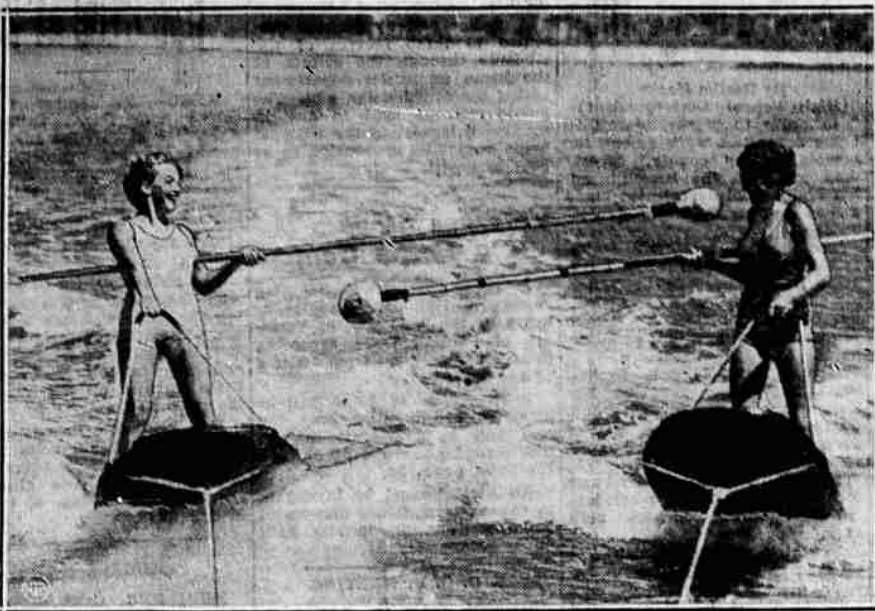

ent, not including the real estate.

Enrollment in city schools increased from 928 students in 1923 to 2747 in 1930. In 1923 there were only 30 teachers in the system, and this number was increased to 86 in 1930.

Present enrollment totals 2494, with 80 teachers, according to Collier.

In 1932, the speaker continued, the new board which went into office was forced to cut the budget, and the school system is still operating on a budget reduced 25 per cent.

The budget savings have been made by acquiring blanket insurance, by shortening the school year, reducing salaries, by plac-

ing school cafeterias on self supporting bases, and by obtaining federal money through the PWA and WPA for repair work.

Of the total of \$698,500 issued in bonds by the district since its establishment in 1906, \$507,000 are still outstanding, but definite plans of repayment are in effect, at a saving to taxpayers, according to the speaker.

School facilities appear to be adequate for a number of years to come, Collier continued, and construction of schools in outlying districts, Fairhaven, Shasta, and Altamont have materially aided in carrying increased enrollment, relieving congestion in city schools.

Special music for the Rotary club was presented by the grade school glee club, under the direction of Miss Lillie Darby, and an interesting talk on the Oregon flag was given by J. Percy Wells, superintendent of city schools.

Dale Hunsaker presented a brief talk on business week during the luncheon hour.
