

WEATHER FACTS REVEAL APRIL ABOVE NORMAL

Both precipitation and temperatures during April were above average for the month, according to U. S. weather bureau figures.

Total rainfall was 1.27 inches, or .37 above normal, while the mean temperature for the month was 49.5, or 3.1 degrees above normal.

Elevation of Upper Klamath lake was slightly higher on April 30 of this year than on the same date in 1935. The reading this year was 4142.96 feet and on the same date last year it was 4142.85.

The mean maximum temperature for April was 63 degrees, and the mean minimum 36. The maximum for the month was 82 degrees on the fifteenth, and the minimum was 16 degrees above zero, recorded on the first day of the month.

There were 13 clear days in the month, 13 partially cloudy, and 4 entirely cloudy.

Three Youths Arrested For Store Robbery

A juvenile "crime ring" was broken up and a string of burglaries which has plagued the Chillicothe vicinity during recent weeks was believed solved Thursday night with the arrest of two young Indians and a white boy in the wilderness back of Chillicothe.

The arrests were made by Sheriff Lloyd Low, with the aid of his deputies and Indian officers, who tracked the alleged burglars from the Elliott store at Klamath Agency to their mountain hide-out.

The Elliott store was robbed about midnight Wednesday. The burglars broke a window to enter, after first trying unsuccessfully to go in through a locked and barred door. A quantity of guns, knives, ammunition, fishing tackle and harmonicas was taken, as well as \$5.50 in cash from the post office and \$2.50 from a store till.

Thursday morning the investigating officers found a spot about a half-mile from the store where three horses had been tethered. They followed the horse tracks, clearly evident in the rain-soaked ground, 15 miles across country, first to the place where the alleged robbers had hidden their loot and then to the point where the horses had been unaddled and turned to pasture.

Soon after, they discovered the three youths, a white boy 14 years old, and two Indians, 15 and 18.

The two youngest admitted the thefts, returned the cash taken from the Elliott store, and showed the officers where they had buried flashlights, guns, ammunition and merchandise taken recently from the Bert Albert garage and the Table Supply company in Chillicothe. The oldest boy refused to admit guilt.

All three are also suspected in a residence burglary at Chillicothe and in a minor robbery at the Forest Lumber company plant at Pine Ridge.

Sheriff Low brought the two youngsters to the county jail here Thursday night, leaving the 18-year-old youth at Chillicothe.

Low estimated the value of the merchandise taken from the Elliott store at over \$100, exclusive of the cash haul.

Lumber Company Ready for Work

BIEDER, Calif. — Long-Bell Lumber company is preparing to start work next week logging 50 or 60 million feet of timber about 25 miles northwest of here, contracted from the Red River Lumber company. The logs will be shipped by rail to the Long-Bell mill at Weed for sawing.

Big Valley mills of the Associated Box company, Caldwell Creek Lumber company and Davis Creek Lumber company are expected to start their 1936 lumber-sawing before the middle of May unless unseasonable wet weather delays logging operations.
