

FOUR-H EVENTS SCHEDULED FOR MAY 9TH FAIR

Demonstration contest will be a feature of the 4-H club fair and Achievement Day program to be at the fairgrounds and the Altamont school on May 9, according to Clifford Jenkins, county club agent.

The demonstration contest will begin at 1:00 p. m. in the Altamont school. Two members of a standard 4-H club are selected by their club members to put on this demonstration of some phase of their club work during the year. Twenty-two different clubs have sent in entries for demonstration teams in clothing, cooking, room improvement, forestry, and 4-H builders projects. The teams have been working for some time preparing their demonstrations for this contest and looking forward with keen interest so they may be the team selected for the honor of representing their division of club work at the state demonstration contest at the state fair next fall.

Some very clever and original ideas are being incorporated in the demonstrations, even a puppet show being planned by one demonstration team in room improvement. The demonstration contest should be of interest to parents and teachers as well as the pupils themselves, and anyone is invited to attend the contest. Accord Ends Threat Of Coal Mine Strike

NEW YORK, May 1. (UP) Strike of 100,000 anthracite miners in eastern Pennsylvania was thwarted Thursday when miners and operators agreed to continue present contracts until a new agreement is reached.

The announcement was made less than two hours after Assistant Secretary of Labor Edward F. McGrady arrived from Washington to attempt to work out a compromise and prevent the walkout, scheduled for midnight.

Both sides agreed to continue negotiations until a new contract is written.

Girl Loses in Try At Altitude Mark

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla., May 1. (UP)—An attempt by Annette Gipsen of New York to

break the national women's altitude record for light planes ended in apparent failure Thursday.

Descending at municipal airport at 6:14 p. m., EST, after a flight of an hour and 59 minutes, the pretty, brunette flier said her own instruments showed she reached an altitude of 10,300 feet, considerably short of the record of 18,097 feet.

Her exact altitude will not be known, however, until the sealed, official instruments she carried in her trim, 90 horsepower monoplane, are examined in Washington.
