Klamath Schedule Criticized

Lakeview Paper Scolds Pelicans for Entering Meet With Bend Rather Than Alturas. Schedule Difficulties Not Realized.

The following editorial comment appeared in the Lake County Tribune:

"As a spectator from Oregon at the Alturas 20-30 club relay meet it was not pleasant to hear adverse comment given Klamath Falls high by spectators and participants for failure to enter a team.

"The competition was keen and probably Klamath high would not have won the meet, but its track team would have at least won friends for its school and community. Klamath high and the Klamath 20-30 club have been struggling to build up an annual meet on the second Saturday in May each year that will compare favorably with the Alturas 20-30 relays. The meet Saturday 4-7 was due to the fact that the Alturas team makes an entry at other town's meets.

"KNX newspaper of the air and Sam Hayes, the Richfield Reporter, both gave the meet much publicity Friday night. A thousand fans cheered the dozen teams gathered from Nevada, Oregon and California in one of the most successful relays ever held."

In this section of Oregon the track season is comparatively short. Meets must be jammed into weekends, over a period of about a month. Naturally, there is going to be some conflict in schedules.

It is obvious no school can compete in every meet.

While Klamath in years past has sent teams to the Alturas meet, this year it was decided to schedule Bend in a dual event. Bend is a regular and natural opponent for the Pelicans. The two schools exchange football, basketball and tennis schedules—why not track?

It would appear quite in order that Klamath high should meet a major Oregon rival rather than enter a California event.

However, Klamath did want to go to Alturas. But it couldn't send a team north and another south.

Such a condition should be recognized by the Lakeview critic. Alturas hasn't done any shouting because Klamath was unable to attend it's meet, and its very likely Alturas would rather do its own talking than have it done by even such a well-intentioned neighbor as the Tribune.

Either way the Pelicans probably were in for it. If the team had gone to Alturas, no doubt there would have been a similar kickback from Bend.

Most schools know and appreciate these schedule difficulties. Despite Lakeview's attitude, Alturas high probably is sufficiently understanding on its own accord to come to the Southern Oregon-Northern California meet here without any hard feelings against Klamath for an obviously unavoidable conflict in track dates.

Just as a guess, it appears someone in Lakeview had another ax to grind and got the Tribune to do the work.

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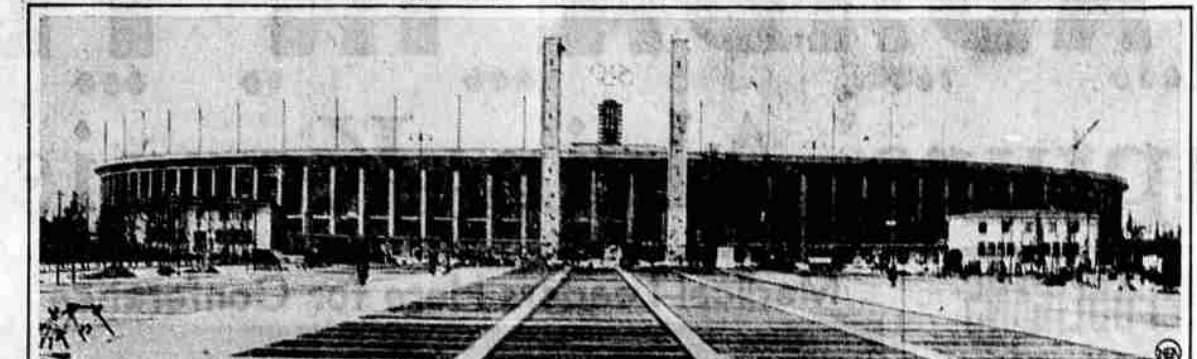
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OLYMPIC ATHLETIC STARS WILL SHINE HERE

GROVE HURLING IN RARE FORM

Veteran Finds Pitching Cunning of Years Gone By

That gaudy old man from Maryland, 35-year-old Robert Moses Grove, is being discovered again. The boys are dusting off all the old superlatives for him, unused since the last time they discovered him. They are talking about how fast he is, and how much wiser.

The figures may be a little too cold to speak about Mr. Grove's wisdom. He has pitched 33 1-3 innings for the Red Sox and he has given exactly one earned run. He has given 21 hits in four games, all of which he won. He beat the Cleveland Indians Friday, giving up seven hits, walked not a single man and fanned nine.

Dizzy Hurler Well

While they were beating the Indians, 6-0, the Red Sox, moreover, were getting 10 hits. This was a particularly poor day at bat for the team. Starting last Tuesday, they have hit 16, 13, 18 and 10, for an average of 14 1/4, so it is little wonder that the Red Sox are on top of the pile.

The day was one on which nearly every game was featured by a fine pitching performance. Dizzy Dean pitched three-hit ball as the Cardinals slugged out a 12-0 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers; Johnny Broaca, finishing his first game in four starts, held the Chicago White Sox to seven hits as the Yankees won 3-2; and Jimmy Doherty of the Senators pitched five-hit ball as Washington walloped the Browns 7-1.

Bees Beat Pirates

Wayne Osborne turned in seven innings of high class hurling as the Boston Bees defeated the Pirates 6-4. Lee Grison, left-hander making his first start for the Reds, pitched Cincinnati to a 4-3 win over the Phillies. Eldon Auker of the Detroit Tigers, won his own ball game when he singled in the sixth to score the winning run in a 4-3 victory over the Athletics and pitched eight-hit ball to boot.

Senators Play Flashy Ball to Defeat Champions

By The Associated Press To President Wilbur Tuttle the Sacramento Senators may be "the bushiest club" that ever was in the Pacific Coast league but alongside the champion San Francisco Seals they look like major leaguers.

Nobly assisted by six Seal errors, the western link of the St. Louis Cardinals' chain strangled the Seals 11-7 Friday night and climbed over the San Francisco club into fifth place in the league standings.

This left the Seattle Indians, back in second place by virtue of a 7-5 win over the San Francisco Seals, the only outfit among the leading five that is not being piloted by a new manager.

In sharp contrast was the smart baseball played in Portland where San Diego lost 1-0. The only run scored was on John Frederick's gap fly swat. Aside from that his left-handed Edwin Wells parried out only three singles to the Beavers. George Caster allowed the Padres seven. The Senators reached little Kenny Sheehan for 15 hits, but five of their runs were gifts from the San Francisco infield which couldn't control the ball. Six Sacramento runs came in a hectic ninth inning, climaxed by Frank Morehouse's home run and started with a single by Art Garibaldi, former Seal who got two hits, made three runs, stole a base and figured in two double plays.

Joe Marty matted in five San Francisco runs with a four bagger and three singles. Ken Douglas, another southpaw, hurled Oakland to a 4-2 win over the last place Los Angeles club. He allowed seven scattered hits, including a circuit drive by Donald Hurst. The league leaders made their runs out of total of six hits.

Two Mission errors, a walk and a double steal gave the Indians their seven runs on five hits. Don Osborn, Tribe hurler, started Seattle on a five run sixth inning rally when he lifted over the fence. Joe Sprinz of the Reds and Art Hunt of the Indians also homed.

On May 17 the newly organized Crater Lake league, featuring six teams, will play its first regularly scheduled contest.

The Southern Oregon league, reorganized this season, will be started off in Klamath Falls with a game between the Klamath Red Sox and the Klamath Pelicans. Both are listed as powerful contenders for the championship.

In the other contest Glendale will meet Grants Pass. This game is scheduled for Grants Pass.

Opening games in the Basin league have not yet been announced.

The Crater Lake loop will meet on Monday night at the Bowlers Garden to draw up the roster of contests. The team will play a 15-game schedule.

Terry, Ferrell Top Averages in Big Leagues

NEW YORK, May 2. (AP)—Bill Terry, New York Giants, .429 and Rick Ferrell, Boston Red Sox, whose teams are topping the National and American leagues, respectively, today are sitting on top of the major league batting averages.

Terry's percentage of .520 is high above Ferrell's .429 but Ferrell has had more chances to miss than Colonel Bill. The youngster has been at bat 57 times, while Bill, given to sitting in the dugout in respect to a pair of aging knees, has only been up there swinging 23 times.

Ferrell replaced Charley Gerbringer of the Tigers at the head of the American league list during the week, but Charley is still in the runner-up position, 20 points back of Rick with a mark of .419.

As far as long distance hitting is concerned, the American league leaders hold a slight advantage. Jimmie Fox, Red Sox, and Hal Trosky, Indians, are topping both leagues with a five each, while Chuck Klein of the Cubs and Mel Ott of the Giants are next with four.

Sox, Pelicans In Contests This Weekend

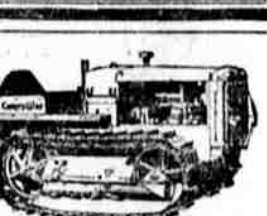
Klamath's two entries in the Southern Oregon league will windup their pre-season schedule Sunday before entering the regular season of competition.
