

UNDERWOOD IN BUSINESS HERE OVER 30 YEARS

Clarence F. Underwood has just joined the list of business men who have been actively in business in Klamath Falls for 30 years or more, the original Underwood's Pharmacy having been established here in the spring of 1906.

The original location, shown in the picture on this page, was just across Seventh street from the present location of the store. It was a small frame building, about 25x50 feet in size, and had been built by Dr. Masterton as an office. When this building was leased by young Clarence Underwood for a drug store, Dr. Masterton moved his office into his residence, which was located just behind the store building. The first firm name was Newsom & Underwood, and it so appears in the advertisements in the papers at that time. The firm was an advertiser from the beginning.

The store was established in the spring of 1906. Two years later, in the spring of 1908, it was moved to its present location, the present building being built new at that time.

The original location of the store was later bought by Clarence Underwood, held a few years and sold at a sufficient profit to enable him to buy the present Underwood building, where the store has been located since 1908. It is quite an advance over the first store, as may be seen from the accompanying picture.

Clarence Underwood attended Albany college in 1904 and 1905, and played football on the same Albany college team with Sam Dolan, later an All-American at Notre Dame and one of the famous football figures at that time. Dolan played right tackle on the Albany college team and Clarence Underwood played right end.

Underwood was induced to come to Klamath Falls by his wife's father, Hiram Chamberlain, who had erected several buildings here and was sending on glowing accounts of the town's future. These sales talks were more than young Underwood could resist, so he came on to look the town over for himself.

He was so well satisfied with what he found that he lost no time in getting located.

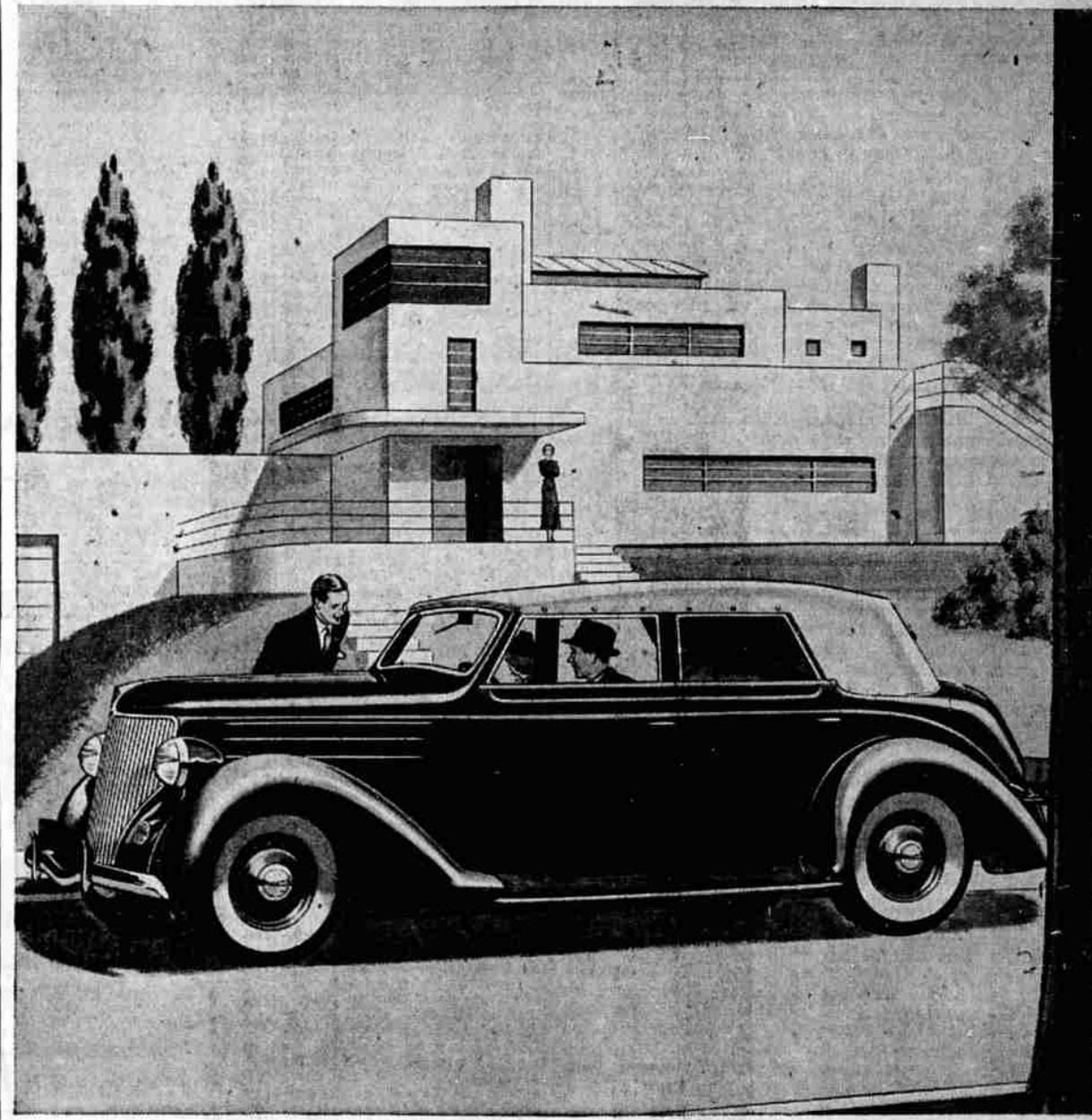
