Records May Fall At State Track Tourney

CORVALLIS, May 5. (AP)—A new burst of record-making is in prospect for the state high school track and field meet here May 15-16 if teams keep up their early season performances.

Reports from a number of schools indicated they will produce athletes who will keep up the tradition of the past eight years—a new set of records for each meet.

Since the competition was started in 1927 every record made in the initial contest has been broken. Only one record has lasted six years—the javelin mark of 201 feet 5 1/2 inches set by Warren Demaris, of Prineville.

Carl Hubbell Fails to Get Support From Giants

The New York Giants batsmen should hang their heads when Carl Hubbell comes along for they have been letting him down in shameful fashion.

In the last 25 innings the ace flinger has worked on the mound. The Giants have given him exactly one run to play with. That isn't much of a lead in any ball game even behind Hubbell, who won 23 while losing 12 last year.

Hubbell pitched four-hit ball Monday but the Giants failed to score a single run and went down 1-0 before the Cincinnati Reds. In his previous start, Hubbell went 17 innings against the Cardinals but lost 2-1 when his mates failed to fathom the slants of Leroy Parmelee. Hubbell won his first two games of the season.

Rain Halts Schedule

Only one of the four hits against Hubbell was an extra base blow but it subsequently spelled defeat. Kiki Cuyler opened the ninth inning with a triple. Sammy Byrd hoisted a fly to Mel Ott in right field and Cuyler raced home with the winning run, sliding into Gus Mancuso to beat Ott's throw to the plate.

The Giants managed to collect eight hits off Elbert Stine, 23-year-old rookie but it was the old story of failing to hit with a run in sight. Stine did not issue a single pass.

Rain played havoc with the schedule and only one other National league and one American league game were played.

SOX TO DEFEND LEAGUE TITLE

Two New Teams Make Bow Sunday in Southern Oregon Loop.

Two new teams will make their bow to baseball fans Sunday when the 1936 Southern Oregon league pennant race gets under way with last year's champion Klamath Falls Red Sox meeting the Klamath Falls Pelicans at Modoc field, and Grants Pass playing host to Glendale, entered in the circuit for the first time.

Only the Red Sox and Grants Pass remain from the setup last year which included Ashland and Medford. Faced with financial difficulties, the latter two clubs were unable to enter teams this year, and in their place was voted Glendale and the Klamath Falls Pelicans.

Same Club Offered

At Klamath Falls, lair of the pennant winning Red Sox, genial Al Dollard will present practically the same club that overcame Grants Pass in the closing weeks last season to finally win the bunting after a sensational three game series. The only major change in the Sox lineup will be the addition of Hammerickson, tiny left-handed center-fielder who was with the Merchants last year.

ROSEBURG, May 5. (AP)—The biggest worry of youthful baseball enthusiasts was over today for the American Legion Junior team all because Larry French, southpaw hurler of the Chicago Cubs, kept a promise made last fall.

French told the boys he would see they had baseballs to play with and a shipment arrived over the week-end. They are balls ruffed in practice by big league players but far better than the youngsters have had.

Champions from last year, the Pelicans were deep in preparation in hope of retaining their title. Because of their showing at Grants Pass in winning the district honors, the team was expected to take the lead here Saturday.

While there is no question that in a dual meet with any one entry the Pelicans would come out in front, there was considerable doubt if the team could match the combined strength of the 5 schools already in the lists.

With each rival offering strong individual competition, the Pelicans will have valuable points all through the meet. If the smaller schools can knock Klamath out of sufficient places, such strong opponents as Bend, Grants Pass and Alturas will have a greater opportunity of overhauling the Pelicans.

Klamath scored 46 points a year ago to take first place. Bend was second with 38. Alturas third with 15. Dorris fourth with 14 and Grants Pass fifth with 11.
