FORT KLAMATH
BURGLAR TAKEN
BY SHERIFF

Another small-time burglary was solved Tuesday night and another step taken in the clean-up of minor thefts throughout the county with the arrest of Roy Coleman, 25, who admitted stealing a quantity of merchandise and personal property from the Castel and Uiter store at Fort Klamath Monday night.

Coleman was arrested by Sheriff Lloyd Low and his aides at a mountain cabin seven miles north of Chiloquin, where he had sought refuge Tuesday after a night spent in frantically trying to dispose of his loot and conceal evidence which might lead to his capture.

Pipe Leads to Arrest
It was an old pipe, principally, which gave Coleman away. The pipe slipped from Coleman's shirt pocket as he crawled head first through a transom window to enter the Fort Klamath store, and it was found by the proprietors Tuesday morning when they opened for business.

The investigating officers found a man who had played pool with the speaker of the same pipe Monday afternoon and from him they obtained a description of Coleman. From others they learned that Coleman had been seen in company with a woodcutter and that the woodcutter owned a cabin north of Chiloquin on Spring creek. Then the hunt was simple.

Suspect Confesses
Under questioning of the authorities, Coleman soon confessed to the burglary. He told how he had piled the loot in Castel and Uiter's pick-up truck, then driven the car over towards Chiloquin and hidden the stolen goods on Baking Powder hill.

From there, Coleman said, he drove to Klamath Falls and abandoned the car on High street near the canal. He caught an early morning freight and dropped off the train as it passed near his friend's cabin north of Chiloquin.

When Coleman showed Sheriff Low the spot where he claimed to have hidden his booty, the major part of it was gone. The officer found tracks of a second automobile nearby and judged that someone who had seen Coleman make his cache, had later investigated and appropriated it.

Frightened by Dog
In addition to the articles from the store, Coleman also admitted taking a bicycle belonging to Tony Castel, Jr., and some clothing from a nearby clothesline. The bicycle he hid

in a grainfield and the clothes under a bridge on Wood river. He had intended to stop for the clothes as he drove off in the pick-up, Coleman said, but sight of a big, barking dog frightened him out of the notion.

Coleman was in the county jail here Tuesday night.

MANY TO VISIT
CITY ON JULY 4

Several thousand visitors are expected in Klamath Falls during the Fourth of July holiday, according to the publicity committee of the local American Legion post, which has chosen the slogan, "Klamath Basin Celebration," for the big event.

Approximately 30 newspapers in northern California, as well as eastern and southern Oregon towns are carrying advertising for this celebration, which is expected to be the largest ever held in this part of the state.

Contract for decorating the city for the celebration has been let to the Kamm Advertising company of Portland. Plans call for complete coverage of the city with elaborate decorations, and huge banners will wave "welcome" to visitors to Klamath Falls.

The feature of the celebration which is to be the largest ever held here, and plans call for construction of a new grandstand at the fair grounds in order to afford sufficient seating capacity for all visitors, as well as residents of the Klamath Basin itself.

Retention of Lower
Lumber Rate Urged

PORTLAND, May 6. (UP)—The traffic committee of the West Coast Lumbermen's association Tuesday urged transcontinental railroads to reconsider recent announcement of a 75 cents per hundred pounds freight rate to replace the trial rate of 72 cents on west coast lumber shipped to points east of Chicago.

The lines were asked to act toward holding and increasing the volume and income gains made on basis of the 72-cent rate.

LISTOE ANNOUNCES
CAMPAIGN PLANKS

A. C. Listoe announced his platform for the republican nomination for county commissioner Wednesday.

It follows:
"In seeking the republican nomination for county commissioner of Klamath county, I am not backed by the financial clique of Klamath Falls, but was urged to run by friends from all parts of the county, who know I stand against graft and special privileges and that I am not afraid to fight."

"If elected, my platform will be: Honesty, Efficiency and 100 per cent square deal to everyone, with absolutely no favorites, no special privileges."

"All rebates, commissions, discounts, etc., on all trucks, machinery and all other items purchased by the county, shall be

paid into the county treasury. "To treat courteously and fairly every person and suggestion brought to me, by any and all persons in the county."

"To demand economy and efficiency of the highest order of all county employees coming under the jurisdiction of the county court."

"I believe the county court officials are and should be the servants and not the dictators of the people of Klamath county."

"I am strongly in favor of good roads and believe the residents in all districts are equally entitled to them."

"I am in favor of proper road working equipment being distributed in various convenient locations in the county, so as to be available in each district at the proper time. The wear and tear and cost of transportation of tools and machinery from one widely separated section of the county to another, will very soon pay for the extra equipment."

"I shall always use every effort, within my power, to reduce taxes to the lowest possible level, consistent with efficiency and good business."

"Living in Klamath Falls, there will be no travel cost at 7 cents per mile each way, to add to the taxpayer's burden."

"I am in favor of the publication of a detailed statement, with the proper signatures, of all county expenditures and not a blanket statement, as has been the custom."

"All meetings of the county court to be open to the public at any and all times."

Wives, mothers and invited guests of Elks will go to the temple at 9 o'clock, when the Mother's day event starts. This will follow a short closed business session of the lodge.

A number of special features are being planned by the committee in charge. Dr. Paul Sharp, exalted ruler of the lodge, urged a full attendance, and particularly urged members who can do so to bring their mothers to the program.
