

FIGURES SHOW MORE PERSONS FARMING HERE

Approximately 700 more people are living on farms in Klamath county now than were in 1930, according to statistics announced this week by the department of commerce census bureau at Washington.

On April 1, 1930, there were 6194 persons living on Klamath county farms. The total on January 1, 1935, is given at 6900 by the government bureau.

The state's farm and ranch population on January 1, 1935, of 248,767 consisted of 244,734 white persons and 4,033 negroes, Indians, Chinese, Japanese, and other non-white races. The population on April 1, 1930 totaled 223,667.

On January 1, 1935, of the farm and ranch population, 45,141, or 18.1 per cent lived on non-farm residences five years earlier. The movement of persons to farms and ranches was most extensive along the Willamette, Umpqua, and Rogue rivers, and around Portland.

Dwellings on farms and ranches totaled 79,765, of which 70,673 were occupied. Austin's census also showed 26,712, or 41.2 per cent of all farm and ranch operators in the state engaged in part-time work off their farms and ranches for pay or income in 1934.

Approximately 75 per cent of the part-time farms are located in the counties around Portland and in the Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue river valleys. More than three times as many were employed in non-agricultural pursuits as in agricultural work, the report showed.

Days worked off the farm or ranches for pay or income totaled 3,286,698 or an average of 123 days per operator reporting.

Negus Offered Job At Texas Exposition

DALLAS, Texas, May 6. (UP)—Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia was offered a job Tuesday as public relations director for a troupe of nude dancers.

The owner of "The Streets of Paris" at the Texas Centennial exposition spent \$24.96 to cable the offer to Haile Selassie in care of the British consulate at Djibouti, French Somaliland. He offered the emperor \$22,500 for 10 weeks' work.

Massachusetts Governor Sent Bomb Package

BOSTON, May 6. (UP)—Governor James M. Curley Tuesday doused in water a package crammed with the mechanism of a bomb. It had been handed to him by a statehouse messenger. Subsequent examination showed that while the package contained a skeleton bomb, there were no explosives in it.

The instrument was in a package bearing a Somerville postmark and was addressed in long-hand to "Governor Curley, Statehouse, Boston." It consisted of clock mechanism and a bakelite tube with connecting wires to two flashlight batteries.

Captains John Stokes and Charles T. Van Amburg of the state police and postal authorities investigated. A handwriting expert was to be called in to examine the writing.

Van Amburg, noted ballistics expert, said there was no evidence of explosives in the tube, but that water in which the package was submerged would be analyzed for possible traces of dissolved powder.

HIGH TEMPERATURE BOOSTS PRICES

CHICAGO, May 6. (AP)—Reports of high temperatures and dust storms in domestic winter crop territory southwest led to price advances for wheat late today.

Estimates were current that yesterday's export business in Canadian wheat totaled 2,000,000 bushels, the largest single day's amount in some time. A recent purchase of 300,000 barrels of domestic flour by an eastern bakery chain was also announced.

Wheat closed firm, at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 cent higher, May 96-98, July 87-89, corn 1-1/2 up, May 62 1/2, oats 1-1/2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to 10 cents decline.

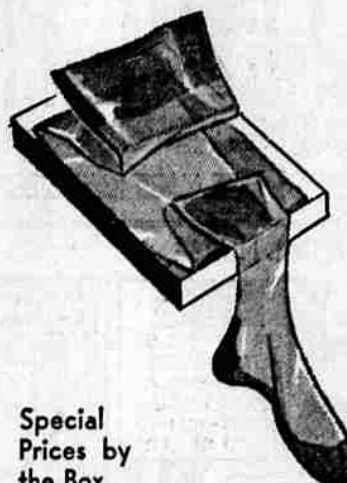

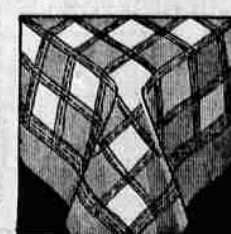
