MARBLE GAMES HELD ILLEGAL

SALEM, May 7. (AP)—So-called marble games are primarily lotteries and are a violation of the Oregon laws, Ralph Moody, deputy attorney general and special prosecutor for gambling investigations in Marion county, announced last night.

Moody declared that all games of chance in the county must go, regardless of whether or not they involve an element of skill. Moody's statement was made in answer to an inquiry about the status of the marble machines.

Moody said the state did not need to prove that the element of chance predominated in any game, but that if the game involved any degree of gambling it was banned by Oregon.

Sheriff A. C. Burk was undecided what procedure to follow but declared that "if Moody orders us to pick up marble games, our office will do so."

Marble games now operating in the county are outside of Salem. A city ordinance banned their operation within the city limits.

Notes Insured by Federal Housing

Notes for modernization and repair of homes in Klamath county have been insured by the Federal Housing Administration under Title I of the Federal Housing Act in the sum of \$149,711 up to December 31, 1935, according to Edgar Freed, state director of the National Emergency Council. This represents 391 individual notes insured by this agency.

The total number of notes insured in Oregon by the FHA for modernization and repair of homes was 10,927 amounting to \$3,285,557.96 up to December 31, 1935.
