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houser ransom money. Hoover said, on which the serial numbers had been altered.

Hoover said Mahan admitted his identity, but did not confess to the crime.

When a reporter asked "did he confess?" Hoover replied: "He didn't need to confess. We've got enough evidence to convict him."

No Shots Fired

Hoover said Mahan was taken without any shots being fired. He was unarmed.

Mahan was being removed this afternoon to Tacoma, Washington, for arraignment for the May 24, 1935 kidnapping of 9-year-old George Weyerhaeuser. A \$200,000 ransom was paid for the boy's release.

Hoover said the ransom money had been turned up at regular intervals in various places in the Pacific northwest, with the serial numbers altered. Crime technicians in the bureau's laboratory here, he told newsmen, were able to identify positively the altered notes.

Many Clues Checked

Little George Weyerhaeuser, son of J. B. Weyerhaeuser Jr., a prominent Tacoma, Wash., lumber man, disappeared as he was on his way home from school for lunch.

Mahan, alias William Dainard, was hunted up and down the west coast and into the northwest. He has been reported in "accidents" from many parts of the country since the manhunt which made him a "public enemy" began. Death of two Puget Sound, Wash., police officers within a month after the kidnapping was laid to him by some officers, and he was suspected of other crimes committed since the chase began.

"G Men" took up the Mahan trail in earnest when Harmon Metz Waley and Margaret, his wife, were captured in Salt Lake City, Utah. Their confession implicated the former blacksmith and auto mechanic. Waley is serving a long term in Alcatraz Island, Calif., penitentiary and his wife is locked up with other famous gangster "molls" in the federal jail at Milan, Mich.

Seen in Flight

Shortly after the Waleys confessed, a Butte, Mont., police officer saw Mahan flee from his parked green sedan when the officer approached. Mahan escaped, but \$15,000 of the ransom bills were found in the car.

Finding of the "hideout" house and cache of \$20,700 of the ransom money in historic Immigration canyon, five miles from Salt Lake City, Utah, also followed the Waley confession.

Willie Shannon, wearing a frock a century old, posed as the first Oregon mother, and little Adrienne Eubanks, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Hale B. Eubanks, as her child in the living picture. The little girl wore a dress 100 years old, which is the property of Mrs. C. E. Morrison. The tableau was given in commemoration of the anniversary of the birth of the first white child in Oregon.

An enthusiastic audience greeted Mrs. Zumwalt's program. On Friday noon the Klamath Union high school orchestra, under the direction of Harry Borel, and the mixed chorus directed by Miss Lillie Darby, will present the music week concert.

Airplane May Aid Mosquito Control

Use of airplanes in mosquito control work in the Klamath country was suggested to County Agent C. A. Henderson and E. C. Reynolds, secretary of the chamber of commerce, by Al Greenwood of the state board of aeronautics, on a visit here Thursday.

Greenwood said that he would gather more information on such a project for consideration of Klamath people.

He said that successful efforts of the kind have been reported from other districts. Spray attachments are used on the planes, which fly over mosquito breeding grounds.

PRIZES OFFERED FOR CELEBRATION

Prize money amounting to \$2,500 will be offered to contestants appearing in the Klamath Basin Celebration rodeo scheduled for Fourth of July by the local post of the American Legion, according to O. D. Matthews, chairman of the rodeo committee. Matthews is being assisted by Bill Seruys in plans for the big show, for which a new grand stand, new corrals and chutes will be constructed at the fairgrounds.

Riders and steer bulldoggers from Pendleton, Ore., Cheyenne, Wyo., and Los Angeles have already signified their intention of entering the rodeo, which is to be the largest in southern Oregon this year.

One of the outstanding events of the rodeo will be the parade to be staged under the direction of Lester Finley, parade chairman.

The feature attraction of the parade will be the Gilmore rubber circus, which includes 16 inflated rubber animals, more than 20 feet in height. The parade will be more than a mile in length, and 95 clowns in costume will march in the procession.

The committee also plans to feature, in addition to the rodeo, carnivals, dances, log rollings, donkey baseball, fireworks, etc., to afford a variety of entertainment.

Other plans call for the erection of seats along Main street, for the comfort of women and children during the parade. Special traffic officers will be pressed into service to handle all street traffic in an orderly and efficient manner so that plenty of parking space will be available for outside visitors.

The Klamath county court agreed Thursday to provide help for women of the WPA sewing project, now closed, who are in distress.

Women of the project again appealed for help. It was decided to bring all pressure to bear on the federal authorities to have the project re-opened, but it was found necessary to do something immediately for those in serious circumstances. The court then came forward with a promise of emergency help.

COOPERATIVE PLAN FOR RELIEF ASKED

WASHINGTON, May 7. (AP)—Congress was advised today by Relief Administrator Harry L. Hopkins that it would do better to think out some plan of government cooperation with industry to increase employment than to consider now any permanent program of relief.

This advice was disclosed as the house began considering a \$1,500,000,000 allowance for Hopkins' Works Progress Administration for the 1937 fiscal year. This amount, he told the appropriations committee during hearings made public today, will not be enough unless private employment picks up.

He defended the WPA against charges of "politics" and told how he planned to use the \$1,500,000,000.

As to suggestions for a permanent program, he said "it was not desirable now to draft such a plan because if you were to do it today, you would have to set up a device to take care of a very, very large number of people."

THREE ARRESTED ON LIQUOR COUNT

Charged with sale of liquor to Indians, Ole Nelson, James Johnson and Andy Bennett are being held in city jail pending federal disposition of their cases. They were arrested by police officers Wednesday night.

Seven defendants, charged with drunkenness, were assessed fines of \$10, or 5 days in city jail, when they appeared before Judge Richmond for trial Thursday. Hearings for Wm. H. Barton, charged with drunkenness and vagrancy, Le Roy Hood and J. Duffy also charged with drunkenness, were set for Thursday evening, after the trio entered pleas of not guilty.

William A. Yancy, charged with vagrancy, agreed to leave town at once upon the condition that a fine of \$100 and a jail sentence of 40 days levied against him be suspended.

Etta Sconchin was fined \$20 on charges of drunk and disorderly conduct, and Sy Hutchinson \$15 or 7 1/2 days in jail on the same count.

Joe Skoglund, arrested late Thursday forenoon on charges of drunkenness, is being held in city jail pending hearing.
