### FOREST FIRE PREVENTION TALK HEARD

A plea for sustained yield management of privately owned forests was combined with another for forest fire prevention in a talk delivered to the Kiwanis club Thursday noon by George E. Griffith, public relations director for the federal forest service in this region.

Griffith spoke in connection with "Stop Forest Fires" week being sponsored here by the American Legion. He was introduced by Hal Ogle, chairman of the Legion's committee.

The lumbering industry and agriculture are the taproots of economic life in Oregon, he pointed out. He cited the danger of exploiting resources without replacing them, and compared it to living or running a business on capital instead of income.

The answer, he said, is sustained yield management of the forests. This is now being done in the national forests, and it must be extended to private forests if this great resource is not wasted away and lost forever, Griffith declared. He explained the sustained yield program, calling for scientific cutting of crops of timber on a basis whereby there is sufficient growth coming on to replace that which is cut.

Griffith also explained the forest service's multiple use program. Under this scheme, all of the forests' values—recreational, game and wild life, watershed protection, etc.—are protected and used for public benefit.

"But sustained yield management and multiple use values will all come to naught if the common enemy, fire, is permitted to run its course," warned Griffith.

"We must fireproof the forests," he said. He discussed the importance of fire prevention to wild life, telling of the dead deer he had seen in the great Tillamook burn. He told of the necessity of an acid balance in trout streams, and said that a fire, covering the watershed with potash and alkali, destroys that balance and is detrimental to fish life.

Lightning fires, said Griffith, are not a serious menace. From 60 to 70 per cent of fires are caused by mankind, and smokers and campers are the worst offenders.

Griffith told of seeing a fisherman standing hip deep in a stream, with rushing water all around him. The man took a cigarette from his mouth and slipped it across the stream and into the dry brush on the bank.

This sort of thing, he said, is the city man's habit. He lives in fire-proof surroundings, and he becomes careless of fire. Education, Griffith said, is the best way to fight the forest fire menace. It is essential that a powerful public opinion be built up against carelessness with fire in the woods.

### LATE PRESIDENT'S POSSESSIONS SOLD

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., May 7. (AP)—Household furnishings of the late President Calvin Coolidge were placed on the auction block today.

Stocky bald-headed George Bean, auctioneer, to whom Coolidge's widow, Mrs. Grace Goodhue Coolidge, entrusted selling of the household effects hired the Smith College arena to accommodate an expected crowd of devotees.

About 400 articles pointed the trail the 30th president took from a Vermont farm to the White House.

For the block were articles Coolidge used as a student at Amherst college and inexpensive but still sturdy tables and chairs from the now famous two-family house on Massachusetts street where the young lawyer and the attractive school teacher set up housekeeping.

Awaiting the bidder, too, were more recent landmarks in the former president's life—books and curios and ornate vases he brought back here with him from the White House, and solid mahogany furniture from his last home, "The Beeches."

Mrs. Coolidge is traveling in Europe now.

### WITNESS TIES DETECTIVE TO WENDEL CASE

NEW YORK, May 7. (UP)—District Attorney William F. X. Geoghan tonight said Ellis Parker, Sr., Burlington county, N. J., detective, was linked closer than ever to the Wendel kidnapping case Wednesday by Murray Bleefeld.

Geoghan said Bleefeld, one of five indicted in the case, told him Parker senior visited New York six times while the disbarred Trenton attorney was held prisoner in Brooklyn and allegedly tortured into confessing the murder of the Lindbergh baby.

Bleefeld testified before Jury that between February 14 and 24, the period Wendel was held a prisoner in Brooklyn, that Ellis Parker, Sr., came to New York City six times and gave orders to the kidnapers on each occasion," Geoghan said.

"After each confession made by Wendel while a prisoner in the house of Voorhies avenue, Ellis Parker, Jr., would call up his father and his father would come to New York where he would pass on the confession submitted to him by Parker, Jr."

Police En Route to Mt. Holly

At 10:30 Geoghan said he had been advised by Assistant District Attorney Francis A. Madden of Trenton that New Jersey state police had located the younger Parker at his father's home and were en route to pick him up. At midnight, however, no arrest had been reported and there had been no unusual activity at the Parker home.

Parker, Jr., under indictment, has been a fugitive for about two weeks.

"The next morning, according to Bleefeld, young Parker called his father's office and was informed by Mrs. Anna Bading, his secretary, that the letter had arrived."

Parker Authorized Release

"Murray Bleefeld told me that Wendel was not released until Parker, Sr., gave the word. Bleefeld also told me that the last time he saw Ellis Parker, Sr., was on March 29, but that from February 24 to March 29, the period in which Wendel was detained in the sanitarium at New Lisbon, N. J., that he had several conferences with Ellis Parker, Sr., in Mount Holly and that Parker had told him they were making progress with Wendel."
