

BROOM INDUSTRY NOW IN KLAMATH

The Klamath Broom Manufacturing company, organized a few weeks ago, are turning out about 10 dozen brooms per day and will increase the output as the market can absorb them.

This new industry will create another payroll for the city and provide another source of income for the farmers of the Klamath Basin, for the company has proved that broom corn of a high quality can be grown here and is planning putting in 40 acres in different parts of the basin, seeking the most favorable locations.

The company will supply the seed and contract to buy the crop of any farmer who may be interested in growing a few acres.

There is a good market for brooms here and it is hoped that Klamath Falls will give this new enterprise the same good support that they gave the wooden box program members of the farm and. Incidentally, the mills making the wooden boxes are large users of brooms and it is expected that they will reciprocate by using the local brooms, they pointed out.

FORT KLAMATH, Ore.—Fort Klamath Grange held its regular business meeting of the month in the club house Tuesday evening, with a fine attendance present. Grange was opened by Worthy Master M. L. L. Ferguson, accompanied by the secretary, Mrs. Myrtle B. Wimer, would make the trip as representatives of the local grange.

Following the transaction of business, grange was closed, and the gathering listened to addresses made by candidates who are running for political office. Preceding introduction of the candidates, the assembly joined in singing "America," following which Dr. Robert Jay, state veterinarian of the bureau of animal husbandry, addressed the audience on the subject of liver fluke control. Girl Corralled 12 Snakes in Hotel Room

MONTREAL, May 7. (UP)—Florette Zoda, an Egyptian snake charmer, walked into a room filled with 12 starving, poisonous reptiles Wednesday and, one by one, put them back into their cages.

Her courage ended a panic that started when an adder bit Edward E. Smith, owner of a Schriever, La., snake farm, who had been starving the reptiles to make fighters out of them.

Trainer Near Death

Smith, his left arm amputated below the elbow, was blind and unconscious in a hospital tonight. He will die unless the adder's venom is removed before it reaches the heart.

Smith had king cobras, rattlers and adders in his collection. He had always insisted that he was immune to snake bite and had been known to open his arteries and feed his blood to the snakes. Last night he was treating an adder for an ailment when the snake struck his left forearm. He rushed to a drugstore and from there was hurried to a hospital where surgeons quickly amputated.

Venom an Anesthetic

The Smith went into a coma and his eyelids failed. Strangely, he was in no pain as he fought for life, the adder's venom acted as a general anesthetic.

Police, at a loss to know how to meet the menace, called in Miss Zoda, friend of Smith. They asked her to go into the room and exercise whatever power she had over the reptiles.

Cautiously, Miss Zoda pushed open the door in the room at the Alpine hotel. Quickly she slammed it and turned away in horror.

Hotel Evacuated

She had been able to count only seven snakes, and she knew Smith had 12 in his collection. Panic started. Police sealed the hotel room and ordered everybody out of the Alpine. The street outside was blocked off. Patrolmen were equipped with special sticks and were ordered to poke into all crannies in the neighborhood in the search for the five snakes, supposedly missing.

Once more she pushed open the door. This time she stepped inside and the door closed behind her.

When at last she came out she said she had found all 12 of the snakes. Some of them had been hiding in corners of the room. She took them carefully, one by one, and put them in their cages, not knowing when another deadly reptile might crawl up behind her and strike.

Physicians said it would be several days before Smith will be out of danger—if he lives that long.
