

Athletes Arrive for Saturday's Track Meet

GOOD WEATHER TO AID EVENT

Twelve Schools, 200 Athletes Compete on Modoc Field Saturday.

The advance guard of more than 200 young athletes began arriving in Klamath Falls Friday in preparation for the fifth annual Southern Oregon-Northwest California track meet on Modoc field Saturday afternoon.

Twelve schools have entered the running for the A and B division championships.

Good weather—warm and clear—held out the promise of record times, distances and heights in many events. Modoc field has been placed in fast condition, thus assuring the competing youths the best possible circumstances for a crack at the records.

The Klamath Pelicans still stood forth as the favorites in the A division. Any one of several teams was regarded as having an equal chance for the B championship.

As the entry list now stands the competing schools will include:

A division—Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Lakeview, Bend and Corvallis.

B division—Keno, Merrill, Dorris, Henley, Malin, Chiloquin.

Of special interest is the entrance of the Corvallis team, one of the strongest in the Willamette valley. Not since the 1932 meet when Eugene entered has a team come from so far north.

Corvallis is sending five men. While the squad is not expected to lift the title, it should be in the lead for individual honors.

A special luncheon will be held by the 20-30 club Saturday noon. Following this event there will be a parade down Main street to Modoc field.

Preliminaries are scheduled to begin Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock. The meet will be underway at 2:00.

PENNANT RACE OPENS SUNDAY

Sox, Pelicans Battle Here on Modoc Field in League Game.

With one of the closest pennant races in history expected, the Southern Oregon league will open its regular 1936 12-game schedule next Sunday, May 10, with Klamath Falls and Grants Pass drawing the inaugural encounters.

At Klamath Falls, the 1935 champion Red Sox will tangle with the Klamath Falls Pelicans at Modoc field, while at Grants Pass, the Glendale Loggers open hostilities against the Grants Pass Merchants, last year's runners up.

Pelicans Start Southpaw

Both games will start at 2:30 p. m. sharp. At both initial battle scenes, the largest crowds in years are expected to be in the stands. Opening day ceremonies have been arranged at Grant Pass and Klamath Falls, with league and city officials taking part.

At Grants Pass, former major league Ken Williams will also rely on a lefthander to subdue the "dark horse" Glendale club. Nineteen year old Bob Hardy will do the pitching for the Merchants with Al Drolette back of the bat.

Bill Willis, Glendale Loggers' skipper, will probably counter with Speedball Thompson on the mound and Dyer wearing the big mitt.

Klamath Falls, due to its pair of league entries, will enjoy continuous baseball during the 12-game schedule, while Grants Pass and Glendale will show six times on their home field.

Tony Canzoneri, Jimmy McLarnin Battle Tonight

NEW YORK, May 8. (AP)—Tony Canzoneri runs afoul of the almost insurmountable barrier of a 10-pound pull in the weights, which he concedes to Jimmy McLarnin tonight and curiously as to what may happen is likely to draw one of the biggest indoor fight crowds in years into Madison Square Garden.

Garden officials, with some \$50,000 already in the till, are talking about a near-capacity crowd and a gate of close to \$50,000 for their 10-round fight, natural. It's been a long time since any battles below the heavy-weight class have stirred up so much talk.

Those extra 10 pounds which McLarnin will carry into the ring about 9 p. m. (EST) are the cause of most of the disputes. Jimmy is expected to weigh in at around 145 and Tony at the lightweight limit. The main question is whether the 135-pound champion can spot a dangerous rival that same kind of fight he does against opponents of his own size.

There are other questions, too. Have Canzoneri's agile legs, which have carried him through 138 battles in a dozen years, begun to weaken a trifle? He'll have to step at a lively clip to keep away from the Vancouver Irishman's punishing right. Has a year's absence from the ring since he lost the welterweight crown to Barney Ross last May cost McLarnin any of his accuracy or timing or urge to win? Has Jimmy lost his famed knock-out punch through past injuries to his right hand? Even the most ring-wise of fans hasn't been able to find the answers.

Canzoneri, always a busy battler, may have the keener edge of the two as he already has had five fights since New Year's day, winning four by knockouts. However, he made one bad showing against Johnny Jadiek and the odds, which had been pretty well on his side, began to swing the other way.

Tony's followers, however, openly predict a knockout victory.

Current betting quotations favor McLarnin at about 7 to 5 but indications are it will be 6 to 5 and take your pick affair before the gong sounds.
