'Apple a Day' Helps to Provide Tasty Menu, Cooks Find

A favorite saying is "An apple a day keeps the doctor away." But whether or not you believe this statement (this fact remains—that apples are a very adaptable fruit).

This week we have a wealth of suggested good recipes. I'm sure that if you try them out you too will find them very satisfactory.

HODGE PODGE

Slice 4 apples. Cook out top of stove. Pour into buttered baking dish and sprinkle with one-third cup sugar, nutmeg and cinnamon. Beat yolks of 2 eggs thick and add 1 cup sugar. Beat in whites (whipped) and add 3 tablespoons cream, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 cup nuts. Pour this over apples and bake 30 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.

APPLE TORTE

3 cups sweetened apple sauce
1 cup whipping cream
2 egg whites
1 cup hot milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 egg yolks
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon orange extract
2 tablespoons granulated gelatin

1 tablespoon fat
1 tablespoon sugar
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups flour

UNUSUAL APPLE SALAD

Peel and core six apples. Have ready a good-sized kettle (large enough so that the apples will not be piled up in it) with 3 cups of water, and 1 cup of sugar, a bit of red or green vegetable coloring if desired. Cook until tender, being careful that the apples do not lose their shape.

Put each apple into a large

cup and fill the cavities loosely with chopped pineapple and nuts. Make up a package of lemon flavored gelatin (use liquid remaining from cooking the apples, with hot water added to make a pint.) Pour this gelatin over the apples, covering them well. Chill.

To serve, unmold each apple on a crisp lettuce leaf, and top with mayonnaise to which whipped cream has been added.

1 egg
1 cup milk

Prepare apples in usual manner, removing core; fill with one tablespoon sugar. Add butter and top with two marshmallows (all ingredients inside apples.) Bake in pan with little water—baste occasionally. Cook until tender.

FILLING FOR PIE

Prepare apples as usual, chopping coarsely, and mix with required amount of sugar and either nutmeg or cinnamon as for pie. Then pack in jars to about one inch of top and cold pack—boiling for 30 minutes. Finish sealing immediately after taking from hot water. Later when making pie use these canned apples adding small pieces of butter. This makes a fresh apple tasting pie when apples are scarce.

Boll two-thirds of a cup of rice in sweet milk, adding a little salt and some butter. Pare and core some good cooking apples; put in a pan and pour the cooked rice over them. Bake until the apples

Pare and core ten small apples. Put in deep pan with two and one-half cups water and one and one-half cups sugar. Pinch salt. Cook until tender. Place each apple in separate mold and cover with this jelly mixture: Two tablespoons gelatin dissolved in cold water; juice of 2 lemons. Add syrup in which apples were cooked enough to make a scant quart in all. Color pink if desired and serve with whipped cream.

APPLE ROLL

5 apples (tart)
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg
Milk

Pare and core apples, chop fine. Mix flour, baking powder, sugar, salt. Add the beaten egg. Melted shortening and milk enough to make it like biscuit dough. Roll out on a floured board one-fourth inch thick. Spread with chopped apples, sprinkle with cinnamon and a little nutmeg. Roll up lengthwise and cut into one inch pieces. Place in a greased baking pan, cut side up. Pour over rolls a syrup made of one cup of sugar and a half a cup of water and bake. Serve either hot or cold with cream or sauce.
