department of justice agents surrounded him in the chartered airplane which transported him; and his wrists were heavily shackled.

### Big Crowd on Hand

At the Tacoma airport, he was met by another dozen deputy marshals, state police and city officers, who battled a crowd of more than 400 persons who rushed the plane. Officers hustled him into an automobile in the center of a line of cars, cut a path through the crowd and dashed directly to the city jail in downtown Tacoma.

### BIG GANGS BROKEN

WASHINGTON, May 8. (AP)—Attorney General Cummings jubilantly surveyed the law's cleanup of two kidnap gangs and declared today that "the activity of interstate groups of criminals has been practically broken up."

Federal agents wrote "finis" on the records of the two mobs in a pair of swift, bloodless raids. Hundreds of miles apart yesterday.

**Karpis Mob Captured**  
William Mahan, who headed the justice department's list of wanted men, was seized as he sat in his automobile in a San Francisco parking lot at noon Thursday. He was called "the remaining principal" in the \$200,000 kidnaping of 9-year-old George Weyerhaeuser, heir to a Tacoma, Wash., timber fortune.

A few hours earlier, J. Edgar Hoover led a squad of his agents in a sunup raid on a Toledo apartment where Harry Campbell, last survivor of the Barker-Karpis mob, was arrested.

Alvin Karpis, erstwhile "public enemy number one," and known as the "brains" of old Kate "Ma" Barker's ring of bank robbers and kidnapers, was captured by Hoover and his men in New Orleans a week ago.

**Robinson Still Hunted**  
The hunt concentrated today on a lone figure—last kidnaping "public enemy" to remain at large. He is Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., the ex-law clerk accused of kidnaping Mrs. Harry V. Stoll in Louisville, Ky., a year and a half ago, for \$50,000 ransom. Hoover agreed with Cummings, his chief, that kidnaping and bank robbery are, at last, "under control."

Cummings said news of the rapid-fire capture of Karpis, Campbell and Mahan was "the most gratifying piece of information I've received for some time," and called the cleanup "a splendid piece of work."

Some jurists contend the league assembly must pass on the question of ending the punitive measures against Italy since the assembly authorized the sanctions policy.

reaccuracy, broken promises, injury to the national credit, disregard of national honor, disregard of the interests alike of the producer and the consumer, the policy of acridity, the harmful so-called reciprocity treaties which have injured the field, the forest and the factory, the making of our imports more costly and our exports more difficult, uncertain and costly, our currency system made unstable, the substitution of government operation for private enterprise, abandonment of the gold standard making difficult and hazardous all long-term undertakings and corporate financing, introducing new and unnecessary risks in every form of American investment, steady usurpation of state functions by the national government, unprecedented concentration of power in the executive, abdication by congress of its proper functions, increase of national indebtedness to nearly \$34,000,000,000—the highest point in U. S. history, the granting of special privileges, the deprivation of equal rights, interference with personal liberty, increase of strikes and labor difficulties, and creation of a situation where the effect of millions of dollars, appropriated for relief purposes from the public treasury is used for the election of democratic candidates.

This is just an excerpt from Judge Bennett's indictment of the administration. It is indicative of the talk he is to make tonight. The primary campaign continues to move slowly toward election day, with some evidence, locally, of a lively situation or two developing before it is all over.

One contest that promises at least a few fireworks is that between County Clerk Mae K. Short and her opponent for the democratic clerkship nomination, George Chastain. Already some rather "hot" broadsides have been fired in this battle.

Judge John Jeffrey, candidate for the democratic nomination for U. S. senator, and Theodore Nelson, who seeks the republican nomination, spoke before a good-sized audience at a Townsend meeting Thursday night. They talked in favor of the Townsend plan. Townsend rules forbid

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candidates making "political speeches" at club meetings. Senator Charles L. McNary continues to receive strong bouquets. The senator is expected to sweep the nomination by republicans without difficulty, and his election in the fall is freely predicted by many observers.

Colonel W. B. Greeley, well-known head of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, has written a letter stating that Senator McNary has given invaluable assistance to the lumber industry.

Smoke was visible for many seconds after the meteor itself had disappeared.

The sky for a time was cast in a reddish-yellow glare. A more bluish light lingered with the smoke.

Location is Doubtful  
The meteor was visible at Wolf Creek airways station and at the CCC camp at Wimer.

The weather bureau at Medford observed the light and heard the sound.

J. Hugh Pruett, extension astronomer at the University of Oregon and northwest authority

on meteors, expressed doubt that the blazing meteor witnessed from southern Oregon cities landed in the vicinity of Roseburg. "The meteor probably appeared to strike the earth nearby, but such is always the case with these large 'shooting stars' and usually it is found they struck many miles distant," he said. "Reports that the meteor was seen in Washington tend to verify this fact."

Prof. Pruett urged that those who saw the meteor make reports to him so that he could more definitely locate its course through the heavens. He pointed out it was virtually impossible to tell where the meteors fell until widespread reports had been received and coordinated.
