

CLUB PLAYS HOST TO COUNTY COURT

MERRILL, May 8.—The Service club was host on Tuesday to members of the county court, Judge George Grizzle and Commissioners Roy Taber and W. P. B. Chase, who brought to the meeting plans for securing a greater percentage of the state gas tax to be used locally.

At the present time only one-tenth of the 6-cent tax is available for county roads leading into the main highways, and the court proposes to attempt to secure an amendment to the present law which will provide for a more generous distribution of funds, according to Chase, who spoke at length on the subject. Short talks were also made by Grizzle and Taber.

Roads in the south end of the county are at present in better condition than in previous years despite the budget cut reducing finances for maintenance on side roads.

Tom Laird of the lava beds caravan committee, announced that plans are complete for the tour next Sunday, May 10, when residents of the entire county are invited to take part in a sightseeing trip through the monument.

Don Fisher of the park service, stated that a number of guides will be on hand to take parties through the caves, and Fisher will speak briefly on subjects of interest in the park.

The Service club, consulting members of the park service on the condition of the 21-mile stretch of road leading to Medicine lake, received prompt action on their suggestion and improvement work is now under way under the direction of the supervisor of the Lava Beds CCC camp. Other stretches of the road are in good condition.

The club is purchasing a trophy which is to be presented to the Klamath county track champions in the coming 11 league meet to be held here, Saturday, May 16, in which all teams of the county with Tulake and Dorris have been invited to take part.

Officials for the meet will be chosen from disinterested parties from several districts in the county and Service club members will also assist in various capacities.

covered Breen was dead when he dropped in for a visit.

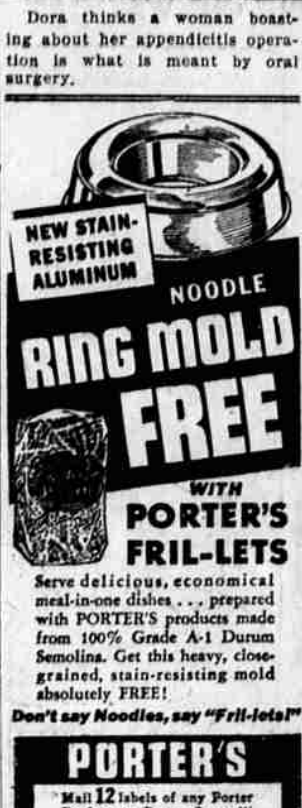
Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, was called, and attributed death to a heart attack. The man probably died some time in the night during his sleep.



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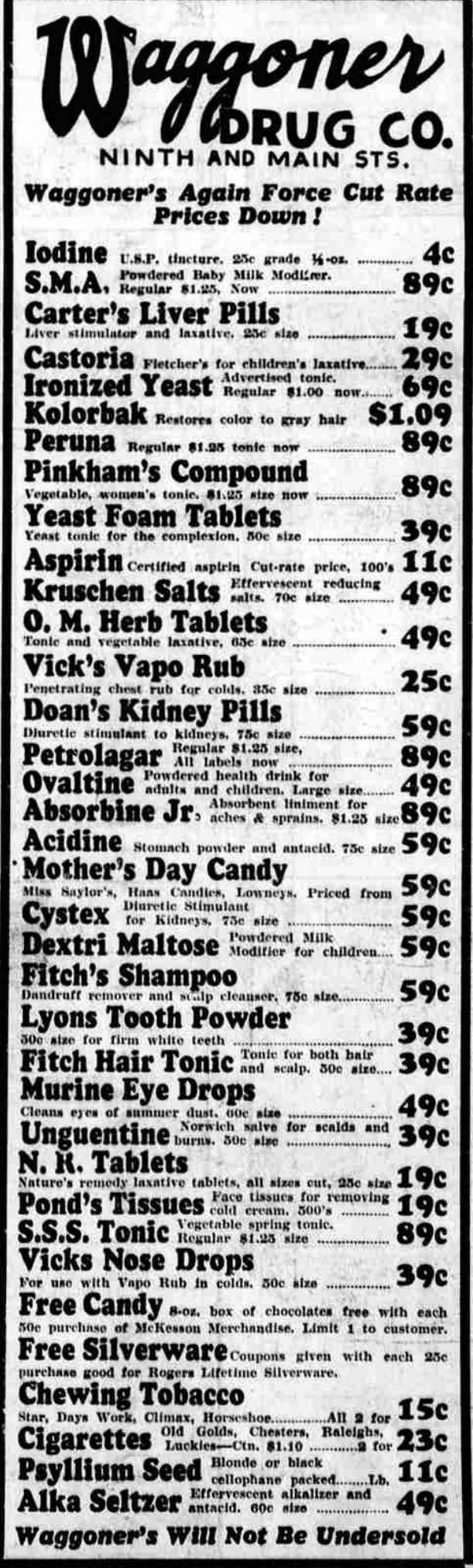
