

# Red Sox Win Opener From Pelicans, 9 to 1

## LEAGUE SEASON OPENS SUNDAY

### Carlstrom Stops Losers With But Four Safe Blows.

The Klamath Falls Red Sox, defending champions of the Southern Oregon baseball league, got off to a good start for the 1936 season on Modoc field Sunday by trimming the Klamath Pelicans 9 to 1.

Molatore's single and Harshberger's double gave the Pelicans one run in the opening frame. Their brief lead was short-lived, for the Red Sox pounded out hits to score a run and tie-up the contest in the second.

From that point on the Pelicans never got home with their runners while the Red Sox piled up a substantial lead.

Donaldson's single was the only hit the Pelicans gained after the first inning. Carlstrom, ace hurler for the Sox, pitched brilliantly, allowing the losing team but four blows.

Wheeler, Red Sox shortstop, was the hitting star of the game. He hit three times out of five trips to the plate and came in with three runs.

Next Sunday the Sox play at Glendale and Grants Pass meets the Pelicans here.

The Reds' management announced that the failure to slide was the last straw in a succession of misdeeds; that Derringer wasn't pitching as he should and that something more drastic might be done about it. Trade talk was bandied about and Derringer began to wonder.

**Reds Shutout Pirates**

Again embraced in the fold, however, Derringer went to the mound against the Pirates Sunday and turned in a pitching gem. The Reds won 6-0 with Derringer allowing but three scattered hits and permitting only one Pirate to travel as far as third base. He fanned five. Babe Herman and Billy Myers took care of the offense. Herman had a perfect day at bat with a homer, a double and two singles. Myers also hit for the circuit, with two on.

As Derringer was coming into his own, however, Lefty Grove of the Boston Red Sox, hero of five successive victories, was being belted from the mound as the Washington Senators downed the Yankees 4-0. Buck Newsom was the hero of this encounter, letting the potent pokers of Boston down with six safeties.

## Fine Performances in Many Sports Feature Oregon's Athletic Program

A broad jump mark which practically equaled the Olympic record sparked today in a brilliant week-end of sports in Oregon. Records took a beating on every hand.

The University of Oregon track and field team lost to University of Washington, 74 to 57, at Eugene, but produced the outstanding mark when Frank "Squeak" Lloyd leaped 25 feet four and 3-8 inches, only 3-8 of an inch less than the Olympic record.

The great jump eclipsed the old Northwest record of 24 feet 8 inches which Bill Benke of Washington State set here only last week.

**Webfoots Clout Huskies**

Washington State swamped the Oregon State track team 91 1-3 to 39 2-3 in a meet at Pullman, Wash.

University of Portland's track and field team turned in fine marks in winning a four-way meet at Portland with 86 points. Oregon Normal scored 38, Grays Harbor Junior College 8 and Reed Club of Portland one.

The Willamette University cinder acres had easy sailing and scored 109 points in a three-way meet at Salem. Salem "Y" scored 19 and Albany College, which entered only part of the events.

University of Oregon's baseball team gained ground with an 11 to 6 victory over University of Washington.

**Beaver Netmen Win**

Willamette University opened its northwest conference baseball campaign with a pair of victories over Pacific University while College of Puget Sound dropped Linfield twice.

The record-breakers were headed by Frank Lloyd, University of Oregon broad jumper, who took off on a 24 foot, 4 1/2-inch flight to break the 30-year-old record of another Webfoot, Dan Kelly, by 1 1/2 inches.

George Sweeney, University of Portland sprinter, ran the 100-yard dash in 9.5 seconds for a new mark at a track meet in Portland. In a district high school meet at Forest Grove, Sweeney, Forest Grove pole vaulter, went up to 12 feet, 2 1/2 inches, beating the former mark by 2 1/2 inches.

The only slump of the week-end occurred in the A. A. U. swimming meet at Oregon State college when more than a score of competitors failed to break a record.

Oregon State's tennis team upset University of Oregon 4 to 3, but the Oregon golf squad whitewashed Oregon State 25 1/2 to 1 1/2.

Pacific University's tennis team beat Pacific College 3 to 1. The Linfield women defeated Oregon Normal's tennis team 6 to 0.

The undefeated record of the Oregon State Rook baseball team was threatened as the Rooks beat Eugene High 9 to 6. Ten records fell at Corvallis. High won a district meet with 41 1/2 points, followed by Albany with 31, McMinnville with 28, Toledo 22 1/2, Dallas 13 1/2, Independence 5, Monroe 5, Monmouth 3, Newport 3 and Lebanon 1.

Salem High won a district meet at Oregon City where five records fell. Scores were: Salem 49 1/2, Milwaukie 23, Hill Military 20, Gresham 18, West Linn 18, Sandy 12 1/2, Oregon City 6, Canby 2.

Simpsons of Forest Grove pole vaulted 12 feet 2 1/2 inches to feature a district meet which Seaside won with 38 points.

Milton-Freewater scored 68 1/2 points to win the Eastern Oregon district track meet. Pendleton ran off with 42 points, followed by Leth Grange with 48, Unatilla 13 1/2, Enterprise 7, Elgin 5, Heppner 4 and Wallawa 3.

The Klamath Falls Pelicans won their fifth successive Southern Oregon-Northern California track and field meet Saturday afternoon by piling up a total of 60 1-4 points.

Jumping into the lead when Bishop, colored sprinter, captured a first in the 100-yard dash, the Pelicans never relinquished their advantage. Steadily the margin of points was increased as the meet progressed. The Pelicans were nearly 20 points better than the Bend Lava Bears, their nearest rivals who scored 44 1-3 points.

**Two Records Fall**

Two meet records, one of them standing since the first meet sponsored by the Klamath 20-30 club in 1932, toppled. Bob Henderson, who set a pole vault mark for Bend, outdid his old height in the outstanding performance of the day. The husky youth from central Oregon vaulted 12 feet 1 1/2 inches. Perhaps he could have gone higher, but there was some difficulty in getting the standards elevated.

His mark was so brilliant the Oregon State athlete who came from Corvallis to give a vaulting exhibition was content to retire from the field.

Kleinfield, another Bend athlete, upset the mile mark previously held by Al Johnson of Klamath Falls. Johnson ran the distance in 4:58 back in 1932. The Bear's time was 4:53.6.
