

Tigers Show Return to Championship Form

Manager's Removal Unpopular

Discharge of Max Bishop at Portland Fails to Fit in with Team's Good Showing. Dude Chick Tops Wrestlers. Cornell Quits Coaching After Many Years of Service.

The removal of Max Bishop as field manager for the Portland Beavers has not been happily received by the followers of Oregon's only entry in the Pacific Coast league.

The situation is rather unique. Max brought the Beavers into third place. They were going strong in the championship fight. But instead of giving Manager Max a pat on the back for his fine work, E. J. Schetter, the Portland owner, kicked him out.

Schetter's reason for this unexpected act was that Bishop had played but one game since the season started. He was employed as a playing manager.

Bishop has been ill all season but he has still managed to get a winning combination on the field. The Portland showing thus far along in the schedule has been toward high-class baseball. It just doesn't seem logical to fire the man who is responsible for the showing.

As one Portland sports writer said after taking Schetter to task, "After all, it's Mr. Schetter's team."

That appears the answer to Max Bishop's removal.

Dude Chick without a doubt is one of the finest wrestlers Klamath Falls has brought to Klamath Falls. When he wrestles Pete Belcastro at the armory next week he will start his match with the unanimous good will of the audience.

Chick is what so many wrestlers are not. He is a gentleman in the ring and wrestles at top speed from start to finish. While he rarely, if ever, commits a deliberate foul, he is aggressive and hard hitting. He never wastes time performing stunts, yet he can provide more thrills in one match than many wrestlers can in a dozen.

Ansie Cornell, the new Oregon graduate manager, leaves the coaching game after more than 20 years of continuous service.

Cornell was head coach at the College of Idaho for 17 seasons. About three years ago he succeeded Eldon Jenne as head man at Pacific university. Both teams are members of the Northwest conference.

Now, as the Oregon business director, he gives up active work on the gridiron. Cornell is well-known to the University of Oregon alumni. He has been one of the most successful small college coaches on the Pacific coast.

A couple of years back he brought his Pacific team to Klamath Falls for a game with the Southern Oregon normal school.

TOMMY BRIDGES BEATS INDIANS

Substitute First Baseman Begins to Show Hitting Power.

(By Associated Press) Things are looking a bit brighter in the camp of the champion Detroit Tigers.

Harried by early season injuries and form reversals, the Tigers have had a tough time of it this far but there is reason today for Mickey Cochrane to contemplate with a little more hope the grueling days of summer when, Mickey asserts, the team with class and endurance will step out front.

Bridges Regains Form Tommy Bridges and Irving Burns are the reasons for the new bit of optimism. Bridges, a mainstay of the pitching staff last season, had three defeats and only one victory to his credit until Monday's game with the Cleveland Indians when he came into his own to pitch five-hit ball and win, 3 to 1.

Burns, a weakling at bat since he jumped from a substitute berth with the Browns to fill the important shoes of Hank Greenberg, the Tiger first baseman who suffered a broken wrist, showed his first burst of power with the club, getting a home run and a single in four trips to the plate.

The victory enabled the Tigers to climb back into the first division as they unleashed batting power all down the line.

The Phillies took advantage of the short right field fence at Baker Field to drive out five home runs but the Giants also took advantage of it in the ninth to land the blow that gave them a 13-12 victory. It was a hectic game in which the lead changed five times and eight pitchers saw duty, five for the Giants. A total of 31 hits were made with the Phillies getting 16.

The Chicago White Sox rode a barrage of 22 hits, eight for extra bases, to a 19-6 triumph over the St. Louis Browns. It was the 12th straight defeat for Rogers Hornsby's team.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, held scoreless for eight innings, tied the score with the Boston Bees in the first half of the ninth and then lost the game when the Bees scored again in their half for a 2-1 victory.

In an exhibition game, the Red Sox downed the Pirates 11-6, scoring seven runs in the seventh inning.

Lawson Little Fails to Place in Golf Play

It may turn out that Belcastro, himself undefeated in Klamath Falls this season, may put up his belt against Chick.

Such a match would be the highlight of the armory season. Cecil McGill of Los Angeles, a young, promising performer, also has been signed for Klamath Falls.

Pete Sarron Beats Miller for Ring Title

WASHINGTON, May 12, (AP)—Pete Sarron, dark Syrian, could smile today in spite of a cut above his left eye, his only memento of the furious 15 rounder in which he outpointed Freddie Miller to win the National Boxing Association world's featherweight championship.

After more than a dozen years of hard knocks, the ex-newsboy from Birmingham, Ala., last night found the end of his little rainbow.

Three times he had been whipped by Miller, the clever southpaw won the crown three years ago from Tommy Paul, but last night the stocky 24-year-old fighter with his buzzaw flailing, swarmed over Miller, ran up an early lead on points and came within an eyelash of scoring a knockout in the 13th and 15th rounds.

"I'm going to be a fighting champion," Sarron promised as admirers crowded into his dressing room early this morning. "Freddie can have a return fight any time he wants it. Freddie can't hit me." Sarron jumped about the room, laughing, shaking hands and signing autographs.

Over in the other dressing room, Miller sat with both hands propped on his table and his face in his hands. His eyes were puffed.

Keenly disappointed over the loss of his crown, the first time he had been whipped in the 20 times he had risked it, Miller had little to say.

More than 23,000 persons crowded into the American League ball park to see Washington's first championship fight. The gate was around \$40,000, with Miller getting \$10,000 and Sarron \$1,500.

Coast Leaguers Ready to Resume Race for Flag

If history repeats itself, as the school books say, the San Francisco Missions should wind up the week in sixth place in the Pacific Coast baseball league.

While the Oakland Acons have sat comfortably on top of the pile and the Los Angeles Angels have placidly folded their wings on the bottom, the Mission Reds have skidded slowly down the side of the heap.

This week's battle for position will be with the San Diego Padres, just half a game below the Reds, after setting the Missions down five games to two last week. And the Kammen have the unattractive assignment of entertaining the second-place Seattle Indians, who a couple of weeks ago beat them four games to two.

There may be some consolation for Willie Kamm in that the Padres will be playing the Portland Beavers, who edged out last week's series from the Indians.

The Beavers may be slowed up by the loss of Max Bishop, former brilliant second baseman in the majors, the third manager to be coaxed out of the Portland club since the start of last season. President E. J. Schetter gave him his unconditional release because Bishop has been too ill to play. Running the team from the bench, Max lifted the Beavers into the third spot.

The Oaks play host to the San Francisco Seals, whom their umpire-bumping manager, Lefty O'Doul says will be transformed into a fighting ball club. As optimistic as ever, O'Doul picks the Seals to be the first club to win a series from the Acons. He made the same prediction once before.

Sacramento will turn on the lights tonight to start a last place battle between the Senators and the Angels. Their last meeting was most embarrassing to the once proud Angels, and Circuit President Wilbur Tuttle, who unfortunately had described Branch Rickey's west coast representatives as "bush leaguers."

CORVALLIS, May 12, (AP)—Off to an early 4-to-1 lead, Oregon State college's baseball team faded under a barrage of heavy Washington hitting and dropped the first game of the current series to the Huskies, 9 to 4. The teams play again today.

OREGON NAMES ANSE CORNELL

Veteran Coach will Head Management of Athletics.

EUGENE, May 12, (AP)—A former University of Oregon football and baseball star, Anse Black Cornell, came back to his alma mater today as athletic manager under the new revision of athletic management at the university.

Cornell, who performed for the Webfoot on football teams from 1912 to 1915, under Hugo Bezdek, has been director of athletics at Pacific university. His appointment to the post here was made by President C. V. Boyer after a meeting of the new ten-man athletic control board.

Cornell will leave his position at Forest Grove on July 1 to report here.

After graduation, Cornell spent 17 years as coach at the College of Idaho, Caldwell, and followed with the position at Pacific university. His duties here will be concerned solely with inter-collegiate athletics and a manager for all other extra-curricular activities will be chosen later. Cornell's salary will be \$3,000.

Under the former organization, Hugh E. Rosson was graduate manager, with N. Thomas Stoddard in charge of athletics and Ralph S. Schomp in charge of other activities. All resigned.

New Manager Assumes Job With Portland

PORTLAND, May 12, (AP)—A sudden shake-up in the Portland baseball club which brought the ouster of Max Bishop, former big league star, as manager, saw a successor in the saddle today, William J. Sweeney, first baseman, who will play and pilot the Beavers.

Sweeney was acquired by Portland in a trade for Bill Cissell last winter. Bishop will remain here pending outcome of his appeal to Commissioner Landis. He said he would attempt to obtain full salary under what he claimed was an iron-clad contract.

Sweeney will make his first appearance as a player-manager today, when the Beavers face San Diego on the California team's grounds, but he will not play for two weeks. He suffered a wrist fracture early in the season, and has not entirely recovered.

Sweeney's baseball career started in 1925, with Wichita, in the Western league, and he later played with Detroit, Toronto and the Boston Americans.

Bishop was let out because of illness, President E. J. Schetter saying he had contracted for a playing manager, and that Bishop was unable to get on the field.
