

LOOSE DOGS RAISE STORM OF PROTESTS

Vigorous complaint against the ravages of loose-running dogs was heard from a property holder at the city council meeting last night.

This man, C. Williams, told the council that he is getting desperate, and he wanted to know what would happen to him if he trapped dogs that have been wrecking havoc in his garden.

Threatened With Jail
Williams said that he went to humane society officers when it was reported that the state law invalidates that provision of a city ordinance requiring that dog owners tie their pets up during May and June.

He said he was told that the ordinance could not be enforced. When he declared at the conference that he would take means of protecting his property, he was told that he would be thrown in jail, Williams declared to the council.

He said that he lives in the 2200 block on Eberlein street, and that shortly thereafter was reported publicly that somebody in that block had threatened to poison dogs.

"I did not threaten to poison dogs," Williams asserted. "I said I would take steps to protect my property."

Council Advice Asked
Williams then told the council about the trapping plan.

"My idea is to catch the dogs that rule my garden nightly, and have the humane society come and get them. Would I get into trouble if I set out traps and caught dogs?"

City Attorney J. H. Carnahan, asked for an off-hand opinion, said that if the dog was not injured, Williams might get away with it. Williams said that a trap big enough to hold a dog would probably injure it.

Hillside Paving Encouraged
Someone suggested that there is a state law against trapping without a license, and a councilman said that he believed it would be best to catch the dogs and tie them up, rather than to trap them.

The council, at any rate, decided to consider the problem as a committee of the whole. Councilman Van Camp made the motion, stating that a dog ruining a garden is as bad as a dog getting into a chicken coop.

Residents of Hillside were told that if they could raise money for a preliminary survey, to go ahead and start petitioning for an improvement unit to pave that street.

Dawn Noise-makers Cautioned
Lee Carter, speaking for the Hillside, said that the group favors a bituminous top pavement, 20 feet wide.

It was brought up that many property holders in that area are delinquent on sewer assessments, and now there is a movement to add other assessments. Carter said that the sewer assessments are small, and possibly some owners have been letting them ride thoughtlessly because they do not amount to much.

Persons who get up with the crack of dawn and begin hammering, singing, or otherwise making bothersome noise, may be outlawed by city ordinance.

The council received a communication stating that in one neighborhood of the city, in the vicinity of East Main street, somebody gets up early and works on automobile repairing, talking loudly and making so much noise neighbors are unable to sleep.

In Hospital Zone
Councilmen pointed out that this particular place is in a hospital zone, and that an ordinance already requires quiet in such areas. However, it was decided to ask City Attorney Carnahan to work out an anti-noise ordinance for the councilmen's consideration.

The council ordered that notification be sent adjoining property owners to build sidewalks on Esplanade street, from near Pine street to Spring street.

Councilman Van Camp asked about all-night parking in front of the Elk hotel. Police Chief Hamm said that if the council ordered, all-night parkers would find their cars at the police station in the morning, but it was indicated that tagging of the cars might be the winter procedure for the time being.

Mayor Absent

The city received a letter from H. C. Glatfelter, secretary of the state highway commission, stating that the commission will partially straighten the S-curve at Oregon avenue and Upham streets if the city will acquire the right-of-way. The street committee was instructed to attempt to close a deal for the needed property.

Mayor Willis Mahoney was absent from the meeting, being out of town on a campaign trip. Council President John Keller held down the mayor's chair.

N. Y. Police Jail Striking Seamen

NEW YORK, May 12, (U.P.)—Police Monday arrested 223 striking seamen who refused to move from the dock of the Panama Pacific liner Virginia and charged them with disorderly conduct. It was the largest mass arrest of the year.

Vincent Kaladz, 33, was charged with inciting to riot and Charles McIntosh, cab driver, was injured by a riot. Police denied there was any riot although riot squads were called out.

The Virginia is a sister ship of the S. S. California, center of the insurgent water front strike begun by a minority group of the International Seamen's union.

SHASTA SECTION SHUT TO SMOKERS

Effective May 15, the Shasta National forest is closed to smoking, except in camps, at places of habitation and in special posted areas known as "tag stations," according to an announcement from Earl E. Bachman, forest supervisor.

The forest is also closed to shooting off of fireworks, and a camp fire permit must be secured before building a camp fire. All campers on the forest are required to have a shovel and axe in their equipment.

These restrictions have proved valuable in the prevention of forest fires, according to the supervisor, and the shovel has been a valuable aid in extinguishing small smoker fires along the road discovered by campers.

Forest service officials appreciate the co-operation of the camping public, which is doing much toward preventing and suppressing forest fires.

Bleachers Planned for July 4th Event
