FARM PROGRAM IS CONSIDERED HERE TUESDAY

A meeting of all committeemen and alternates in the county agricultural conservation program was held in the civil service room of the federal building Tuesday, when the committeemen were instructed how to fill out a work sheet in connection with the agricultural conservation program. Charles W. Smith, assistant county agent leader from Oregon State college, attended the meeting and carried on the instructional work.

"It behooves every farmer in Klamath county to fill out a work sheet whether or not he desires to comply and be eligible for a grant under the agricultural conservation program," says C. W. Smith. "The signing of the work sheet does not obligate any person, but merely gives the history of the farm in 1935," Smith says.

"The community committeemen and the county agent's office are ready to assist any one at any time in filling out work sheets," says C. W. Henkle, assistant county agent.

There has been no date set at which time work sheets are due, but it is advisable that they be filled out as soon as possible, the agent said.

Rates for the No. 2 payment have been received by the county agent's office and those that are of particular interest to the farmers of Klamath county have been listed as follows:

- (1) Seeding and growing of perennial grasses or pasture mixtures of grasses and legumes \$3.50 an acre when seeded on irrigated crop land between the fall of 1935 and October 31, 1936, inclusive; \$2.00 an acre when seeded on non-irrigated crop land between the fall of 1935 and October 31, 1936.
- (2) Alfalfa or sweet clover grown in eastern Oregon \$1.00

per acre when planted on crop land in rows between the fall of 1935 and October 31, 1936; \$1.50 an acre when solid planted on crop land between the fall of 1935 and October 31, 1936.

(3) Green manure crops \$2.00 an acre when seeded on crop land between the fall of 1935 and July 31, 1936, and grown and turned under as a green manure prior to October 31, 1936, after attaining at least two months growth.

(4) Perennial noxious weeds, chemical treated \$10 an acre when a seriously infested plot of crop land, the location of which is previously filed with the county agent, is controlled by the means of application of chemicals and periodic cultivation in accordance with the recommendations of the state agricultural experiment station, approved by the director of the western division. Five dollars an acre when periodic cultivation so recommended is practiced.

At the present time the perennial noxious weeds include morning glory, white top, Russian knapp weed, leafy spurge, perennial sow thistle, Canada thistle, perennial ground cherry, blue flowering lettuce, poverty weed and wild snap-dragon.

(5) Disking in of alfalfa on irrigated lands \$6.00 an acre. When alfalfa is allowed to mature in 1936 and then disk it in with no hay or seed crop harvested from it in 1936.

No payments will be made for any of the practices mentioned above unless good seed is used and the practices are carried out in a workman-like manner in conformity with the cultural methods generally recognized as those best for the locality. A good stand of legumes or grass crops will constitute proof of seeding. However, if a good stand is not obtained because of unfavorable weather conditions or insect infestation, such proof will be waived and other proof accepted upon the recommendations and approval of the director of the western division.

New soil building practices which will be submitted for soil conserving crops have been added. They are as follows: (1) Perennial noxious weed control when practiced in accordance as mentioned above. (2) Disking in of alfalfa when practiced in accordance as mentioned above.

(3) Seeding of legumes or grass crops in dry land areas of eastern Oregon that have been trashed fallowed in the spring and summer of 1936.

If at any time there is any question regarding the agricultural conservation program, the county agent's office will be glad to answer them.

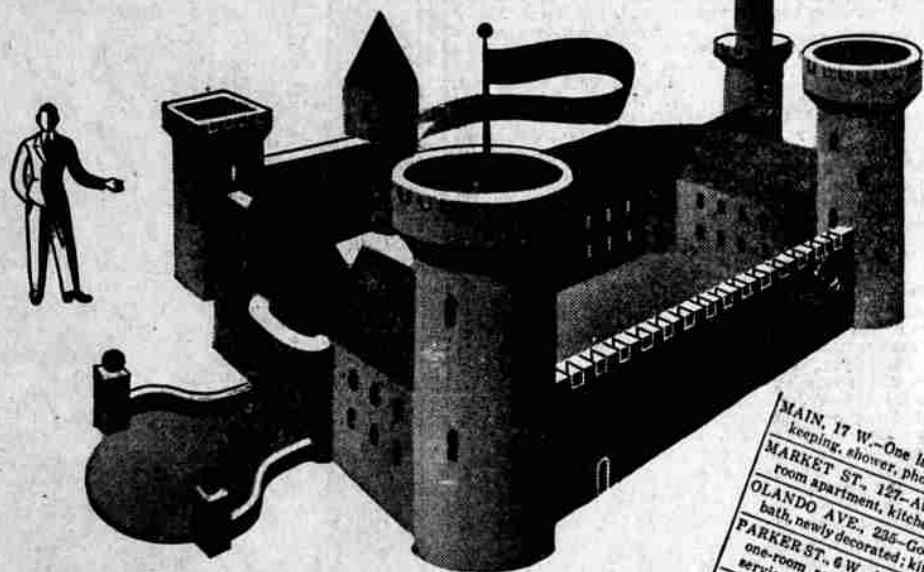

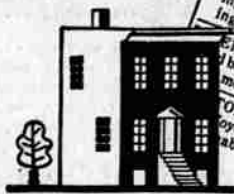
