

Pelicans Will Send Team to State Meet

Strong Grid Schedule Announced

Seven of Nine Games Will Be Played on Modoc Field. The Dalles Invades Klamath in October.

Football intruded on the spring and summer sport program long enough this week to get through the grid schedule for next autumn. And, as a result, Klamath high school offers one of the most interesting series of games Modoc field has seen.

The schedule, announced Wednesday by Head Coach Leslie Avrit, will include nine tough engagements. Best of all, the very particular Klamath Falls football fans should be absolutely satisfied when they learn that seven of these nine contests will be played right here on Modoc field.

There will be, of course, the regular run of Southern Oregon conference games. The highlight of the year will come on Friday night, October 3, when The Dalles invades Klamath Falls for the first time.

High school officials have put through a two-year agreement with the Upper-Columbia river school. In 1937, the Pelicans will play in the north.

This agreement marks a real step forward. While in the past Klamath has had no trouble in bringing outside teams to Modoc field, these invitations have never been returned. The situation was this: to satisfy the demands of football followers here, the Klamath athletic directors were forced to put up generous guarantees to arrange attractive games for Modoc field. The hitch, however, was that these same schools were pretty reluctant in offering the Pelicans similar inducements.

In the past, to get outside competition, Klamath has had to play host and foot the bill, too.

Here is the 1936 schedule:

September 10—Doubleheader with Malin and Lakeview. Modoc field, night.

September 25—Redmond on Modoc field, night.

October 3—The Dalles on Modoc field, night.

October 10—Grants Pass on Modoc field, night.

October 17—Klamath Falls at Ashland.

October 23—Yreka on Modoc field. The game is tentative and will be played at night if the weather is favorable.

October 31—Klamath Falls at Medford.

November 11—Bend on Modoc field.

It's a schedule that leaves no room for criticism. It's more than good; it's about perfect.

Given any kind of break with the weather, the long string of night contests should make for the most successful attendance on record.

The question now, however, is he going to make it stick when he meets Dude Chick? Chick's two matches with George Wilson and his one battle against Al Karanick stand out as the "tops" of the season. His meeting with Belcastro next Tuesday should be even better.

SQUAD SEEKS OREGON HONORS

Annual Event Scheduled for Bell Field Friday and Saturday.

Although not expected to lift the team championship, seven Klamath Pelicans track stars will be in the running Friday and Saturday for individual honors at the annual Oregon championships.

The state interscholastic track and field meet will be held this season on Bell field at Oregon State college.

Leslie Avrit, coach of the Klamath team Wednesday announced his tentative entry list.

Bishop will compete in the 230-yard dash; Yancy, 880-yard run; Adams, high jump; Reginato, discus and the 880-yard relay team. Bishop, Musselman, Green and Owens are listed for the relay.

These seven men won positions at the district meet held at Grants Pass over a week ago. Last Saturday they were all responsible for earning points toward Klamath's fifth straight Southern Oregon-Northern California championship.

Bishop gained the high point trophy by winning first in the century and 220 in addition to his work on the winning relay combination.

Yancy won the half-mile event. Adams was first in the high jump. Reginato gained a first in the discus.

Klamath is nearing the close of a successful season. The team won the district championship and then successfully defended its 30-30 title. Bend and Malin were beaten in dual competition.

Lillard Signs Long Desired Armory Clash

The match has been in the making for several weeks but it finally required a trip to San Francisco by the promoter before final arrangements could be completed.

Bob Kennaston, Gold Hill, and Tiger Taskoff, Bulgarian, will be seen in the opener.

Malin, winner of the B division at the Southern Oregon-Northern California meet, is favored to capture the championship.

Oregon State Heads Outline Locey's Work

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 13. (AP)—Oregon State's new activity set-up took form today with the announcement that Percy Locey, coach at Denver university, will become director of educational student activities next fall.

The position was created when recent action was taken to separate intercollegiate athletics from other activities, such as publications, music, yecum, dramatics and forensics.

President George Peavy was expected to announce his decision as to the handling of athletics today. Special committees named to determine whether athletics


should be maintained separately or placed under the department of physical education failed to reach an agreement.

Locey, who was graduated from Oregon State and the University of California departments of business administration, will teach part-time in the business administration school here, and spend the remainder of his time in the dean of men's office as the new director of educational activities. He is to join the Oregon State staff July 1.
