

Boston Nationals Reveal Signs of Strength

BEES ADVANCE TO 5TH PLACE

Team's Showing More Powerful Than Expected.

One notch above all the other surprises of the major league baseball season, which include the miserable showings of last year's world series rivals, the Tigers and Cubs, the uncertain performance of the Giants and the complete failure of the Browns having corps, comes the showing of the Boston Bees.

Move Into Fifth
A hopeless tail-end a year ago, the reorganized Bees have been showing signs of rejuvenation that can't be explained entirely by the new players they have acquired. By taking an exciting ten-inning decision from the Pirates Wednesday, 4 to 3, the Bees moved into fifth place in the National league ahead of Cincinnati's Reds, who took a 9 to 7 pounding from the Phillies.

Yanks Win Again
The Yankees trimmed the Browns, 4-1, behind Monte Pearson's flanking, while the Red Sox defeated the Tigers, 3 to 1. The world champion Tigers could get only six blows off Ruben Walberg and Fritz Ostermuller, Boston lefties. Seven walks off Walberg made trouble until Bill Webber belted his first homer of the season with two aboard, to bring in all the Boston runs. Schoolboy Rowe, who retired after six innings because of a sore arm, was the victim of the fourth-inning walkoff.

A possible explanation for some of the Giants' troubles cropped up when the New Yorkers took advantage of enforced idleness to complete a deal sending Smokey Joe Martin, relief third baseman, to Baltimore along with a bundle of cash in exchange for Eddie Mayo.

Athletes Head for Corvallis

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 14, (AP)—High school athletes from all parts of the state headed toward Corvallis today for the annual state track and field meet, beginning tomorrow afternoon.
Preliminaries in all but the half-mile, mile and relay will be held, starting at 1:30 p. m. Friday, preceding the Oregon State University of Idaho dual meet.
Six entries will compete in the finals of each event Saturday. The first five places will count for points, and the best marks will be computed regardless of which day on which they are made.
Winners of the first and second places in the seven district meets and the first four places in the Portland district will compete.

Merrill Club Making Plans for Track Meet

MERRILL, Ore.—Discussion of the Klamath county "B" league track meet, scheduled to be held on the new high school athletic grounds next Saturday afternoon, was included on the Tuesday noon program of the Service club with the announcement of the purchase of two fine trophies to be presented to the winning Klamath county team and to the winners of the entire meet.

All Klamath county B teams are expected to compete as well as entrants from Tulelake and Dorris. The entry lists include over 100 names. Opening gun of the meet is to be promptly at 1:00 p. m.

Muscle is to be furnished by the Klamath Basin band, a loud speaker donated by the Merrill Record is to be installed and Boy Scouts will be on hand to assist in any capacity where needed.

The track is being well sprinkled this week to eliminate dust and repeated rolling has put the field into excellent condition. Sponsors of the meet hope to make the event an annual occurrence.

Dr. F. E. Trotman, city health officer, again brought to the attention of the club the need for proper and continued disposal of city garbage and submitted a plan to be presented to the city council in an effort to adjust the unhealthy condition that exists in Merrill.

The suggested plan includes employing a licensed collector to make the rounds of all residences and hotels at least once a month to collect and dispose of garbage and debris. All those taking advantage of the system will be required to pay a small fee or in event the residents do not care to subscribe to removal of refuse each householder will be required to dispose of his own accumulation in accordance with the city plan.
Thomas Chaburn, city attorney, was authorized to study the situation and to appear before the next regular session of the council with ordinances drawn up for approval.
George Thomas made a report on the success of the motor caravan which toured the Lava Beds national monument last Sunday, stating that approximately 300 persons took advantage of the conducted tour to visit historical spots in the area. Wells with coffee, sugar and cream offered by the Service club, sponsors of the tour. Mr. Thomas furnished water and ice. Don Fisher gave an interesting talk at Canby's Cross, scene of the famous massacre.

Portland Hurler Leads to 3-2 Victory Over San Diego.

Errors figured in every Coast league baseball game Wednesday and decided two of them. The only two clubs whose score wasn't boosted by errors, lost because of their own fielding bobbles.

Right Shoulder Injured
Outfielder Max West cracked up his right shoulder saving a 3-2 victory for the Missions with a true shoestring catch. Seattle had two on and two out when pinch hitter Johnny Bassler hit sharply to right for what should have been a base hit. West came in so fast and caught the ball so low he bowled over on his shoulder.

One of the Mission runs came when outfielder Mike Hunt let the ball roll through him. Los Angeles, the only other club not helped by an error, lost to Sacramento 5-4 because Carl Dittmar threw the ball away in the first inning. The shortstop's error was responsible for three unearned Senator runs.

32nd Strikeout
With the tying run on third, George Caster fanned his 32nd man of the season to give Portland a 3-2 win over San Diego. Each team had one unearned run.

Caster's eight strikeouts failed to gain him leadership in that division for Sad Sam Gibson of San Francisco struck out an equal number of Oakland flycatchers for a total of 54. But it didn't help him win, because Jack La Rocca struck out ten Seals and allowed only 7 hits to win 5-3. Each nine got one run on an error.

BISHOP CASE CREATES STIR

Portland Followers Demand Reinstatement of Manager.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 14, (AP)—The furor over the release of Max Bishop as manager of the Portland baseball team grew to a boil, along with public demand that he be reinstated.

L. H. Gregory and Harry Leeding, Portland baseball writers, said they had received scores of letters and phone calls protesting the action of President E. J. Scheffer in releasing Bishop because sickness kept him from playing as well as managing the club.

"In plain words, Mr. E. J. Scheffer, your baseball public demands that you reinstate Max Bishop as manager," Gregory wrote.

"They care not one whit whether under baseball law you had legal right and justification to release Max Bishop."

The release followed word from Judge Brannan, president of minor league baseball clubs, that iron-clad contracts were not void in the minors.

Bishop offered to take a cut in pay and continue as bench manager, but wished assurance of a job for all season.

Bishop, long-time second baseman with the Philadelphia Americans, protested to Judge Landis, commissioner of baseball.

Malin Takes Smoker From Bonanza Team

MALIN, Ore.—Malin high school's rough and ready mat battlers won four decisive victories over the tough-skinned Bonanza high school lads in a series of scraps that were packed with thrills for the capacity south end crowd who packed the gymnasium Tuesday evening for the final smoker of this year.

The local lads went down to defeat in two bouts and two resulted in draws. The card included a battle royal for lads under 150 pounds and a blind fold bout between Delmar Criss and Don Jacobs that kept the crowd on edge.

"The safeties have hurt the game, so I'm taking them out. You wouldn't think I'd invent rules for that purpose when I'm known as the greatest safety player in the sport. But it has to be done to bring back the old popularity. Streamlining is all the go now."

"Another thing that's going to help is the new purple-iris cloth that is coming in. It is not nearly so hard on the eyes as the green cloth."

"The new color was first tried out in Chicago on November 19, last, and in New York on December 5. Of course, the manufacturers will raise some objection because they have everything set to make green, but I'm sure the purple-iris will take its place."
