Class has had many years of experience in welfare work, especially in the child-welfare field. He will explain the social security legislation to his hearers during his talk. At the noon luncheon, Mrs. Ernest Moser will be the guest speaker, and will tell of her experiences in the mission field of South Africa. The afternoon will be devoted to round table discussions. Miss Olive Whitlock, state advisory nurse of the state bureau of nursing from Portland, will meet with the nurses, and Miss Marion Bowen, supervisor of social service with the state relief department, will meet with the social workers. Ohio Labor Leader Murdered in Home

CLEVELAND, May 14, (U.P.)—Arthur Whitehead, Cleveland labor leader, was shot and killed Wednesday by two unidentified men who entered his home and began firing without warning. Police said Whitehead was sitting in a rocker at his home on fashionable East Boulevard when his assassins entered. They immediately opened fire and Whitehead fell to the floor. He was dead when detectives arrived.

McNary Works for Road Improvement

WASHINGTON, May 14, (U.P.)—Senator McNary conferred Wednesday with officials of the bureau of public roads and forest service, urging release of funds to improve the Pacific highway grade from Eugene to Ashland. McNary proposed that money for the work be obtained under the \$400,000,000 road clause of the new relief act, without disturbing allotments due the state from regular highway appropriations.

SENATOR McNARY HAS WIDE SUPPORT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 13.—"Oregonians of all occupations and classes seem to be united solidly behind United States Senator Charles L. McNary for re-nomination May 15," said Ralph D. Moores, chairman of the McNary committee at Portland hotel today.

"On one side the lumbermen of the state are appreciative of what the senator did for the industry, and he seems to be getting the backing of the industry, right from the top to the bottom. George L. Baker is chairman of the manufacturers' association of the state, and last night he delivered a ringing address over KOIN, boosting the senator's candidacy. Wish I had space to quote this at length."

"Only enough on the same day William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor writes out to the Oregon Federation of Labor, under date of May 8, to say that Senator McNary has consistently shown himself to be a champion of labor during the entire period of his service as United States senator, and that he has been consistent in voting for measures sponsored and approved by the American Federation of Labor. "So much for the employers and employees, a third angle is the farmers and general agriculture interests, and proof of their support comes to our office daily in dozens of warmly reassuring letters of friendship and support from the senator's wide acquaintance with farmers and grangers in every part of Oregon. As joint author of the McNary-Haugen bill, he has been regarded as one of the outstanding friends of agriculture, and these people write in assuring us they have not forgotten the senator's achievements, and that their communities are solidly behind him."

"The senator is a born and bred Oregonian of pioneer stock, actually owns and operates an Oregon farm, and is conversant with the needs and ideas of Oregonians. To replace him at this time with an untried and inexperienced man would be a calamity for the state," said Moores.

Engineer Opposes Uniform Rate for Bonneville Power

WASHINGTON, May 14, (U.P.)—Col. Thomas M. Robins of the army board of engineers told the agriculture sub-committee considering Bonneville legislation Wednesday that uniform rates throughout the area from Montana to northern California would make the cost so high to everyone that industries would not be attracted. The national resources board recommended uniform rates in its report last week. "If you don't get industries, you can't get people, and without people you can't sell the power," Col. Robins said. Robins divided the Columbia

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basin power area into three parts: (1) lower Columbia, comprising the southwest section of Washington and the Bonneville area, in north and east Oregon; (2) the Puget Sound area; and (3) the Grand Coulee area in eastern and northern Washington.

He also disputed wisdom of the board's insistence that industrial development be prevented in the Columbia gorge, to preserve its scenic value. Industrial development should be at the dam, near North Bonneville, Wash., in order to permit low power rates, Col. Robins said.

Private companies could undersell the government in the Portland area unless switchboard rates are adopted at Bonneville, the engineer said.

"The only thing that will sell Bonneville power is the fact that it is located at tidewater," said Col. Robins.

MAN WANTED ON FELONY CHARGE

Perry Watson, wanted in Altkin, Minn., on a felony complaint, was apprehended Wednesday by John Arkell, special Indian officer, and Deputy Sheriff Willis Pankey in a logging camp near Sprague River, according to an announcement from Sheriff L. L. Low.

Sheriff Low received a letter from Sheriff Ned Price of Altkin, Minn., late in April, stating that he held a felony warrant for Watson, whom he believed to be in the Klamath country. Low turned the information over to Arkell and Wednesday's arrest ended the long search. Watson admitted his identity, according to local officers, but made no confession. He signed a waiver of extradition, and Minnesota officers are expected to arrive within a few days to take him into custody.

Trial Scheduled for Next Monday

Trial for Patrick Wynne, arrested outside the city limits on South sixth street Tuesday night, has been set for Monday, May 18, before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes. Wynne, who was arraigned Wednesday, pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunken driving, and was remanded to the county jail upon failure to post bail. Z. F. Burrough was fined \$5 in

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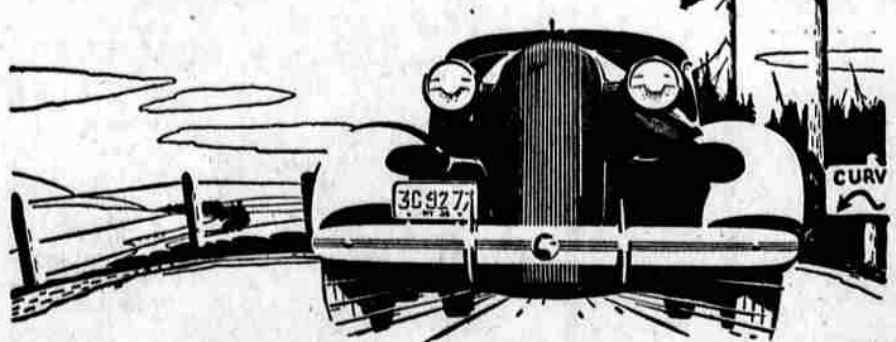
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
