

DIG FIRM SAYS TRADE IMPROVES

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP)—Sydney G. McCallister, president of International Harvester Co., told stockholders at the annual meeting today "business is considerably better than a year ago."

"We find," he said, "as fast as the farmer has the funds, he is very attentive to his obligations."

McCallister said "the farmers are still in an optimistic frame of mind. They can very low on equipment in the depression years, and in their present frame of mind they are buying more."

The farmer, he said, is in a difficult situation. He has not been getting prices for his products high enough to cover the increased cost of the things he buys.

The company now employs in the United States about 53,000 persons compared with 45,700 in 1935.

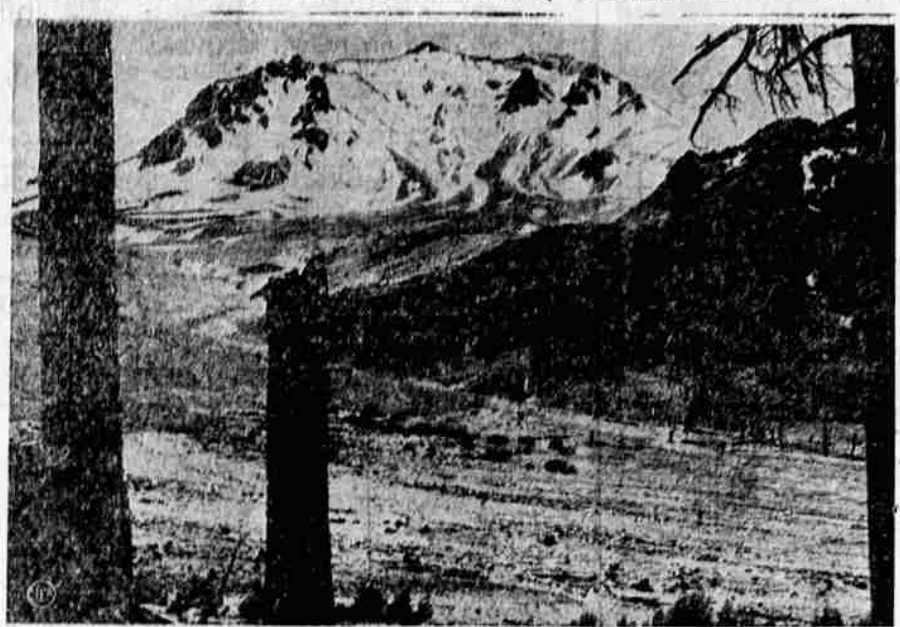

PRICES DECLINE ON WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO, May 14 (AP)—Sharply reversing yesterday's action, wheat prices declined today.

The lowering of wheat values apparently resulted from authoritative assertions that defeat of the Frazier-Lemke bill in congress had killed all present prospects of inflationary legislation. Dearth of new export business in Canadian wheat acted also as a weight on prices.

Rallies in the last few minutes brought about an irregular close, 1 cent lower to 1 higher compared with yesterday's figure. May 22-3, corn closed 1 lower to 1 higher, oats unchanged to 1 off, and provisions varying from 15 cents setback to an equal advance.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP)—Bullish forces took control of the stock market today, pushing favorite shares one to six or more points higher in the most active trading for more than a week. The closing tone was strong. Sales approximated 1,350,000 shares.

Although the turnover tapered off considerably during the last two hours, a thin sellers' market resulted in full maintenance of foreign gains, and in some cases in extension of a point or so, leaving closing prices the best of the day.

Leaders on the upturn included American Telephone, Westinghouse, J. I. Case, Dupont, International Harvester, Allied Chemical, Owens-Illinois, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Auburn Auto, Packard, Deere, American Smelting, Western Union, Consolidated Edison, North American, Santa Fe, New York Central, Southern Pacific, Douglas Aircraft, Distillers Corp., Seagrams, and International Nickel.

Other financial markets also were generally brighter. Cotton was firm. Corporate bonds edged forward moderately, and leading foreign currencies were steady.
