THREE LEAGUES LIST CONTESTS

Southern Oregon, Crater Lake, Klamath Basin Clubs To Play

The Grants Pass Merchants, one of the two undefeated members of the Southern Oregon league, invade Klamath Falls Sunday afternoon, to meet the Klamath Pelicans in the feature baseball contest of the week end.

The contest will be staged at Modoc field.

Grants Pass joined the Klamath Red Sox at the head of the league column last week by trimming Glendale in the first contest of the year. The Sox kept pace in their battle to retain the championship won in 1935 by trouncing the Pelicans.

While Grants Pass and the Pelicans tangle here, the Red Sox go to Glendale.

The Crater Lake league, organized this season for the first time, swings into the opening contests of the schedule Sunday afternoon. The league's organization was completed when Algoma replaced the Sons of Italy.

Famous Jockey Dies in Fall From Building

NEW YORK, May 16. (AP)—The career of Jockey Laverne Fator, one of America's outstanding turf stars, was ended today with death resulting from a serious illness and a two-story fall from the window of a hospital at Jamaica, Long Island.

Fator, who was 38, had been irrational from peritonitis following appendicitis, and yesterday, when his nurse returned to his room with a glass of water he had requested, she found him lying in a stone courtyard, 40 feet below the window. His skull was fractured.

At his side when he died last night were his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Sande. Sande, noted jockey, formerly was one of Fator's turf companions.

Fator, who learned to ride on cow ponies at Hatley, Ida., came east about 18 years ago and within a short time had won for himself wide recognition as one of America's leading jockeys. By 1931, when he virtually retired from the saddle, he had won 1,131 races, and had brought many other mounts in to place and show.

His total winnings for his employers, including the Ross and Ranocosa stables were estimated during his racing years at \$2,408,720.

Brown Battler Scores Victory Over Del Genio

NEW YORK, May 16. (AP)—Pedro Montanez, classy little brown-skinned Puerto Rican scrapper, moved closer to a title shot at Lightweight Champion Tony Canzoneri by pouncing on his 15th consecutive American victory—an easy unanimous 10-round decision over young Leon and Del Genio of New York.

More than 8000 fans in Madison Square Garden saw Montanez batter Del Genio's head and body with smashing hooks, while the New York Italian tried to keep inside and land uppercuts to Pedro's head.

Despite Pedro's top-sided victory, these fans greeted the decision with mixed cheers and booing because the Puerto Rican had been warned five times for holding by Referee Artie McGovern. However, McGovern took no rounds from Pedro because of his questionable tactics.

Dorris Concedes Defeat for Post Of Committeeman

EUGENE, Ore., May 16. (AP)—Ben Dorris was one of the first candidates to admit defeat in the Oregon primary election, when he issued the following statement after losing to Ralph Williams, veteran state political leader, in the race for the post of republican national committeeman:

"The returns show I have taken a good licking. I hope my small vote is personal against me and not against the program I am advocating. I have sent the following telegram to Ralph Williams:

HURLERS MEET WITH TROUBLE

Only Three of 16 Stay Route Friday In Big Leagues

The pitching mound is a dangerous place to be these days, with the major league batsmen taking all sorts of liberties at the plate.

For a pitcher to work a complete game is getting to be something of a rarity, and many an ace flinger, not accustomed to be driven from the mound, has seen his choice offerings patted with abandon.

Only three of the 16 pitchers who started yesterday saw their lack through. The White Sox beat the Yankees 9-7, blasting out 24 hits, four of them home runs; a total of 26 hits was made as the Senators beat the Browns 10-5; 20 as the Athletics downed the Tigers 6-5, and 21 as the Indians beat the Red Sox 7-2.

In the National league the Bees beat the Cards 7-5, with 25 safeties, the Phillies conquered the Cubs 11-5 with a grand total of 30 blows, and the Giants shut out the Reds 2-0 with 15 hits bouncing off the bats. The lowest hit total in either league was 13, batted out as the Pirates beat the Dodgers 6-2. Altogether 13 homers were hammered out.

The only pitchers to start and finish were Jim Weaver of the Pirates, who limited the Dodgers to four safe blows; Buck Newsum, who gave the Browns nine hits, and Oral Hildebrand of Cleveland, who gave the big guns of the Boston Red Sox only six hits. Newsum fanned 11.

Joe DiMaggio, the Yankee rookie, from the Pacific coast, continued his amazing batting with two doubles and two singles.

Webfooters Win From Idaho, 10-4

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 16. (AP)—The University of Oregon baseball team took second place in the northern division Pacific Coast conference by virtue of a 10 to 4 victory over the University of Idaho.

The Webfooters trailed until the sixth inning, and then pounded over three runs in each of the next three frames to clinch the game.

Crippled Steamer Limp to Harbor; Passengers Safe

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, May 16. (UP)—The steamer North Sea, with a gaping hole in her port bow, limped slowly under her own power toward Ketchikan Friday, to lay up for repairs and discharge remaining passengers.

One hundred twenty passengers bound for northern Alaska points were transferred from the crippled steamer to the liner Victoria today. Twenty-three remained on board.

The vessel, which hit a rock during a fog in southeastern Alaska waters, will return to Seattle to be drydocked, after temporary repairs here.

The 143 passengers and 40 crew members returned to the ship last night when her pumps were able to prevent rise of sea water. Earlier the co. guard cutter Alert of Ketchikan picked up the passengers and crew when at first it appeared necessary to beach the North Sea.

Idaho Vandals Capture Meet From Beavers

CORVALLIS, May 16. (AP)—Peacock's third place in the high jump gave the University of Idaho a 66 1/2 to 64 1/2 victory over the Oregon State college track team in a dual meet here.

The Vandals needed but one point in the final event—the broad jump—to clinch the victory and Peacock provided it.

The Vandals also had a narrow escape in the gruelling miles run. Probst outpacing Shepard by inches to the tape for an extra two points which later proved the margin of victory.

The visitors took nine firsts to Oregon State's five. Two men from each team were tied in the high jump.

Record-breaking performances were impossible under adverse weather and track conditions. A cold rain fell during the meet.

Kidder, Oregon State, won individual scoring honors with 13 points, winning both hurdles and placing second in the broad jump.

Bearcat School Will Construct New Grandstand

SALEM, May 16. (AP)—The executive committee of the Willamette university trustees authorized the immediate construction of a modern wooden grandstand and other improvements on Sweetland athletic field at the university here.

Other improvements will include widening of the field by 40 feet and building of new bleachers. A total of \$8,000 was authorized for the construction.

The new grandstand will seat 2,000 persons and will be built over Mill creek on the south side of the field directly across from the old grandstand which will be left intact. With the construction seating capacity including bleachers will be approximately 6,000.

The mill race will be moved to allow for widening of the field. The work was expected to be completed in time for opening of the summer softball season June 16.
