Mob Sets Killer's House Afire; Two Perish in Flames

GORDONSVILLE, Va., May 16. (UP)—William Wallies, 65-year-old negro, and his sister Cora, died Friday in the flames of their barricaded home where they battled a mob of 5000 for six hours after slaying Sheriff William Young.

They wounded 10 or more persons.

Cora Wallies was shot down by a state trooper firing into the house through a window.

The posse set the house on fire.

Wallies kept on shooting until the roof of the two-story frame structure caved in.

Then he started out, still shooting, to fall back into the flames under a blast of machine gun bullets.

GORDONSVILLE, Va., May 16. (UP)—A negro and his sister barricaded in their home Friday night shot and killed Sheriff William Young, wounded a state trooper and threatened death to any who tried to enter.

A mob of Blue Ridge mountaineers gathered quickly after the shooting and prepared to storm the house.

The crazed negro reportedly wounded 10 persons in shooting at the mob.

State troopers and deputy sheriffs were rushing up tear gas bombs as well as equipment with which to set the house on fire and drive out the negroes if necessary.

They were also trying to get State Trooper S. L. McWilliams, shot in the legs, out from under a porch.

Sheriff Young of Range county was shot down at 5 p. m., when he tried to take the negro, William Wallies, into custody. Wallies, known as "Queer," had allegedly been carrying firearms around for the past six months and threatening people.

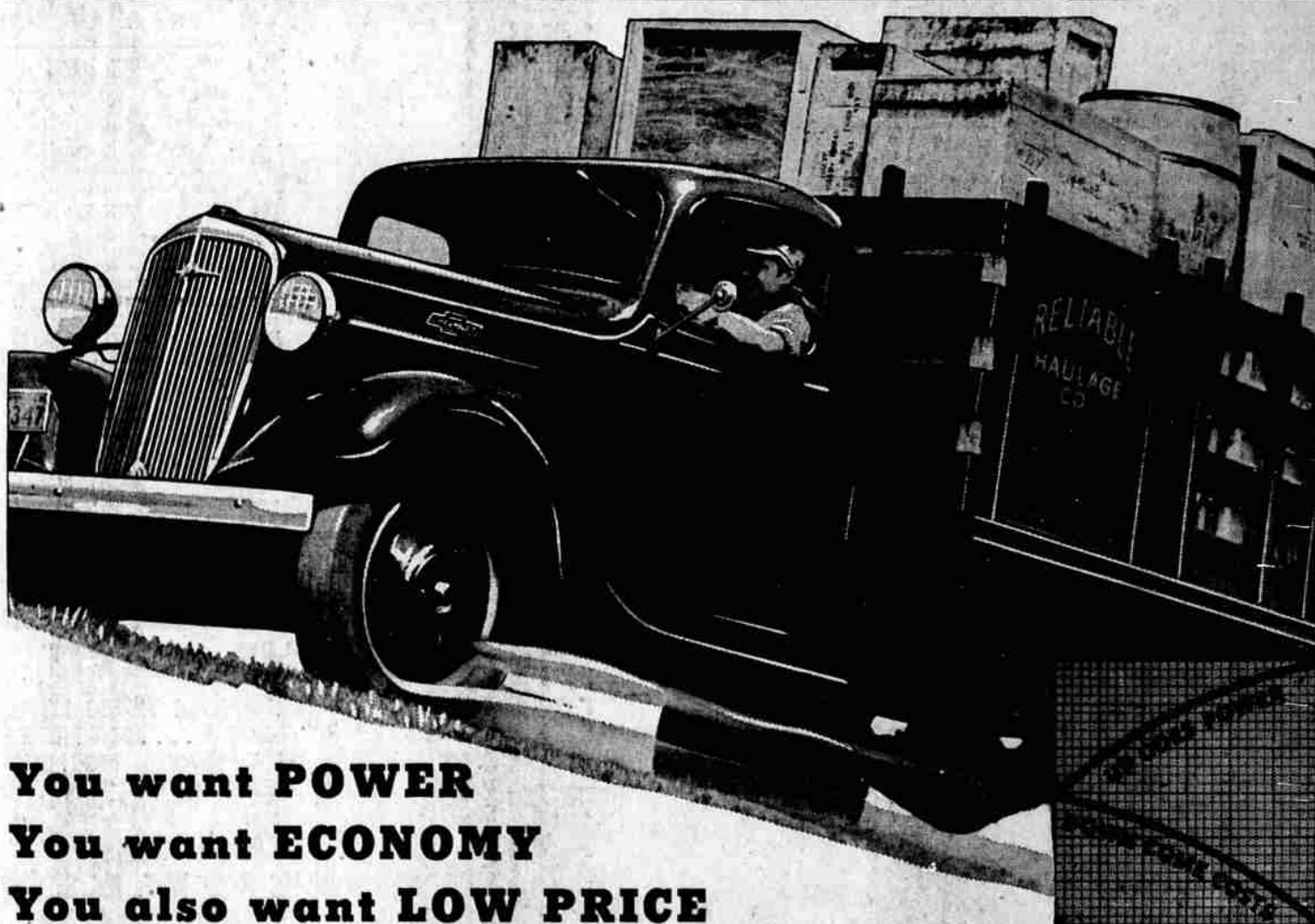
CLAUDETTE IS GARDENING
