R. N. A. Holds District Convention Friday In Grants Pass.

The thirteenth annual convention of the Royal Neighbors of America was held in Grants Pass, Oregon, May 15, 1936.

More than 150 delegates and members came from Klamath, Lake, Deschutes, Jackson and Josephine counties. Convention officers were introduced and seated by an escort team from Medford.

O. J. Millard of Grants Pass delivered an address of welcome, to which Mrs. Irma Kibler, state supervisor of Idaho and Oregon responded.

Mrs. Anna Briggs of Grants Pass, district orator, presided. Mrs. Lola Myers of Klamath Falls, was elected district orator for next convention; Mrs. Margaretta Garrett, Medford, district vice orator; Mrs. Josephine Robinson, Klamath Falls, recorder and secretary; Mrs. Abbie Hood, Ashland, district chancellor.

Following the state convention which will be held in Medford in 1937, the next district convention will be in 1938 in Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Irma Kibler, state supervisor, was the principal speaker, and presided over a school of instruction, with groups from the camps in the district exemplifying the different features of the lodge work.

At 8:00 p. m., a banquet was served at the Hotel Del Norte, during which Mr. and Mrs. Bruno P. Stewart played violin and piano numbers, while groups from Ashland and Bend camps added to the program with songs.

Mrs. Audella Glover, district deputy from Klamath Falls, was toastmistress and was introduced by Mrs. Leonora Brilli from Ashland.

Immediately after the banquet, military drills were executed on H street by teams from Klamath Falls and Bend. Medford and Ashland presented fancy drill in the hall and a drill by Klamath Falls team was given in Japanese costumes.

Although no awards were given for the drill work, all were congratulated on the perfect execution of the drills.

A class of candidates was initiated by Klamath Falls degree team, after which the meeting was opened to visitors.

The officers elect were installed with a pretty ceremony in which the Medford escort team assisted, with Mrs. Edith Beck of Medford acting as installing officer and her daughter, La Marie Beck as ceremonial marshal.

Flowers and gifts were presented to the officers by the convention and camps in an attractive manner.

A small wagon decorated to represent a ship loaded with oranges, drawn by a small boy and girl dressed in sailor costumes and accompanied by Mrs. St. Laurent of Grants Pass, who made the presentations was a pleasing feature of the program.

Other numbers in the program were two acrobatic stunts by the little Dunsey sisters, two solos by R. J. Wright playing his own accompaniment, a tap dance by Miss Virginia Reister.

A good night song by Ashland women's quartet and a summary of the days work by Mrs. Kibler closed one of the best district conventions ever held in Southern Oregon.
