

Champions Blanked by Glendale Loggers

The Wilson Case Makes More News

George Declared First All-American To Gain Rating Without High School Diploma.

George Wilson, wrestler, is still reflecting on his football days when he earned all-American rating as a ball carrier for the University of Washington.

Recently Wilson described how he lost \$10,000 in professional grid offers by sticking with the Huskies and playing the Rose Bowl tournament contest against Alabama.

Now Wilson, a most desirable football star of ten years ago, says he attended the Washington school without ever receiving a high school diploma.

The following article appeared recently in a San Francisco newspaper:

"This is the second installment of that gripping serial 'Confessions of an All-American' by George Wilson.

"In the first installment, avidly devoured by the public two months ago, Wilson told how his old school, Washington, did him out of a chance to make \$10,000 in pro football on the pledge that he would be 'taken care of' as an amateur.

"Now, Washington's greatest halfback delivers deeper into his past to fetch out a tidbit which he thinks worthy of Ripley.

"He is, so he says, the first high school boy ever to be dignified as an All-American.

"He played varsity football at Washington in 1923 and 1924 without benefit of high school credentials. Not until his senior year, 1925, did he receive a prep school diploma to legitimize him as a decent under-graduate.

"Wilson doesn't know how he got away with it but he believes the fact that he was an exceptionally good ball player had something to do with Washington's leniency toward him.

"Everyone in Everett knew I didn't graduate from the high school there," Wilson says. "But everyone in Seattle knew I could lug that pigskin. I guess that made it even."

"Wilson is now playing his trade as a professional wrestler with moderate success. So far, his long delayed high school diploma has not helped him much in his new work."

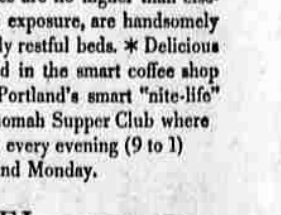
Short and Turpin hurled for Merril with Cheyne catching. By scoring the winning run in the last inning, Malin defeated "Lake, 18 to 17.
