

NURSES HOLD CONFERENCE HERE SATURDAY

Southern Oregon public health nurses and social service workers met in joint session Saturday for their fourth regional conference held at the Willard hotel.

The conference convened at 10:00 a. m., with Norris E. Class, professor of sociology of the Portland extension division, as principal speaker.

Class presented an interesting address on "Social Security Legislation." The following points were brought out in his talk: 1. formative process of the social security act; 2. features dealing with old age security, with (a.) federal grants, (b.) compulsory old age insurance; 3. unemployment compensation; 4. other federal grants provided for in the social security act; 5. administration of the act; and 6. future steps which may possibly be taken to strengthen the legislation.

Three books on the topic were recommended by Class as follows: "Social Security in the United States," Douglas; "Insurance of Dole," Bakke, and "Insecurity, a Challenge to America," Epstein. Luncheon was served at noon to those attending the conference, and Mrs. Ernest Moser, (Edna Dunbar), who recently returned to the States after three years in the missionary field in western Africa, was the guest speaker. Mr. and Mrs. Moser will return to Africa at the end of their furlough. She told of "medical services" which the missionaries are required to perform, and her talk was of great interest to her audience.

The afternoon sessions were given over to round table discussions for social service workers and nurses. Professor Class met with the social service group; and Miss Lucille Perrost, assistant state advisory nurse, met with the nurses' organization.

Following the nurses' discussions, reports, etc., Miss M. E. Bell and Miss Elizabeth McGalliard, of Portland, formerly from the Henry Street Settlement in New York, presented a demonstration of a modernly equipped visiting nurses bag.

Information Will Go to McNary

County Engineer Frank Howard is preparing information for the use of Senator Charles L. McNary in an effort to obtain funds for building the Chiloquin-Sprague River road, provided the current public road bill passes congress and is signed by the president.

Howard said Monday that there is a \$4,000,000 fund out of the total appropriation in the proposed bill set aside for roads on Indian reservations, and it is hoped that something may be done to qualify the Sprague river road for part of this money.

If it can be built up to secondary highway standards in this way, the state highway commission may take the road over as a secondary highway.

A hearing of egg grades and standards will be held in the Oregon building, Portland, at 10:00 o'clock on May 21, according to an announcement from J. D. Mickle, chief of the state division of foods and dairies. Klamath producers and dealers are urged to attend.

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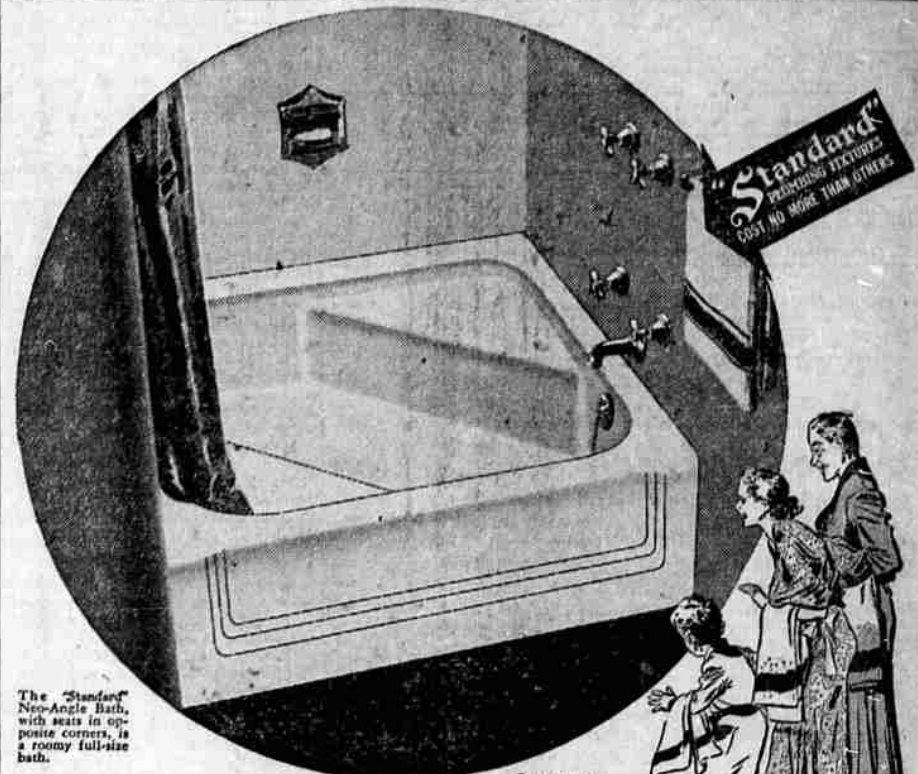
Fish Lake Road Not Open Sunday
