

SCOTCH POLICE OFFICER IN CITY

Chief of Police Keith of Hamilton, Scotland, accompanied by Mrs. Keith, made a brief visit in Klamath Falls Saturday, calling on Chief of Police Hamm and members of the local police department at headquarters.

The Scotch officer compared the police departments of Scotland and the United States. Men on his force receive free house rent, are exempt from taxes, are given uniforms and boots and receive medical care and hospitalization, he stated.

One policeman is allotted to 465 population, compared to one policeman for every 1450 people in Klamath Falls.

Police officers in Scotland are pensioned on two-thirds pay after working 30 years, or half pay after 20 years, according to Chief Keith.

The visitor stated that there is much more crime for the police to take care of in America than in Scotland, giving an example the fact that one man on his force served for 17 years without making an arrest, his only official act being to take an insane woman to an asylum.

He was much surprised to learn that on Saturday nights there are as many as 30 men housed in the Klamath Falls jail.

Chief and Mrs. Keith are on a three months' vacation trip. (With pay, he added, or they would have stayed at home, being Scotch.)

They are making a tour of the United States, and visiting various police departments, in order that Keith may learn American methods.

"Mortals and Immortals" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ Scientists, on Sunday, May 17.

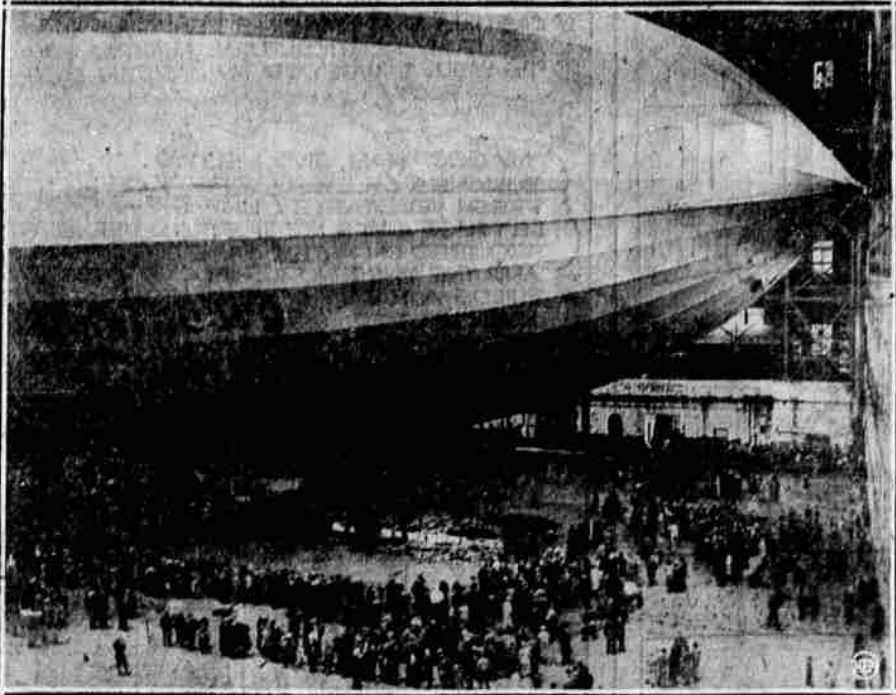

CORVALLIS, May 18. (AP)—Hundreds of Oregon State freshmen lost their pledging wings here in the annual "burning of the green" but as many others renounced their rook status two days early in a co-ed rebellion. Green caps and ribbons went up in smoke.

Campus week-end brought a myriad of activities, prefaced by the Oregon State high school track meet and the dual meet between O. S. C. and the University of Idaho.

Rookie stalwarts won the annual tug-of-war with the sophomores.

Nearly 300 engineers from all parts of Oregon participated in special departmental events. The annual Eta Kappa Nu award, offered the outstanding sophomore in electrical engineering, went to William J. Barclay, Portland.

H. E. Munzer, Portland, and A. C. Durland, Roseburg, were announced as winners of first and second places respectively in the annual student competition for the best paper submitted to the Portland section of the American Society of Automotive Engineers.

Nevada's Republican Delegates Unpledged

LAS VEGAS, Nev., May 18. (UP)—Nevada's six republican delegates will go unpledged to the Cleveland convention, delegates to the state convention decided Saturday.

Lester D. Summerfield, Reno attorney, was chosen unanimously as national committeeman to replace George Wingfield, for many years Nevada's political and financial czar, who made no effort to regain his post. Clyde Souter, Reno lawyer, was elected unanimously as state chairman. He will lead the national convention delegation as one of the six Nevada vote-casters.

Amusement Park Fire Kills Three

EAST DOROT, May 18. (UP)—Three bodies were recovered from the smoldering ruins of "Jungleville" in Eastwood Amusement park Saturday. Firemen, successful in extinguishing the fire, were unable to identify the victims immediately but said the bodies were those of two men and a woman.

Park officials who estimated damage to the huge frame structure at \$10,000 believed the blaze was started by a match or cigarette. More than 5,000 people were in the flimsy building when the fire started.

G. O. P. ADMITS DEFEAT IN FALL

Copyright 1936 by United Press WASHINGTON, May 18. (UP) Republican congressional leaders admitted privately Saturday that they saw little chance of overturning the democratic control of congress in the fall election regardless of whether President Roosevelt is reelected.

While republicans from the outset have considered it almost certain that democratic control in the senate would continue, they had hoped to gain enough seats in the house to regain superiority there.

Gain of 75 at Most

Such a development now seems remote on the basis of predictions made today and based on present trends which conceivably may change during the interval before the elections.

An important house republican leader predicted today that his party would be "lucky" if it had 175 house seats next session. It now has 192. A majority of the house, which has 435 members, is 218.

Two months ago republican congressional leaders were more optimistic. At that time house Republican Leader Bertrand Snell, named as permanent chairman of the republican national convention, foresaw the possibility of his party controlling the house even if it lost the presidency.

Demos. Confident

Speaker Joseph W. Byrns said today that "from my information we will not have any serious losses in the next election." Other democratic leaders, privately seeing a possible gain of 50 republican seats, said they did not consider that such a change would injure administration control if the president is reelected.

American Volcano Stirs Again
