

Interest Rising in Louis-Schmeling Clash

NEGRO DRAWS BIG FOLLOWING

Huge Attendance Expected Without Customary Ballyhoo.

NEW YORK, May 19. (AP)—Even if Max Schmeling has so much as a long-shot chance to tag Joe Louis in their forthcoming fight, there has been no concerted attempt to insist upon it in the preliminary ballyhoo for the year's biggest heavyweight offering.

What's more important, it does not appear necessary, from the box-office standpoint. The stage already has been reached in the phenomenal ring career of Louis where no particular stress needs to be put on the competitive side of the buildup. Like Jack Dempsey, the brown bomber has dynamic drawing power as a fistful soloist, no matter what the party of the second part produces.

With a full month remaining to picture Schmeling as showing off his old-time durability and punching prowess, the fact of vital interest to promoter Mike Jacobs is that the advance sale already is close to the half-million dollar mark. It is just about as certain as taxes that the gate receipts will aggregate \$1,250,000 when Max and Joe square off under the lights of the Yankee Stadium, June 18.

Far from discouraging the cash customers, the \$40 price for ringside seats appears to have stimulated the flow of certified checks into the offices of the Twentieth Century sporting club. If the spectators can get their hands on anything within the next few weeks, they will double the price and probably collect it. Such is the hold that the negro boy from Alabama has gained on the fistful following that the cost seems secondary to the desire to be a ringside eyewitness to his artistic ability.

President Peavy Studies Revision In O.S.C. Set Up

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 19. (AP)—President George W. Peavy probably will appoint members of the newly created governing board of athletics at Oregon State college this week.

The new board, which replaces the board of control, will be composed of faculty members, students and alumni. Appointment of an athletic manager will be the first duty of the board. The athletic manager will represent the associated students at the Pacific Coast conference meeting at Spokane June 3 and 4.

Under the new student activity set-up here athletics are administered separately from other extra-curricular activities. All formerly were handled by the graduate manager.

Percy Lacey, former Denver University football coach, was named manager of general or educational extra-curricular activities.

Marriage to Be Held at Bottom Of Puget Sound

SEATTLE, May 19. (UP)—The world's wettest wedding was scheduled today for the afternoon of June 14, when Capt. John C. Benson, 73, of San Francisco, and Mrs. Elizabeth Partee, Chicago, will be married on the bottom of Puget Sound.

The submarine ceremony, part of a golden jubilee celebration in suburban Ballard, will take place against a background of seaweed and fishes under eight feet of water. Bride, groom, officiating minister and witnesses will be dressed informally in diving suits.

Telephonic communications will synchronize the various parts of the vows, which will be broadcast over loud-speaking equipment above the surface.

Capt. Benson, former sailing ship master, inspected the scene in his wedding suit Monday. "Only one thing bothers me," he said, when he emerged and removed his 20-pound helmet, "is how am I going to kiss the bride in this thing?"

Racers Prepare For Memorial Track Classic

INDIANAPOLIS, May 19. (AP)—All manner of men who play with death are entered in the 500-mile automobile race to be run here May 30.

There is Cliff Berger, slender, grey-haired stunt man of the movies, who turns cars over at high speed just to see what they will do under such treatment, or who will jump off a cliff to provide a thrill.

Then there is Lucky Toeter of Noblesville, Ind., who drives cars through fire, jumps them over wide spaces or crashes into brick walls to provide thrills at state and county fairs.

Others include Babe Stapp, who tests cars when not racing; Jimmy Snyder of the midjet car league and Wilbur Shaw who does things with airplanes when not speeding on the ground.

But it is Shaw of them all who is the big worry at the speedway these days.

His sensational performance Sunday in driving his 25-mile qualifying test at 117 miles an hour on less than two gallons of gasoline has established Shaw, a home town boy, as the man to beat in the race.

Camp Bonanza Scores Another Baseball Win

CAMP LAVA BEDS, May 19. Camp Lava Beds batters were unable to fathom the southward slants of George Houdreau, Camp Bonanza chucker, and went down to defeat 9-4 in a seven inning game played on the Lava Beds diamond Sunday.

The win was the fourth straight for the Bonanza Cubs, and marked the third consecutive triumph for Houdreau. Fire Loss Trial Opens in Court

Trial of the law suit of T. L. Cleveland versus the Providence-Washington Insurance company got under way in circuit court Monday, with selection of a jury and testimony of plaintiff's first three witnesses consuming the whole day's session.

Cleveland is asking \$5000, claiming the defendant company failed to pay the insured loss when fire destroyed his 4-g house near Olene.

Greenland has been the landing place of many large meteorites from which Eskimos pounded bits of metal, mere flakes. These they inserted in the cutting edges of their harpoon points.

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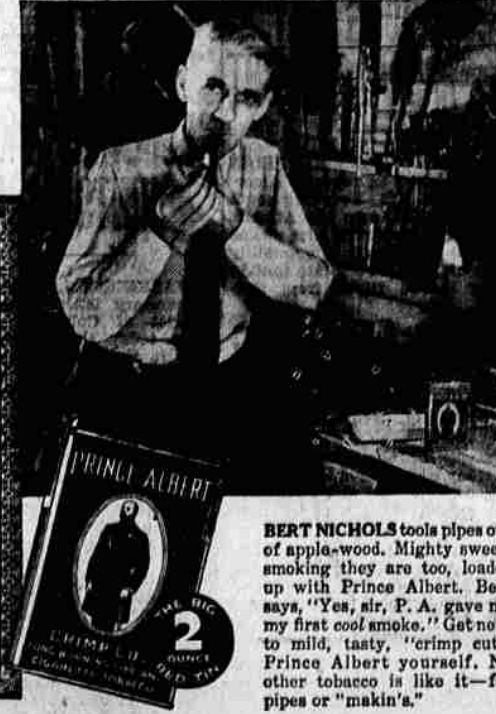
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
